Those Intrepid United Empire Loyalist Pioneers who after sacrificing their homes, livelihoods, and other possessions in the maintenance of loyalty to the British Crown during and after the American Revolutionary War, came to upper Canada and established new homes.

The record of the progenitor of the the Trull Family speaks for itself on subsequent pages, leaving treasured information, and a tradition of which we can be justly proud.

The list of the Trulls is a long one and while the writer has endeavoured to trace each and every descendant, some omissions are certain to occur. Every effort has been made however to present as complete an account as possible. If we have made errors or omissions in this record please bear in mind our pioneers were too busy home-making and empire-building to spare much time for book records, and it was not until many years later that our governing bodies made provision for such information to be kept. Thus it was that few registrations of births, marriages, and deaths were officially maintained, and today the old Biblical records, save for a few treasured copies, among those of John C. Trull, are all but extinct. Under the circumstances we have done the best we could to provide for coming generations this history of their ancestors.

OUR PROGENITOR

John W. Trull, the original pioneer was born on the Isle of Wight, England, in 1746. He was pressed into service at thirteen years of age, on a Man-of-War named "Irando".

Several years later when a ship he was on was engaged in the Slave Trade in Africa, and while waiting for a load of slaves it is recorded he remarked, "that he could see the flash of arms like lightning bugs on the shore.

At the period of the American Revolutionary War, Captain Trull was at Tewsbury Mass. which is twenty miles northwest of Boston. He was awakened by a messenger at 2:00 a. m., April 19th, 1775, and according to a prearranged signal fired the shot that warned Dracut across the Merrimack river, and served His Sovereign with the British Militia.

At the end of the Revolutionary War, many families who had settled in the United States, and remained true to the British Connection, were persecuted by the triumphant insurgents for their loyalty. There was a general confiscation of their possessions and they were driven to seek a home elsewhere. Thousands of the Loyalists, including some of the best educated and wealthiest of the colonists, left the country fleeing to Canada.

These people were induced to come to this country by the land bounty, a proclamation issued by Col. John Graves Simcoe (then Lieutenant Governor of Canada) that all males of the age of eighteen years, who settled in the country, should be entitled to two hundred acres of land.

At this time John W. Trull began to consider withdrawing to British soil which he did in 1794.

In the War of 1812 between Canada and the United States, he played his part in defending his new home. His large sail boat, which he had built out of native timbers, the government pressed into service for taking prisoners from York (Toronto) to Kingston.

He died in 1830 at the age of 84 years, and was buried in Lot 32 on the broken front Bowmanville Bass Line.

The ORIGIN and GROWTH of the TRULL FAMILY

While engaged in military service John W. Trull met the family of Dr. Casey, who had a daughter named Lydia. It seems that it was love at first sight. It is told they eloped and were married in 1782, when Lydia was seventeen years old. While living in the United States Eunice and Susan, who were twins, and also Elizabeth and Sarah were born.

It is said the relatives of Lydia Casey migrated to Canada by way of Adolphustown. In the writings of W.S. Herrington (history of County of Lennox) we note Willet and Wm. were among the U.E.L's who came to Adolphustown by way of Lake of Champlain. They were born in Rhode Island where their father was killed during the war, but it is not known if this was Dr. Casey.

The descendants of Dr. Casey migrated to Canada by way of Adolphustown and settled in Napanee, Ontario.

John W. Trull filled with a desire to live peacefully under the British Flag came with John Burk, Roger Conant, and their families to Canada.

Leaving the old home in the Susquehanna River Area New York State, September the first, they travelled by way of Mohawk Valley to Oswego. Their families, household effects were placed on board a large open Batteau (rude boat) which coasted the south shore of Lake Ontario, running into bays and inlets to avoid stress of weather and for the purpose of cooking their meals, and camping during the night. The old pioneers have recorded the following.

"There were no roads on either side of Lake Ontario at that time. On a journey (that now can made in a few hours) we spent a month and a day. The journey was tedious, toilsome and not without danger. It was a month of storms on the lake, and when one of the frequent gales came up, we had to pull our boats ashore and camp in the woods that then covered the whole country from the lake front to the farthest north. Matches were then an invention of the future and we had to depend on a flint, or rubbing together of two sticks, to start a fire, a difficult operation at best, and almost impossible of accomplishment when rain was falling. Our cooking utensils were pots hung on stakes over an open

fire and our food consisted of fish caught in the lake, game obtained from the forest, and bread hastily cooked from flour we carried with us. Sleep was broken, quite frequently, by the howling of wolves, and some of the party had to remain on guard all night".

Reaching Newark (Niagara-on-the-Lake) they were sent by Governor Simcoe to settle in Upper Canada. Continuing their journey along the north shoreline of the lake, & they soon reached Barber's Creek, Port Darlington which changed its name to Bowmanville in 1823, and on the second of October camped in front of where the settlement was formed.

Their stock which consisted of a horse and two cows, were driven around the shore, and the tedious journey crossing swamps, creeks and marshes on the way, may well be imagined. Those in charge of the boats having crossed the Niagara river into Canada, were received at Newark with great kindness by the Governor, who sent a man back to assist in bringing around the stock as far as York, now Toronto. The small band reached their destination in safety, after surmounting all obstacles.

At Barber's Creek they found a flat marsh, the grass quite free from the forest trees, which then were universal above the water's edge of Lake Ontario. Here the settlers at once set to work to prepare against the approach of winter, the creek and lake formed two sides of a triangle for defence from wolves, leaving only one side to be protected. They built log shanties that had bark roofs, plastered on the inside with mud, and swall grass was used as filling for their bed ticks. In the spring the Trulls settled three miles west of Barber's Creek, and here the homestead still remains where Jay Trull, a great grandson of John W. still farms. The Burk family took land between the Trulls and Barber's Creek. Less than a year later on September 2, 1795, John Casey Trull arrived, the first member of the family that was born on Canadian soil, and the first white child to be born in the County of Durham.

The first actual settlement of Darlington Township, County of Durham, Province of Ontario, took place in the year 1794 and in the years to follow John Casey, Phoebe,

Jesse, William and Parmelia were born.

The few settlers had no neighbors but the Indians, for two or three years. There was not a house within thirty miles to the west, and none to the east, short of Smith's Creek (Ganaraska river) Port Hope.

The hardships of pioneer life hadn't ended when the Darlington settlement was reached. Rather they had only begun. It was not then a drive of only of only a few miles, over paved roads, to the nearest town, when groceries were needed, Kingston and York (Toronto) were the nearest markets and the journey made in dug-outs (boats fashioned from hollow logs) was a matter of days. Even when schooners appeared on the lake, transportation was no easy matter. In the absence of wharves, the vessels had to lie out in the lake while farm produce was transported to them in open boats.

Trade and commerce were most difficult in this new country where there were few neighbours or persons travelling who possessed money. Furs were one of the few commodities which could be exchanged for currency.

Possessing some money was Roger Conant, who brought from the United States £5000 in British Gold, and in 1798 became a fur trader. In 1799 Roger Conant made his way to Montreal by canoe, and had Durham boats built, broad beamed open flat boats, strongly built for rowing and towing. These he filled with traps, blankets, knives, guns, flints, ammunition, beads, and tomahawks bought in the Montreal stores to trade with the Indians for furs. As good prices were paid for furs in Montreal, it is probable he disposed of them there.

During the winter these pioneers spent most of the time trapping and hunting. The deer and bear were so plentiful, that an abundance of animal food could be procured with very little trouble. The furred animals were also very numerous and required but very little skill to trap them.

Sugar making was another pursuit which tho' it did not add great wealth to the settler's pocket, at any rate, did increase his home comforts.

A very great inconvenience felt among them was the want of a mill to grind their grain and corn, the nearest being Myer's Mill (Belleville) situated at foot of

Lake Ontario sixty miles distant. Those who went to mill usually took two weeks to go and return, using a canoe for the purpose of hauling it up on the shore at night, and camping in the woods. When a storm occurred, they were weather-bound until it passed over. On the arrival at the mill, they waited till the grist was ground, then they returned home in the same manner. As going to mill was no light undertaking and attended with so many obstacles and perils, a great many expedients were resorted to in order to obviate this necessity. Some of the settlers had brought large coffee mills with them and these were used to grind or crack their grain. Other contrivances were improvised, one method very much in vogue was to make a rude mortar by hollowing out a stump. Sometimes this was done by boring or chiseling, but it was quite frequently burnt out, and the cavity spots were removed. Then they had a wooden pounder attached to a swing pole. They put the corn into the cavity, and pounded it with this rude pestle. This bruised corn was known as Samp; and when pounded fine was made into Johnny Cake, and the coarse being boiled into mush. Another nutritious and wholesome article of food was found in the wild rice, which grew in most of the marshes and in great abundance in Rice Lake.

HARDSHIPS

Our present generation can't even surmise what were the difficulties and hardships encountered, both in that shore cruise to the Bowmanville area and their early pioneer years. Even later the 'summerless' year of 1816 no language can depict. How the baying of the wolves, poverty and lack of everything but the hard, haunted the doorstep of the refugees.

The Indians were very troublesome, and caused considerable anxiety, being armed and equipped, and very different from the present remnants of the broken tribes occasionally seen to-day. In 1878 Captain John C. Trull relates an incident which occurred at his father's house when he was a boy. His father was absent having gone to Meyer's Mill (Belleville) when a squaw with four papooses came to the house and asked his mother for naw-pah-nee, (flour). The article being extremely scarce, his mother

refused giving her any, the squaw then searched through the house, and found the flour in a kneading trough. She brought it forth and commenced to divide it equally to every one in the room, by giving a double-handful to his mother, then to herself, and to each white child & paupoose until it was all divided, then she took her share in a bag and travelled off through the woods.

Open hostilities were as a general thing avoided, and there is only one instance recorded of a white person being killed by the Indians, although most of the settlers were in considerable dread of them.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

In the early days religious meetings were held in barns, for as yet there were no chapels in Darlington.

One summer two Christian men came in August and conducted meetings, preaching the Word of God with power. Sinners wept and some cried aloud for mercy and it was a solemn time. One pioneer, I. Henry, tells "It was a time of sealing former convictions, and humbling the stoutest-hearted sinner. I saw Capt. John Trull bathed in tears, and made my way to him, for we had always been intimate friends. We took each other by the hand, and made a vow to seek God together".

To determine exactly the origin of the Church in Darlington (Methodist) is somewhat difficult, but it is pretty certain that the preacher was seldom far behind the early settlers, perhaps coming from the same locality.

Wm. Warren Trull received his first class certificate from Toronto Normal school in 1853 and taught in various places.

In 1866 his name appears for the first time in the list of preachers Disciples of Christ Church. For more than 40 years he served his church as Preacher and as Clerk.

MARRIAGE DIFFICULTIES

As there was no regular clergyman near at hand, the law gave the magistrate power to conduct the marriage

ceremony.

The written certificate of marriage between Joseph Gerow and Parmelia Trull reads.

"Where Joseph Gerow and Parmelia Trull, both of the Township of Darlington, District of Newcastle, in the province of Upper Canada were desirous of intermarrying with each other, and there being no minister of the Church of England, living within eighteen miles of them, or either of them, they have applied to me for that purpose. Now these are to certify, that in pursuance of the powers granted by the act of the Legislature of this Province passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's Reign, that I, Alex F. Esquire, one of His Majestys' Justices of the Peace having caused the previous notice of the statutes required to be given, have this day married the said Joseph Gerow and Parmelia Trull together and they are become legally contracted to each other in marriage 19th February, 1822."

MEDICAL EXPEDIENCY

Dr. Lydia Heroine of the North Shore, or Grandmother Trull wife of John W. as she was known was a woman of wonderful endurance, tall with jet black hair and when well along in her 70's remained straight and active as in her youth. Hers was a strong character which left its mark on the settlement.

One of the heirlooms which came down through the Trull Family was a small iron pot, (which may be seen in the Bowmanville museum). It is made of thick cast iron with legs about two inches long and a handle. Connected with this pot is a story which reveals the difficulties of the pioneer days, and the resourcefulness of Grandma Trull, in this pot Grandma Trull mixed the herbs that served all medical requirements of the settlers, and accompanied her on her gratuitous missions of mercy to the sick.

Her motherly neighborly make-up together with a medical book on curative herbs, and directions in midwifery and

healing of the sick, which she brought along with their few worldly belongings. New York State caused her to be known as Doctor from Highland Creek to Cobourg. In the early days there was no Doctor between (Toronto) little York and Napanee, and here she acted as a physician to all the early inhabitants for forty miles near her home.

There were no bridges over the streams as in these days, her husband Captain John W., got her a fine saddle black mare, and frequently she could be seen on this mare swimming up and down the shore of Lake Ontario. His idea was to teach this mare to swim the swollen streams with her fair charge on the saddle.

It was related of her that she was very courageous, and allowed nothing to intervene between her and seeing her patients, Redman and pale-faced alike, on horseback, and alone, along the winding blazed trail, holding aloft a turpentine blazing pine knot by night to guide the marking, fording swollen streams in spring and fall and sitting out watchful, fateful consoling hours with her and her God the only hope of an isolated household in their hour of sorrow.

In many of the other settlements there wasn't anyone with medical skill to help the sick in the hour of need and what happened when people took sick, Mr. Hoover another pioneer made the grim answer: "We let them die and then buried them".

A FATAL EVENT

was the death of Jesse Trull, son of John and Dr. Lydia Trull.

He was the owner of one of the few schooners, which plied Lake Ontario in the early years of the 19th Century.

During the MacKenzie Rebellion of 1837, Jesse used to spirit huit Rebels across Lake Ontario in his boat to the United States shore away from the Loyalist Militia Forces.

Incidentally, it is interesting to note that Captain John C. was in the Government Loyalist Forces which were hunting the Rebels for the Hangman's Noose. He often inspected his own brother's boat before it sailed across

the lake.

When schooners appeared on the lake, transportation was no easy matter. In the absence of wharves, vessels had to lie out in the lake while farm produce was being transported to them in open boats. One of the tragedies of the early days of settlement happened when a son of John W. Trull, by the name of Jesse Trull was drowned while transferring grain from a row-boat to a schooner, near the Bowmanville Harbor.


EDUCATION

Previous to 1878 the majority of early settlers possessed but very limited education. There was always a small number whose education was even excellent; but the great bulk of the early pioneers had not enjoyed opportunities for a common education.

The state of society for many years found fault with the teaching of youth. The chances for learning had been exceedingly slender, and what with the early struggles for existence, and to hew out a home in the forest there was not the time even were there the inclination to acquire an education. Among many of the old sturdy farmers who themselves had no learning, and who had got along without much, if any, and had no books to read, there was maintained a belief that it was not only unnecessary, but was likely to have a bad effect upon their sons, disqualifying them for the duties of husbandry. If one could read, sign his own name, and cast interest, it was looked upon as quite sufficient for a farmer. But gradually there sprung up an increased desire to acquire an education and a willingness to supply the means therefor. After about seventy-five years in Durham township people now felt the need of an education, and by 1876 some 101 schools had been built.

THE CEMETERY

Death as well as Cupid hovered near by. On a gentle slope on the Trull homestead, the little Trull cemetery of some six acres is located. Here many of the first settlers in Darlington sleep their last sleep, while the winds sing a nightly requiem in the tops of the mru-




muring pines that stand like sleepless sentinels guarding the hallowed ground.

Mr. Jesse Trull, grandson of John W. Trull, created it on his farm and gathered to it a few Trull gravestones earlier located on the Capt. John Casey Trull homestead. It was further improved some years later by the clan.

Within the acreage is a second bastion, as a wrought iron fence, maples, and adjacent creek willows keep vigil over the dead.

Its location is unique. At the time of the original gravestones, there were no roads. To-day on the northern boundary is the elevated C.P.R. trackage, while at the immediate south the Broken Front road, a few rods away the 401 Highway & paralleling it the C.N.R. railway.

Near the center of the plot is a marble headstone bearing the inscription: "John W. Trull, died February 19, 1830, aged 84 years, and nearby a small stone Lydia Casey 1836". Close at hand is the resting-place of "John Casey Trull, Captain in H.M.S., born September 2, 1795, and died May 13, 1880". In all, there are twenty some stones in the Trull cemetery enclosure. Besides the name Trull, Samuel Hall's name is seen on a very old stone, on another George Shurtliff and his wife Mary J. Trull. Most recent stones are Private Albert, son of Cameron Trull, died 1927 from effects of gas in World War 1; also Louis Trull and his wife Mary Elizabeth Bowman. This cemetery marks the graves of the first of the Trulls of Darlington.

FAMILY REUNION


The first Trull family reunion was held on the old Jesse Trull homestead in 1898. Children of the third, fourth, and fifth generations were present (3rd generation being the grandparents) celebrating the landing of their ancestors at Port Darlington (Bowmanville) located on Barber's Creek, October 2nd, 1794.

Jesse Trull, then a senior member of the family read the graphic story of the coming to Darlington Township of his grandfather John W. Trull. From this developed the custom of the Trull Family yearly reunion.

Before closing it is fitting to record that John W. Trull and Lydia Casey were truly pioneers in the early development of Upper Canada, leaving a fine reputation to the subsequent generations of which this genealogy shows eight.

The Trulls, Conants and Burks perhaps came to Canada by way of Mohawk River, Lake Oneida, Oswego River to Lake Ontario, to Newark (now Niagara-on-the-Lake) to York (now Toronto), to Darlington (now Bowmanville) in the year 1794.

OUR PROGENITOR AND HIS WIFE

John W. Trull born in 1746; married in 1782 and died in 1830. He was married to Lydia Casey. Their children were Eunice, Susan, Elizabeth and Sarah Trull who was married to Wm. Hall. These children were all born in U.S.A. The Canadian born children were: John Casey, Jesse, Phoebe, Wm., and Parmelia.

John Casey Trull, first son of John W. Trull and Lydia Casey, was born September 2nd, 1795 and died in 1880. His 1st marriage was to Lydia VanCamp. They had 8 children, namely, Alexander, Almira, Jesse, Allan, Nancy, Mary Jane, Ira, and Henry. His 2nd marriage was to Maria Theresa Mosely (Munson). Their children were Casey, John, Eliza and Maria.

He served in the war of 1812 at the age of seventeen with his father, John W. Trull.

In 1830 (Sept. 2) he was commissioned a Lt. in the 1st. Regiment of the Durham Militia, by Sir John Colborne then Lt. Governor of Upper Canada, and at this time was stationed in Toronto. In 1902 John Squair visited at the home of his son Jesse Trull, and was shown this commission in which he drew a pension for this service.

During the MacKenzie Rebellion, of 1837, he received the rank of Captain under Colonel Williams, and marched from Oshawa to Toronto together with 1500 men. At a later date in the rebellion, he was stationed in Oshawa in charge of 114 men. During this period, one night at a fashionable Military Ball, he had to disperse at dawn, a duel between 2 officers, who were jealous of the same lady.

Mr. Douglas Trull of Toronto great grandson of the above Jesse Trull, now treasures his sword.

On February 15th, 1856 he was appointed Lt. Col. in the 3rd. Battalion of the Durham Militia by Sir Edmund Walker.

ALEXANDER TRULL, first son of John Casey Trull and Lydia VanCamp, was born in 1822, died in 1891, and was married to Elizabeth Rundle. Their children were James, Irvin, Alden, John H., Ira and Frank.

JAMES TRULL, first son of Alexander Trull was married to Belle McLellan. They had five children, namely, Lottie, Howard, Walter, Goldie and Hazel.

WALTER TRULL, third child of James Trull, was married to Verna Lynde, Balson, Ont. They had 3 children; Phyllis, Ruth, Ross. Phyllis was married to Evans Michael, 124 Brock St., Whitby, Ontario. They had one son, Gary Michael.

RUTH TRULL, 2nd daughter of Walter Trull, married James Davidson, Orchard Park Dr., West Hill, Ont. They had two children, Roger and Susan.

GOLDIE TRULL, fourth child of James Trull, married Walter McLellan, Toronto, Ont. They had one son, Howard, who married Catherine, Hamilton, Ont. They had 2 sons William and James, and 3 daughters, Mary, Catherine, and Nancy.

HAZEL TRULL, 5th child of James Trull, was married to Russell Collins of Whitby, Ontario. They had 3 children; Ralph, Isabelle and Robert. Ralph was married to Elsie Rasmussen, Whitby, Ont. They had no children.



ALICE G. GRANGE, 9th daughter of Dr. James Grange and Harriet Bicknell, was born in 1874 and died in 1922. She married Frank Mulford, Sacramento, California. They had 2 children. **MABEL**, 13th child of Dr. Grange was born in 1876 and died in 1959.

THE COMING OF THE LOYALISTS

September the 20, 1783 will always be remembered as Evacuation Day for the Loyalists, when 12,000 sailed from New York to Canada (Quebec), Nova Scotia and the Bahamas. Those who came to Canada wintered about Sorel in Quebec. In the spring, Major Vanalstine with his band of 400 refugees sailed up the river and landed at Adolphustown on June 16th, 1784, near the site of the present U.E.L. monument. Since that date this has been a memorable day in the county, for the permanent settlement began at this time.

In July the Townships were named: First, Kingston; second, Ernestown; third, Fredericksburg; fourth, Adolphustown; and fifth, Marysburgh.

At the same time the King issued instructions to the Governor-in-Chief, to direct the Surveyor-General to measure the lay out and give portion of land to the loyal subjects of United States who had come to Canada.

On July 24th, 1788, the Governor-general divided what was afterwards called Upper Canada into 4 districts, namely: Lunenburg, from the Ottawa River to Gananoque; Mecklenburgh, from Gananoque to the Trent River; Nassau, from the Trent River to Long Point; and Hesse, from Long Point to Lake St. Clair.

Early in 1789 the system of parcelling out the land was improved by appointing in each district a Land Board to receive and report upon applications. By November the Governor-general found opportunity for further expression of the gratitude to the Crown by giving to the Loyalists who adhered to the unity of the Empire 200 acres of land, to the sons and daughters when they became twenty-one years of age. One member of the Land Board of the Mecklenburgh district was the Hon. Richard Cartwright.

In 1791 Canada was divided into Upper and Lower Canada, by General John Graves Simcoe. In July 1792 Simcoe divided Upper Canada into counties, calling the Napanee district Lennox and Addington.

In this manner the first settlement of Loyalists in Canada was made, and the Granges intermarried with them.

ORIGIN AND GROWTH OF THE JOHN GRANGE FAMILY

John Grange and his wife Miss McElurraith lived near Ayrshire, Glasgow, Scotland. They were the parents of our pioneer John (forefather of the writer's family), Robert, Thomas, and probably others. John and Robert left the homeland in 1794 coming by way of Montreal to Syracuse, N.Y.

RECOMMENDATION:

John Grange brought with him a letter of recommendation from the minister of his parish, a document still legible and fondly treasured by his descendants at Napanee.

Colmonell 31, July, 1794,
near, Glasgow, Scotland.

That the bearer John Grange, a single and unmarried person born of creditable parents and educated in the Presbyterian Protestant religion, hath lived in this parish of Colmonell from infancy until the date hereof, behaving soberly and honestly and is free of all public scandal, or ground of church censure known to us, and may be admitted into any Christian society or congregation where God in his providence may order his lot. Given by appointment of the Kirk session is attested and in their name signed by,

Fergus Hathorn Sess.Clk.,
Ayrshire, Scotland.

IMMIGRATION TO NAPANEE:

The first flour-mill was built in Napanee in 1786, on the south side of the river because it afforded the most convenient location, that side of the river bank sloped gently to the water's edge at the foot of the fall, while the other side was rough and steep.

For years it was the leading feature of the place, and many of the prominent families of Napanee were, in one way or another, interested in its operation. After it had passed into the hands of the Hon. Richard Cartwright he began to look about for a capable mill-right to make some needed improvements and superintend the operation of the new mill, which was to be located on the Richmond side of the river, below what is now the Gibbard Furniture factory, early in 1800. Such a man he found in young John Grange, who had immigrated from Scotland in 1794 and settled in or near Syracuse, N.Y. After some correspondence Grange entered into an agreement with Mr. Cartwright to come to Napanee and be in charge of the mills. This John Grange was the progenitor of the many branches of the Grange family who for over a century have been intimately associated with the development of the town.

After concluding his engagement with Hon. Richard Cartwright, (who died in 1812) Grange purchased 200 acres of land from him, Con. 2, Lot 23, Richmond Twp. just north of Napanee, which became the Grange Homestead. At the time of the purchase he believed that he was getting the land upon which the town now stands, and claimed that, that was the understanding between them, but upon examining his title he found that a substantial reservation had been made of all the land bordering upon the river, so he was forced to build his dwelling about a mile north of the town.

Disappointed in not securing a portion at least of the waterprivilege at the falls, he developed water power, and built a sawmill upon the stream crossing his farm. This was used as an advantage for two generations for the benefit of himself and neighbours; but as the land lying along the banks was cleared the flow of water was so reduced, that it could not produce sufficient power to turn the wheel except during the spring freshets. Eventually it was abandoned, the dam was washed away, and little,

if any, trace now remains to point out the location of the first waterpower developed in the country other than that at the falls in Napanee.

MCKIMS:

James McKim and his wife immigrated from Ireland and came to United States when it was a British Colony. They made their home at Copenhagen N.Y. State, a locality lying north of Albany and east of the Hudson river, and on a direct line to Lake Champlain.

He fought in the American Rebellion 1775, and at the close of the war his regiment was stationed at a fortified frontier post on Northern Lake Champlain.

At this time their wives and families, from whom they had been separated for years, were ordered to make their way, as best they could to meet them. They wandered wearily afoot through forests and swamps, beset with great difficulties and privations, to Whitehall, on Lake Champlain, where they were met by their soldier husbands, and fathers, from whom they had been separated.

They were then conveyed in boats up the lake into Canadian territory, deprived in most cases of all the means and comforts they had once enjoyed, and resolved to hew out for themselves homes, under the British Flag, in the then wilds of Upper Canada.

While Sergeant McKim and his wife were stationed at Quebec, Nancy their eighth child was born at Sorel, 1781.

Just at what time the McKim family reached this county is not known. In the year 1786 the names of Sergeant James McKim and sons appear on the official government lists among those to whom provision supplies were granted until there was time to cultivate and clear their own lands. Sergeant McKim lived and died where he first settled, near Bath.

MARRIAGE:

The first Church of England clergyman to reside

in the county of Lennox and the second to be stationed in this part of Upper Canada was the Rev. John Langhorn, who came to Bath, Ontario, in the year 1800.

He was a pious but very eccentric man, and could be seen going about his extensive parish mounted on his pony, with a bag on his back; a broad-rimmed hat tied up at the sides, and his stockingless feet encased in low shoes resplendent with large silver buckles.

From Rev. John Langhorn's records we read that John Grange married Nancy McKim at Ernestown February 10, 1799, the attendants being, Johannes H. Buck; Wm. McKim; Hannah Sager, and Hester Lott.

To this union were born six children: James (our forefather) William, Hannah, Thomas, Margaret, and Mary.

Sergeant McKim having settled near Bath, with his family, and John Grange in Napanee in 1795, it seems reasonable to believe, Nancy being the youngest daughter of the McKim family, and perhaps her dad's favourite, no doubt, accompanied him many times to mill, in Napanee, if so, it could have been here she met her husband John Grange who was the millwright.

EDUCATION:

General John Graves Simcoe was appointed the first Lieutenant-Governor of Upper Canada in 1791. He was an ardent enthusiast upon the subject of education, so established grammer (public) schools in different districts of Upper Canada.

The first academy in Napanee was built in 1846, on a lot just north of the Western Methodist Church now known as Grace United, and was used for both public and High school.

Some short time following the opening of the new school James was head master of both public and High school, and during these years members of the Grange family were his students.

The Napanee schools employed many Grange teachers among whom ere; Helen, Catherine, Nancy Grange (daughter of James) and Minnie.

James tenure of teaching closed before his marriage to Harriet Bicknell Dec. 24, 1851, as he had prepared himself as a pharmacist and became active in his partnership with his two uncles William and Thomas Grange.

At the close of five years as druggist with his uncles he felt called to the Methodist ministry, so about 1856 he sold his interest in the drug store business to his brother John, and James. With his family he moved to Cobourg where Victoria College was then located. While he was a student there a serious epidemic broke out and James' knowledge of drugs and skill regarding them were a great blessing to the afflicted.

On the day he graduated as a minister his professors realizing his evident gift in healing urged him to a medical career. Promptly he moved to Toronto and enrolled at University of Toronto graduating in medicine therefrom in 1860, and in surgery from Columbia College N.Y. in 1861.

Returning to Napanee he was one of the leading Doctors until he left Ontario for Chattanooga Tenn. U.S. about 1890. Retiring from medicine he died of heart failure in his eighty-second year 1906.

So James grandson of the pioneer John professed from career to career, teaching in the Napanee schools, druggist, preacher, and finally physician and surgeon. Today he would be known as a medical missionary.

NAPANEE BEE:

The Napanee Bee was the 1st newspaper published in the country, in 1850.

The most extensive advertiser in the Bee was Dr James Grange, 'At the sign of the Bottle and Mortar' and accompanying his advertisement were crudely executed wood-cuts, of which pictured suffering humanity, in distressing attitudes, with outstretched arms pointing hopefully to the familiar sign on the fat, round bottle with the words 'Grange druggist'. Upon the side surrounding a representation of a mortar in the center with the wholesome motto

of "Live and let Live."

EXCERPTS FROM JAMES GRANGE SONS, ELDEST SON OF PIONEER JOHN:

Robert and John Grange brothers of Dr. James Grange were interested in the saw-mill business, so about 1860 built both saw-mill and grist-mill in Lamworth. At a later date owned the saw-mill at Forest Mills which they sold to Hugh McKnight, grandfather of Edra McKnight in 1870. (writer of Irull and Grange Family Tree).

George Shurtliffe a teacher in Napanee from Bowmanville was visited by his brother-in-law Casey Irull. While in Napanee Casey met Mary, the eldest daughter of Dr. James Grange, who was a soloist in Trinity Church. Their friendship grew and he soon took her back to Bowmanville as his bride in 1871.

CEMETERIES:

About two miles and a half south of Newburgh, and east of Napanee, Switzer's Chapel was built in 1826.

At the side of the church in the center of the cemetery is seen the tombstone marking the last resting-place of pioneer John Grange, which was erected by his sons William and Thomas. To date the inscription is very clear:

"A native of Ayrshire, Scotland who came to Canada in 1795.

A sure hope in the merits of Christ
Let me die the death of the Righteous."

His death date 1835.

At his side there is a stone with the name of James Grange his eldest son (our Grandfather) inscribed on.

We find the resting place of Nancy McKim his wife, and many of the other Grange families in the Napanee Eastern Cemetery.

THE WILLIAM TRULL FAMILY

WILLIAM TRULL was born in 1802, and married Elizabeth VanCamp, born in 1805. They had 11 children, Phoebe, Alden, Wm. Warren, Clarissa, Amelia, Lydia Margaret, Eliza Jane, Martha Anne, Alfred, Elizabeth and Linda. William Trull died in the year of 1884 and his wife Elizabeth died in 1883.



They have one child, Gregory DaRosa.

WILLIAM'S second marriage was to Blanche Clmens. There were no Children.

FLORENCE O'LEARY, daughter of Willie O'Leary, married Horrall Phillips, Rotan, Texas. They have four daughters, Caroline, Sue, Alice and Iris. 
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DARLINGTON TOWNSHIP BEFORE 1878

The C.N.Railway at present runs along the shore of Lake Ont. to Bowmanville, and the mouth of Barber's Creek is to the south of Bowmanville. The pioneer John W. Trull homestead is marked C. Trull just north of the letter K in the lake. At the present time a grandson of Casey Trull (Gordon Trull) falls heir to a portion of this property. Also Wallace McKnight a grandson of Casey Trull resides and purchased the central section of this farm. To the west of this we have the farms of Henry Trull and Jessie Trull on the Base Line. The cemetery is situated on the Base Line, south-west corner of the J. Trull farm. To the south and west of Hampton, we have the farms of Wm. Law, Alexander Trull, A.J.B. Trull, and Jas. Trull, John VanNest, and Allen Trull, who's name is lost in the fold of the page. The farm of Jesse Trull is now owned by car wreckers.

It is told by older members of the Trull family now living that Wm. Trull, son of the pioneer John W. was granted the land across the road from his brother John Casey Trull from the Crown. Mr. Fred Trull of Orono, the eldest grandson of Wm. Trull now living, relates this information, how his grandfather used to tap over 500 trees each spring, and how when the hay was cut by scythe every member of the family who was old enough to handle a rake would go out and rake the hay together, so the men could put it up in haycocks. Also that his grandfather had a schooner built on the marsh at Bowmanville and would take farm produce to Kingston, York, now Toronto and Rochester, N.Y. In their reclining years Wm. and his wife Elizabeth went to Orono, where they lived and died at the home of their son Warren Trull.




RETURNING TO MARRIAGE DIFFICULTIES:


