CAW-Chrysler aim for contract

AJAX - Negotiators for Chrysler Canada and its unionized workers here believe the two sides can hammer out a new contract without a labor disruption.

That's the word from both parties after the Canadian Auto

Workers announced Friday they'll attempt to win a new deal from Chrysler before sitting down with the remainder of the big three automakers.

The chief negotiator for unionized Chrysler workers is "a bit excited" the CAW will take on that big three carmaker first in a bid

Parents slam 'round-about' bus rides to high schools

PICKERING - Parents outraged at sending their teens to public high schools on "poorly-designed" public transit routes are demanding changes.

But it's unfair of them to aim the brunt of their anger at Pickering Transit, according to inspector Garry Coe. "The (Durham Board of Education) elected not to have school buses, not us."

Still, parent Kimberley Cox admits, "I wouldn't have quite as big a beef if there was a more direct route."

She has a "sick feeling" about sending her 14-year-old daughter to Pine Ridge Secondary School next week. That's because most students must take a bus to the GO Transit station on Bayly St. and board another bus to their school.

There is a bus stop directly in front of Dunbarton High School on Whites Rd. But those students attending Pine Ridge, located at the top of Liverpool Rd., a dead-end street, will be dropped off at either Liverpool Rd. and Finch Ave. or Liverpool Rd. and Bushmill St., depending on their route.

"It sounds like a great adventure — find your bus along with all those people going to work," says Mrs. Cox. "Are they waiting for something to happen before saying it's not such a great idea?"

Edith Welton is equally troubled by the "round-about way" buses travel to and from schools and chastises Pickering Transit for not treating students as "a priority".

But Mr. Coe reminds, "Our obligation is to get regular riders to the GO station. We've made slight modifications to try and accommodate students where time and distance are feasible. But the (GO) train is the hub of our operation."

And the board "can't do anything about re-routing or adding buses," according to communications manager Mary Brown. "It's up to Pickering Transit

Chrysler, auto workers at bargaining table

to win a new contract.

"I've been predicting Chrysler," says Larry Bauer. "It made sense to me, but you never know until the president makes the announcement."

CAW president Buzz Har- grove announced Friday the union picked Chrysler as the automaker the workers want to sit down with first because of that company's strength in the marketplace, the downsizing at General Motors and the fact Ford's been targeted by United Auto Workers in the U.S.

Chrysler spokesman Walt McCall says, "I guess it's our turn (to be the target company). It certainly wasn't anything like a surprise. Someone had to be picked."

The choice of Chrysler also means that company would be the first the CAW would strike if the two sides can't negotiate a new contract by Sept. 14, the date the current three-year deal expires.

"It's a prime target," says Mr. Bauer, who's also the president of CAW Local 444 in Windsor. "It would very quickly and very effectively be affected by a labor shutdown."

Being the target company will "certainly accelerate the pace of negotiations," Mr. McCall says. "Once the target is named, you can really focus on the matter at hand."

The CAW and the big three automakers use pattern bargaining whereby the union selects a target company to try to reach a deal with first. Any contract settlement is used as a base for negotiations with the other two carmakers. If a deal can't be hammered out with the target company, unionized workers strike it first.)

The master bargaining committees from the union and the company were to meet yesterday

afternoon to discuss a negotiating schedule.

The CAW wants pension improvements, a shorter work week, better job security, early retirement and increased wages. Mr. Bauer reports. (The average hourly base rate is \$18.20 an hour.)

He's "very confident" a contract can be reached without a labor disruption.

"In 1990, the same bargaining unit for the union negotiated a good agreement with Chrysler with no labor stoppage. I'm confident we can do it again."

Mr. McCall is more guarded in his optimism, saying, "We did it last time. It won't come easily, but I think it's doable."

Executive members of Ajax CAW Local 1090 have joined other union officials at the bargaining table at the Delta Chelsea Inn in Toronto.

Chrysler was last selected as the target company in 1987 when workers struck for two weeks before an agreement was reached.

to set the best routes...The board had to get out of busing simply because of the cost."

Board chair and Pickering trustee Louise Farr recognizes parents' frustration, but contends, "People are expecting the same level of service (as provided by school buses). We never promised that...These are difficult times."

Earlier this year, the board eliminated free bus service in those municipalities where a full public transit system exists. It will save the board almost \$525,000 a year by cutting busing in Pickering alone.

(Pickering students were at first exempt from that decision because the board didn't realize Pickering Transit could provide access to Pine Ridge and Dunbarton. Bus passes are available at schools at no charge to students who live at least 3.2 kilometres from their school — for the month of September only — because the board's decision to switch to public transit came in late June.)

Monthly bus passes, which can

be used seven days a week, cost \$38. But where they can be purchased is among the kinks that must still be worked out this month.

In a letter to parents, the board said the passes could be purchased at schools. But Dunbarton principal Jim Robb says he's not prepared to collect about \$20,000 a month in the sale of passes to more than 500 students, even if he had the staff to do so.

Nor does the board know how it will deal with Pickering Transit's plan to shut down service several school days as a result of the New Democratic Party's social contract.

Finally, it will take "more than a few weeks" to work out any problems Pickering Transit may face when at least 1,000 students board its buses beginning Tuesday, warns Mr. Coe.

He expects that number will decrease in October when "some will buy passes and others will find other ways of getting to school. I don't think September will be a good indicator."



Local woman calls for Bosnia help

DURHAM - Despite the distressing stories of atrocities and genocide coming out of Bosnia-Hercegovina, a local woman says there's been a marked lack of interest and donations from Durham residents.

Bosnia-Hercegovina are linked provinces in the former Yugoslavia which have been the focus of a civil war involving Serbs, Croatians and the Bosnian Moslems.

Ajax resident Rashida Shabonovic comes from Bosnian Moslem roots, though her family, including five sisters, lives in the area between Pickering and Oshawa.

Because of her background, she's taken a more personal interest in the Bosnia situation. For one thing, she has relatives still living there and she worries about them.

"In our family alone we have lost touch with 10 people." And, contacting them is near impossible. "The Red Cross says their hands are tied."

In order to take part in relief efforts out of Canada, she has had to go far afield. Ms Shabonovic says she knows of relief efforts organized out of St. Catharines and Toronto, but little or nothing is happening in Durham.

The last major effort in the area was a drive last fall by Rotary clubs from Scarborough to Cobourg, which resulted in hundreds of tons of blankets and clothes being flown to refugee camps in the former Yugoslavian province.

"Local involvement is minimal. People feel they have given a lot to local groups and feel their resources are strained."

She also speculates that, because the conflict is a distant one and fairly complicated,

Durham residents are perhaps less sympathetic than they might otherwise be.

Nevertheless, Ms Shabonovic says there is a desperate and ongoing need for supplies.

A brief history

DURHAM - While Moslems are not in a majority, they are the largest cultural group in Bosnia, comprising approximately 45 per cent of the population.

It was the Ottoman Empire that first brought the religion of Islam into Bosnia-Hercegovina in the late 15th century. During Turkish rule, many of the Slavic inhabitants of the area were gradually converted to the Islamic religion.

By the late 1800s, the remnants of the Ottoman Empire were being driven out of Europe and in 1878, Bosnia-Hercegovina was taken over and handed to Austria to administer. At the end of the First World War, Bosnia became part of an independent kingdom that was then named Yugoslavia in 1929.

At the end of the Second World War, it was made a separate republic in the Yugoslavia federation under communist rule.

Over the next few decades, there was an influx of other cultural groups, including Serbians and Croatians, into the predominantly Moslem area. Communist rule in Yugoslavia, which discouraged religion, kept age-old resentments between the cultural groups in check.

However once Communist rule was lifted, the old conflicts and bitterness came to the fore and it gradually deteriorated into the civil war of today.

While many Bosnians have left the area altogether, she says many have decided to stay, because "That's all they have and all they have ever known."

And for people who remain, life is not easy. Even those who are not under attack are at risk simply from living in unsanitary conditions, since there's a lack of clean water, no electricity, and so on.

Ms Shabonovic says, for Durham residents interested in doing something practical, there's a Canadian medical relief effort being run out of Weston, Ontario by a Moslem doctor who gathers funds, buys medical supplies in Europe and then travels to Bosnia.

Dr. Rashida Alvi has already been to Bosnia, where she has bought two ambulances to act as mobile medical units, and has traveled to some of the more remote areas where even the Red Cross fears to tread.

Tax receipts will be issued for donations of \$20 and over.

Another contribution local residents can make is a political one: "They should be bombarding their MPs with letters and petitions to do something about the problem there. Bosnians are basically unarmed with no way of protecting what they have left."

"Right now no one is going in there to unarm the Serbs, who have a great deal of arms as well as links for more supplies, which keeps the war going," says Ms Shabonovic. "And things have got to be done to stop the inhumanities in the area."



Can you help?

The people of Bosnia-Hercegovina need your help.

The province in the former Yugoslavia is going through a painful period with factions from all sides of the civil war battling each other.

Emotions run high on all sides of this conflict and unquestionably there have been atrocities committed by all parties involved. But often it is the unarmed civilians who suffer the most.

The United Nations peacekeepers there are taking a neutral, hands-off approach to the conflict, which means many of the atrocities, including a systematic rounding up of villagers and the brutal rape of many Moslem women, are carrying on unabated.

And western countries with the power to intervene, such as the U.S., have refused to get involved.

As a result, the bloodshed goes on.

Durham residents have been modest in their sympathy toward the residents of Bosnia. Though the conflict has been growing more bitter as time passes, we in this region have been sitting on our hands.

Only one major relief effort has taken place in the area recently. That was last fall when Rotary Clubs from Scarborough to Cobourg gathered hundreds of tons of blankets and clothes and sent them to the residents of Bosnia.

But that was almost a year ago and the need in Bosnia is no less.

What can we do for people involved in such a remote conflict?

You can read up on the conflict so you understand the issues. Then send letters or faxes, or organize petitions to your MP asking for some way for Canada to become more involved to help solve the problem.

There are also relief efforts you can contact, including that of Dr. Rashida Alvi, a Moslem doctor based in Weston, Ontario, who has set up two mobile emergency medical units in Bosnia. You can call (416) 240-0570 for more information.

You could also organize your own local relief effort.

It's simply no excuse to say, it's too far away, or too complicated, or none of your business. Because human suffering, wherever it happens in the world, is our business, and we all have a responsibility to relieve it.

Gentlemen, I don't care where you go or what you do, as long as it is with your own money. But, when you pay the bill with taxpayer dollars, we have a right to know where every dollar is spent, before you spend it.

Therefore, the automatic budget allotment for seminars must

be eliminated. A by-law must be enacted stating... "Permission to attend a seminar would be considered only AFTER the purpose of the seminar, along with the daily program and the cost, have been fully provided, disclosed and discussed, with opportunity for public input, at a public council meeting, as the first item on the agenda." (And, not in "other business" at the end of a meeting, nor at an "in camera" meeting.)



Floating bar draws fire

PICKERING - Residents here are trying to sink a licensed floating restaurant proposed for Frenchman's Bay.

The Primrose, a 136-foot dredger docked at Port Pickering Marina, is planned as a restaurant by James McKean, owner of the marina and the ship. He intends to lease the vessel to restaurateur Al Nassar, who would operate the eatery.

About 30 neighboring residents of the waterfront community attended a five-hour hearing held by the Liquor Licence Board of Ontario last Friday. Most of the residents were in objection to a liquor licence being granted to the restaurant. The board is expected to make a decision in about a month.

Michael Figol, attorney for licence applicant Mr. Nassar, says his client plans to create "a nice family restaurant" catering to both boaters and the neighborhood. Mr. Nassar has previous experience operating a licensed restaurant in Toronto, Mr. Figol adds.

Concerns cited by licence opponents include noise, abuse to the environment and incompatibility with a residential neighborhood, says ward councillor Eileen Higdon, who adds she attended the LLBO hearing as an "observer". She describes the meeting as "a soap opera; a riot."

Some of the residents are tired of private parties in the area, "vomit on

lawns" and discarded drinking glasses, she says. The day before the hearing, an anonymous flyer opposing the floating bar was circulated in the community.

Zoning to allow the dredger to operate as a restaurant is already in place, says Mrs. Higdon.

Objections by residents are nothing more than the "Not In My Backyard Syndrome," maintains Mr. McKean, who adds he's confident the liquor licence will be granted.

Mr. McKean himself objected to a proposed licensed restaurant in his community several years ago, but he says that was a different situation. "The whole neighborhood was against it. It was in a house — a private house. It was a rooftop bar."

Muscular Dystrophy telethon this weekend

AJAX-PICKERING - Most kids can live without TV on Labour Day. Some can't.

That's the message behind the 24th Annual Labour Day Telethon for Muscular Dystrophy, which can be viewed on local cable TV stations this weekend.

More than 100,000 Canadians are affected by muscular dystrophy (MD), a genetic neuromuscular disorder which destroys motor nerve cells and weakens muscles.

Money raised in the telethon goes toward research into the causes and possible cure for more than 40 neuromuscular disorders. It also funds education, client services and other programs for families affected by MD.

Organizers hope to top last year's tally of \$3.6 million. Viewers are asked to call a phone number which will appear on their TV

screen during the telecast. People who are out of town or away from their TV sets are asked to call 1-800-567-CURE.

Celebrity hosts include skater Kurt Browning, while entertainment will be provided by Michael Burgess, The Good Brothers, Randy Bachman, Bobb Curtola and Coda The West. Viewers will also see highlights from the Jerry Lewis Telethon in Las Vegas and will receive updates from other shows across Canada.

Since 1987's discovery of the gene for Duchenne MD, a fatal disorder marked by wasting and weakness of the muscles controlling body movement in young boys, researchers have concentrated their


efforts on a potential treatment or cure. They're now testing a drug which may inhibit or slow the progression of Duchenne MD.

In 1992, a Canadian scientist and his Ottawa-based team identified the gene responsible for Myotonic Dystrophy, the most common neuromuscular disorder. This year, researchers discovered the gene responsible for the inherited form of ALS (amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease).

Arson suspected in Pickering house fire

PICKERING - An early-morning fire that destroyed a vacant house in north Pickering yesterday is being investigated as suspicious.

Arson had not been confirmed at press time Thursday, according to fire prevention officer Capt. Ron Morgan. The Pickering Fire Department was investigating the blaze and had not yet called the Ontario Fire Marshall's Office, which probes arson cases.

The property, at 3920 Brock Rd., north of Hwy. 7, is owned by the federal government.

Pickering firefighters battled the blaze for about five hours. There were no injuries.

Flames were already through the roof of the empty house when firefighters arrived on scene at 2:15 a.m., says Capt. Morgan.

Loss of the home is estimated at \$80,000.
