401 Widening Creates Hardships On Residents

With the widening of the 401 through Pickering, scheduled to begin in 1989, comes the hardship on those few residents who live along its borders.

The widening will benefit thousands of commuters on a daily basis, however, for people like Joyce Marchai and Frank Langston, it could mean lowering the property values on their homes.

"My big concern is the additional noise that will be coming from the 401, and how that will affect my property value," said Langston who lives on the south side of the 401, just west of Rougemont Drive. Langston also questioned how he is going to be able to keep his windows and even the interior of his home clean from the dust that will be generated by the construction.

Marchai is also upset by the possibility of increased noise and the possibility of a large noise abatement wall being put up to block their view. She does concede that some residents will have to suffer in order to benefit thousands. "It should have been done 10 years ago. It is something that has to be done."

Their concerns are legitimate," said Norris Bot, Senior Project Manager for the widening.

The plans for the widening began in 1983. However, in 1985 Go Transit came up with a proposal for a rapid transit system called GoAlert which would run along the 401. This put the 401 widening on hold until GoAlert was cancelled. The Ministry of Transportation and Communications then continued their work on the plans with more localized studies and by receiving input from the various Town Councils.

The announcement about the project was made two weeks ago, giving an official start time of 1989, if everything keeps on schedule. Following that, there were a series of public information seminars held in Scarborough and Pickering, which took place last week in the Recreation Complex.

The next step includes a series of studies that will take a closer look at some key issues. One such study will look into the handling of construction in the Rouge River Valley. For this MTC will

Ajax Pumping Station

With the building of a \$4.5 million pumping station in Ajax, the Region of Durham expects there will not be a repeat of the floodings that occurred last August.

Approximately 40 residents, many of whom were rudely awakened on the morning of August 27 to find sewage seeping into their basements, attended an information session here April 7 to hear the Region's works department's report on the sanitary sewer flooding relief study.

The study was conducted for the region by Simcoe Engineering Group Limited, to identify the causes of the basement flooding, to investigate those causes and the magnitude of overloading in the sanitary sewer system and determine the most efficient way to alleviate the flooding of basements.

The study indicated that the rainstorm on August 26 and 27, which lasted about six hours and

produced three inches of rain, was equivalent to a six hour 100-year-storm.

Had the ground been dry, it would have absorbed most of the water and the floodings caused by a back-up of sewage into basements through the sanitary sewer connection, never would have happened.

But this storm was preceded on August 15 by another 100-year-storm that saturated the ground. Of the 124 homes flooded in Ajax, only 14 were not related to the back-up in the sanitary sewers.

Walter Evans, a professional engineer and design manager of the works department for the Region, said there was no flooding in the areas where the foundation drains were connected to storm sewers.

The back up was caused by the overloading of the Southwood and Cloveridge pumping sta-

Woman Found Dead

An Ajax woman was pronounced dead at the scene of her home after being found by a relative Monday morning.

Forty-four-year-old Shirley Preston was found dead from what appeared to be carbon monoxide poisoning, according to Durham Regional Police. Preston was discovered in her car

enclosed in the garage, while three other victims were found unconscious in the home.

Preston's husband Paul, 42, her daughter Michelle, 11, and Norman Frank Swinford, their 57-year-old border, was taken to the Ajax-Pickering General Hospital for more appropriate care. Michelle was then later transferred to the hospital. (continued on page 7)

Assessing The Problem Of Wife Abuse In Ajax-Pickering

Wife Abuse in Ajax-Pickering, the first of three parts in a report on Family Violence was released during the annual meeting April 8 of the Social Planning Council of Ajax-Pickering.

Committee Chairman Tove Leckie said the study came about as the result of the 1985 Durham Regional Council Study that suggested as many as 2,000 cases of wife abuse occurred yearly in Ajax-Pickering.

The committee was

organized to make an assessment of the problem, explore services available and make recommendations.

The committee found that in one year, 395 abused women in Ajax-Pickering came to one of the social agencies for help. Considering the number of unreported cases, Leckie said the 2,000 estimate was not unrealistic.

services available to women who are being abused in Ajax-Pickering. Many must travel to Scarborough or Oshawa to receive help, she said.

"This is what we were trying to help," Leckie said. The committee came up with a number of recommendations, the main thrust being that a broad range of support and services must be established in the area to deal with the problem.

Council announced a co-operative approach to services for abused women. By calling Information Ajax-Pickering (686-2661) women can have access to a broad range of services in the area.

These include linkage to emergency shelter facilities in Oshawa, and as of April 15, they will be able to refer women in crisis to a safe house. Established by the Catholic community, the safe houses consist of volunteer host fam-

lies that will help women through the first few hours of a crisis until other arrangements can be made.

It is expected that by June, individual and group counselling will be available for women, their children and the abusers.

An out of hours recorded message gives emergency accommodation numbers and call forwarding is to be added later this year.

The committee also called for the establishment of a residential facility to provide housing for emergency cases. Through funding from the United Way of Ajax-Pickering and the Region of Durham Social Services Department, two apartments rented in safe areas will be available to women and their children in need of accommodation. These are expected to be available July 1, 1987.

Leckie said she had no doubts that when we recruit volunteers

to solicit funding and furniture for the apartments they will be met graciously."

A befriending program in which volunteers are trained to offer emotional and social support is also planned. Participating in this collaborative effort are the YWCA, Catholic Community Services in Durham,

Social Services Region of Durham Department and Information Ajax-Pickering.

The second part of the study, Abuse of the Elderly, to be carried out this year was announced during the meeting and a short movie depicting the plight of the elderly was shown.

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"We all tend to think of wife abuse as a lower class phenomenon," Leckie said. "Even doctors and policemen have been found to be wife abusers. It seems no one is immune to this."

The study also found that many women chose to stay in the abusive relationship for many reasons, she said, including for the sake of the children, financial reasons or the hope the situation would change for the better.

The most disturbing fact the study uncovered was the lack of

21% Increase In Cab Fares

Pickering Council has agreed to support a 21 per cent increase in the rates and fares for taxicabs in the town.

Last Monday night council heard that many of the costs incurred by the drivers have gone up considerably. Maintenance costs have risen tremendously, and insurance has gone up as high as 100 per cent.

Don Haley, General Manager of Durham Rapid Taxi, pointed out to Council that cars used as taxis, rate on the bottom of the scale along with police cars, for resalability. Although the same car, owned for personal use, may resell for \$4,000, a car used as a taxi would resell for \$2,000.

"When it comes to rates, I think we're being fair to the town of Pickering," said Haley.

A majority of the councillors supported the fare increase, noting that the insurance increases alone would justify the hike.

"The increase may seem high, but there was no rate increase at all last year and the maintenance costs and the increase in insurance justifies it," said Councillor Norah Stoner.

Councillor Alex Robertson did not support the increase, stating that the increase in

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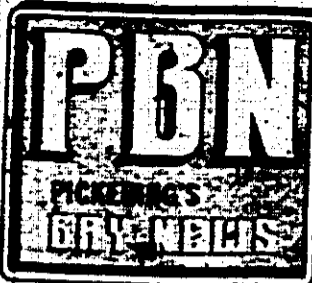

Is Pickering Really A Cultural Brain Drain?

Is Pickering really a "cultural brain drain" as Lacey O'Leary, President of the Pickering Players, said in the April 6 meeting of Council? Compared to other communities, yes.

Right now we are seeing our cultural community suffer and wither away due to a lack of facilities with which to express themselves in. Towns like Uxbridge, Stouffville, Whitby, Oshawa and Markham have their own theatres, while in Pickering, the Dunbarton High School Theatre is used.

It's not only the Pickering Players Theatre Group that is suffering. As shown by the impressive turn out of cultural groups at the council meeting, it is the dance groups, photographers, painters, sculpturers, musicians, singers and writers, just to name a few. Even the Boy Scouts are clamouring for a cultural centre, in a need to get more storage space. This is just an example of the variety of uses such a centre would be utilized for.

However, a majority of council believes that culture costs the Town too much. Agreed, there will be a large cost involved. But let's look at possibilities for funding.

Such as with any project, the longer you wait to build, the more the costs rise and make your project unfeasible. The time to build the centre is now.

As Councillor Norah Stoner suggested, in order to bring costs down even more, build the council chambers in the civic complex so that it can double as a theatre when the chambers are not in use. Use existing facilities in order to lower costs.

Then there are also the numerous federal and provincial grants that would be available to this Town for building such a facility. What harm would it do to check into how much they (the Town) could get.

This month the cultural groups will be forming the Pickering Arts Council. Once united, they could be a strong force in helping to raise the money. They have already stated they are more than willing to pitch in. If residents in Markham can raise over \$3 million for a hospital, why can't the residents of Pickering raise a fair chunk for a cultural centre?

Maybe after thinking the whole issue through, Council may reconsider their decision. If an answer to this problem is not reached soon, it will be too late to incorporate the cultural centre into the civic complex and the Town will inevitably turn away from the project all together.

There is an unbelievable amount of talent in our town that is forced to go elsewhere. It's unfair. We offer support and facilities for our athletes, then why not our artists. The two are equally important. D.C.

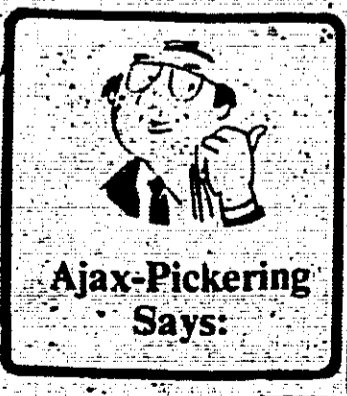

Pickering Transit Inefficient

Letter to the editor
 I am writing in regards to Pickering's so-called transit system. This is a completely inefficient organization which exists only because it holds a monopoly on bus systems in Pickering. The employees are unfamiliar with the routes, and are thus of little help to the new resident or rider.

Book-ups with Ajax Transit and the TTC are almost non-existent, and those with GO Transit are poor, sometimes causing the commuter to miss a train or bus. Is there a consistent schedule that the buses run by? If so, I haven't noticed it. According to a recent study, 36% of those surveyed found the buses to be early, late or on time on different occasions. This is even more annoying than if they were always late, as then the rider would have some idea of when to expect the bus. The buses have been forty-five minutes late, twenty minutes early, and at times, haven't shown up at all. When they do show, the drivers take a tour of Pickering before reaching a destination. Granted, part of this tour is financially necessary, but I can see no reason to tour Rosebank en route to Maple Ridge from the Pickering Recreation Complex. The number of people on the bus during rush hour is ridiculous. The buses are built to seat about 25 persons, but almost twice that number board the buses every

 be consulting many groups including the Save The Rouge River Valley group. Some of the precautions being used in this area will be the use of water, rather than chemicals, to keep the dust down, and steps taken to ensure that no debris will fall into the river.

Carolyn Southey, the Environmental Planner for the project, stated that some of the concerns presented by this group are the preservation of the migration route for rainbow trout and preservation of the home of the white-tailed deer.

During the widening project, a new Rougemount Drive bridge will be constructed while the existing one will remain intact. Once the new bridge is finished, the old one will be destroyed.

In order to keep noise levels from increasing as would be expected with the increase in traffic, a special asphalt surface will be used the entire length of the widening

from Morningside To Brock Road. This special surface, which will also be used in this summer's 401 resurfacing projects, will down tone the traffic noise. Other measures used for noise abatement will be depressed roads, and the use of walls and bushes to absorb the noise.

Now that the public information seminars are completed, the Ministry can begin acquisitioning land. They will only have to purchase three entire residential properties and 16 partial purchases, according to Frank Sworik, property agent for the project. Also eight commercial and industrial pieces of properties will be effected and three land pieces belonging to institutions will be effected. Once final plans are completed, it is expected that 20 to 25 metres of land will be needed on each side to accommodate the additional six lanes. Bot also explained

that the current work being done on the Liverpool Road ramp, will be built to accommodate the widening. Similar planning was done when the Go Transit approached the ministry with plans to expand. When the plans were drawn up, it was kept in mind that the 401 would be widened and enough land was left between the two projects.

Over 80 people attended the seminar held at the Recreation Complex last Thursday, including Durham West M.P.P. George Ashe who stated that the project looked good, but that it

was too little too late. "I've been pushing for this for a long time," said Ashe. "My question is why didn't the Liberal government announce this two years ago."

However, Councilor Norah Stoner, Ashe's opponent in the upcoming Provincial elections, said that "the Tories didn't come out with anything, ever. The 401 widening has been a priority task ever since the Liberals came into power."

Stoner also stated that the Minister Ed Fulton has also gone so far as to try to press for a five year construction

period. Other methods currently being discussed by the Ministry to relieve traffic problems, are the extensions of Steeles and Finch Avenue, and the development of Highway 407. The proposal for the 407 would connect Highway 401 at Milton, Highway 427, and Highway 404 to Highway 48 in Markham. This is the portion that has already been approved by the Ministry although no start date has been announced. The proposal for an interim highway from Highway 48 to the 401 has been suggested to

accommodate traffic until development in the North of Pickering warrants the continuation of the 407 there. This has not been given approval by the Ministry.

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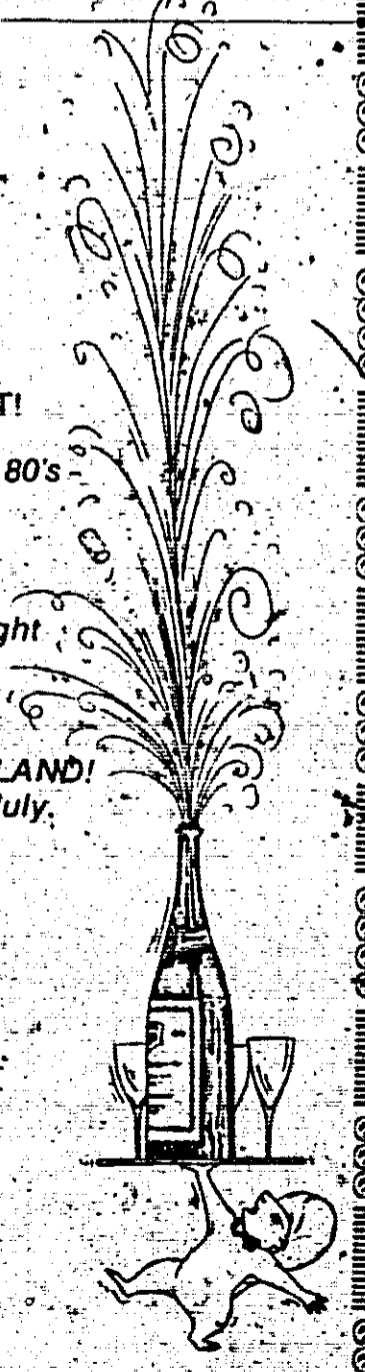

(continued from page 3) insurance costs do not justify a 21 per cent increase. The drop rate for Pickering taxis will go up from \$1.20 to \$1.80 if council approves it in next week's council. Also, the kilometre rate will change to \$1 and the waiting time per hour will change to \$18. This brings Pickering to approximately the same level as Whitby, Ajax, and Toronto.

Also discussed at the council meeting was the issue of transferability of plates. Haley argued that the only equity a driver has is his plate. Currently the Pickering by-law will allow this plate to be turned over to the driver's spouse in case of disability or death. However, unless that spouse can drive, they will have to hire someone to drive in order to make money off the plate.

Haley suggested that the town keep track of how much each plate makes, in order to determine if the plate is working or being held for speculation. Only one plate is allowed in town for every resident, therefore holding plates can prove profitable.

Haley also suggested that if the town charge a fee of \$3,500 to \$4,000 for transferring plates it

would cover their costs. Councillor Wayne Athurs noted that he had a problem with the possibility of corporations making profit from the purchasing of plates. "It doesn't matter if the company gets the plate," said Roberts. "At least the individual can get some money from it." The resolution to make plates transferable was lost.

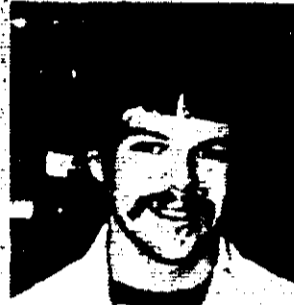

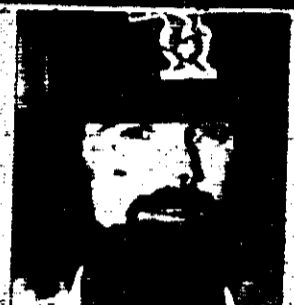

Sewage Backup Caused By Overload

The two stations are inter-connected with a pipe which permits overflow from the Southwood station to the Cloveridge station whenever the water level rises above the overflow pipe.

Because the water level at the Southwood station was substantially higher than the Cloveridge pumping station, it is suspected there was a temporary restriction in the pipe which was released by pressure.

If construction of a new pumping station on Bay Street, east of Pickering Beach Road, was thought economically impossible by the region at this time, Simcoe Engineering suggested expanding the Southwood pumping station at a cost of \$500,000.

Taking into consideration that when the new pumping station is built, the expansion would be redundant, the works department recommended the region contribute the \$500,000 towards the construction of the new station.

This recommendation was accepted the following day at Regional Council.

Some residents attending the meeting, like Ray Thomas, whose basement has flooded five times in past years, wanted to know why the situation was not addressed earlier, while others wanted to know what legal recourse they had against the region to collect damages.

Residents were advised to consult their lawyers on any legal matters.

The new station will provide service to the lands within Carruthers Creek Watershed including approximately 450 acres of industrial lands and 320 acres of residential land.

Therefore costing of the new station is conditional upon the need for additional residential and industrial development in the town of Ajax.

With the region contributing \$500,000 residential lands would account for \$1,800,000 and industrial lands for the remaining

\$2,300,000.

Following the meeting, Mayor Bill McLean said that when the station is built, the two remaining stations could handle the remaining areas without expansion and would prevent flooding from occurring in the future on Harcher

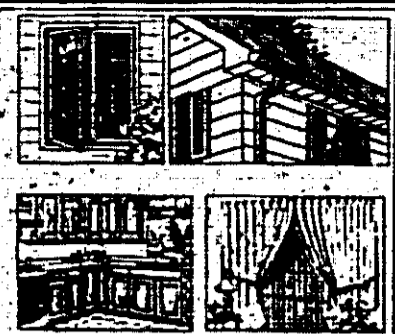
Road, Gregory Road and Hills Road, which were the three main streets affected.

The Town is presently examining an amendment to the Regional Official Plan to provide additional industrial-residential lands for development

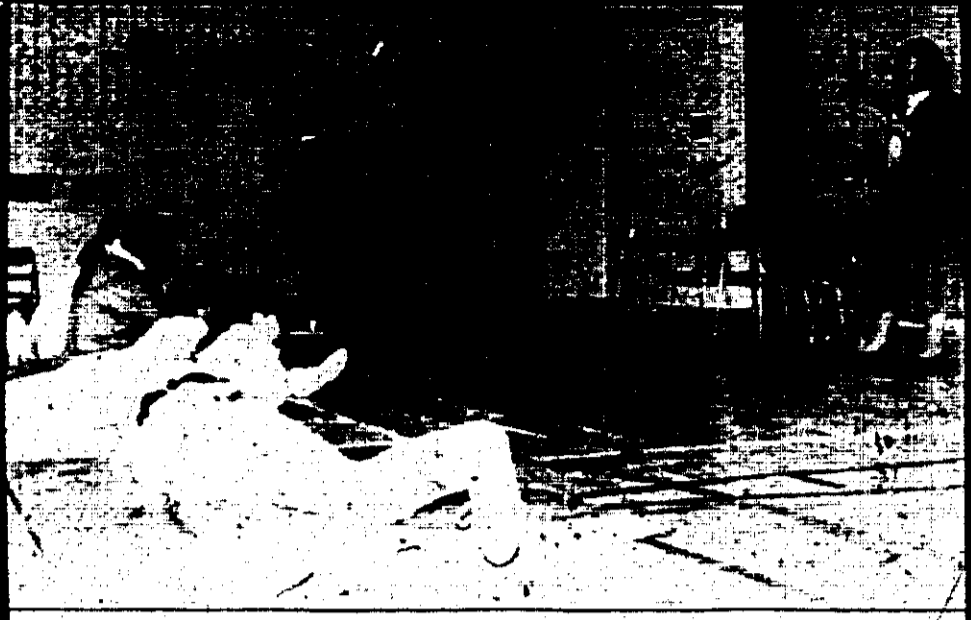
I have not quite figured it out yet, but it appears that they recognize my Nova Scotia license plates and purposefully set out to kill me or drive me insane.

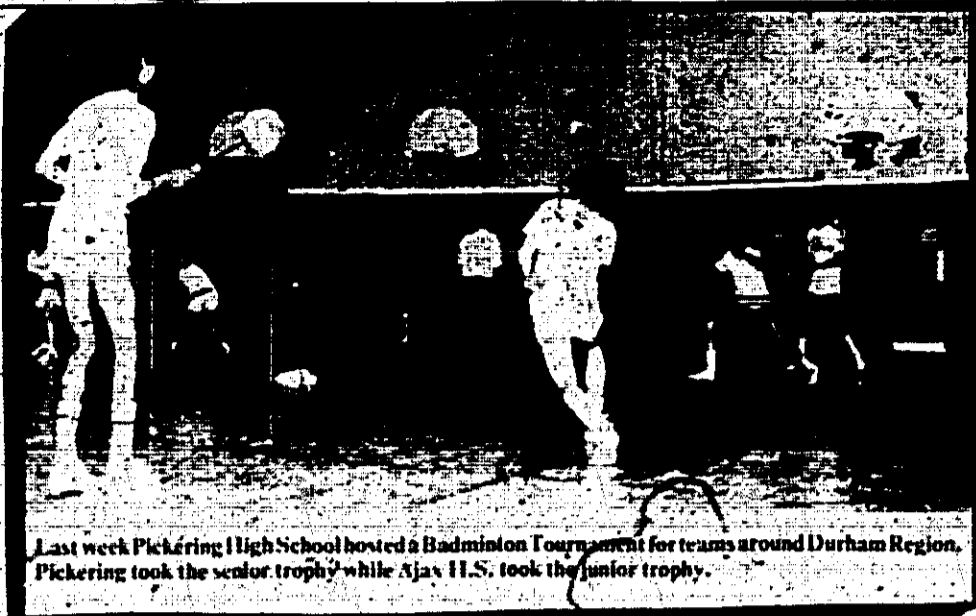

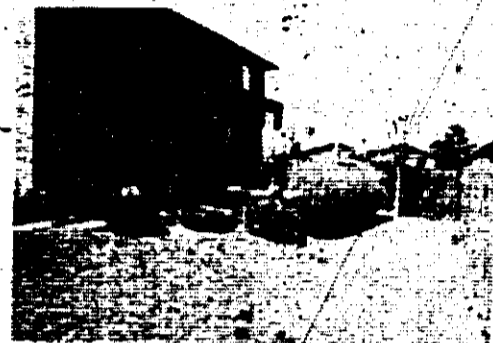

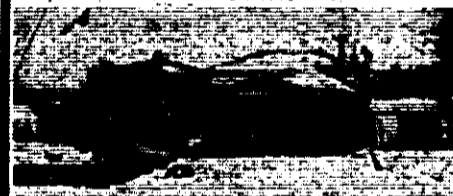

in A6-A7. If the amendments are passed, then approximately 2,500 acres will be eligible to use the new station with landowners paying a per acre charge.

Landowners who do not wish to participate will not have their land serviced and their cost share will have to be absorbed by others who want to proceed. Mayor McLean said the region will be preparing a water supply and sanitary sewer services and financing report this fall that will name the non-governmental contributors and when funds will be available to begin construction.

"Unfortunately, that's one order we couldn't fill," she laughed.

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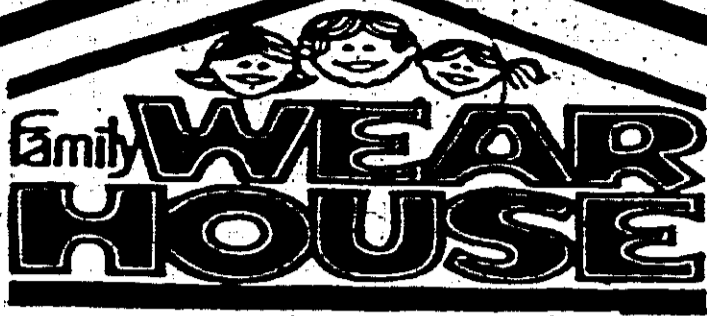
