Pickering resident calls for 'citizens' revolt against nuclear plant

PICKERING — A Pickering woman is looking for other town residents interested in starting a "citizens' revolt" against the Pickering nuclear station.

"A lot of people are talking about somehow fighting the nuclear plant and somehow getting it shut down," says Sally McLeod. "You just go to a soccer game with your kids and that's what the parents are talking about."

When Mrs. McLeod moved to Pickering about 10 years ago, she wasn't worried about living so close to a nuclear station.

"You figure that they're the experts. Everybody tells you it's safe technology. That faith in the experts is now totally eroded."

Most of that erosion has taken place over the past few years, she says, as the plant has been plagued

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MP lauds probe into gas pricing

The establishment of a probe into the pricing practices of oil companies in Canada has pumped up a local MP who's been campaigning to ease motorists' gas pains.

Federal Industry Minister John Manley announced Friday after meeting with provincial consumer ministers in Regina that a working group of government officials, oil industry representatives and consumers will investigate gas pricing practices.

"This is a very positive step on a national scale taken by the minister," Pickering-Ajax-Uxbridge MP Dan McTeague says. "I hope this examina-

tion will provide Canadians with some answers for the sudden and significant gas price increases they witnessed across the country this summer."

Mr. McTeague had introduced a private member's bill in the last Parliament calling on the oil industry to justify price increases.

The bill, which received second reading, died when the election was called.

"It's vital that the oil industry be scrutinized to uncover the reasons for inflated gas prices at particular times of the year," Mr. McTeague says. "Canadians deserve protection from being taken at the pumps and this protection must come from their govern-

ments."

He charges the oil industry is practising predatory pricing, reducing competition and "the deliberate elimination of independent gasoline retailers."

Ontario Consumer and Commercial Relations Minister David Tsubouchi says, "We look forward to the results which should lead to a better understanding of how pricing practices are undertaken by the (oil) industry."

Mr. Tsubouchi wants the federal government to look into the "perception on the part of consumers in Ontario that the big petroleum compa-

by spills, unscheduled shutdowns, licensing problems and a series of critical reports on its operations. The most recent review in August concluded four reactors at Pickering need to be taken out of service indefinitely to allow Ontario Hydro to concentrate on running the other half of the station properly.

Mrs. McLeod maintains the community has reached the end of its rope with bad

news about the station.

"We want a shutdown of the entire thing. We want them out of the community. They're gone." She's particularly irritated over the length of time it's taking Hydro to organize the public meeting to discuss the situation promised in August by Hydro nuclear division head Carl Andognini. Hydro officials now say the forum may be held by the end of this year.

"Why do we need three months to call together the people of this town? It's hap-

pening now. If you can't come to us right now we will gather ourselves." Mrs. McLeod describes the delay as "arrogance" on Hydro's part.

She maintains arrogance and lack of interest in the public's concerns have been typical of Hydro. As an example, she cited a recent Saturday morning in Kinsmen Park when parents attending their children's soccer games were frightened by the sound of an alarm and loudspeakers at the nearby station. Nobody could figure out what was going on

and parents were wondering whether they should take their children and leave.

"Somebody phoned over and the nuclear plant had no idea what it was about," she says, noting no one from the station ever called back to explain the situation as promised.

Mrs. McLeod believes it's up to citizens to take on Hydro because the Town, Province and federal government all have vested interests in the continued operation and success of Pickering's nuclear

station. The Town needs the grant-in-lieu-of-taxes it gets for having the plant here, she notes, while Ottawa is protecting overseas sales of the CANDU reactor system the Pickering plant is based on.

"It's so obvious. If they have to abandon this plant, how will they be able to make

a sale anywhere? That's what the agenda is here. That's what's so scary about it."

Mrs. McLeod is inviting anyone interested in helping fight the nuclear station to call her at 420-3159.

Her hope is to gather enough interest to hold a public meeting.

nies are not being fair at the pumps."

The investigation should ensure fair competition and consumers won't have to "put up with the roller coaster pricing practices which seem to occur mainly on long summer weekends," Mr. Tsubouchi adds.

His communication's adviser, Debra McCain, says, "Most of the implementation issues (for the working group) have to be worked out and decided."

She doesn't know when a final report will be prepared.

The next steps are to set up the committee, decide who will sit on it and when it will meet.

"It's a fairly significant coup getting this far," Ms. McCain says. "The minister felt this is larger than an Ontario issue. It's a national issue that needs a national solution."

She notes, "It's the very first time consumers in Canada have had the opportunity to be involved in a process like this. It's an opportunity for consumers to (a) have some input and (b) present some transparency to gas pricing."

"Whenever the Competition Bureau does investigate, it's mostly in-camera and a report is produced. Take it or leave it."

"This process will involve consumers," Ms. McCain says.

Teachers' union applauds new contract

The union representing 2,400 public elementary school teachers in Durham is recommending acceptance of a new contract which "reflects today's society".

That message comes from Ontario Public School Teachers' Federation, Durham district co-president Bill Butcher after a tentative collective agreement was reached with the Durham Board of Education.

Teachers are scheduled to ratify the deal Sept. 24. The board will ratify it several days later.

"We're very pleased with the contract. It's a fair contract," believes Mr. Butcher, who's prohibited from releasing its details before ratification.

Teachers have been working without a contract since August, 1996.

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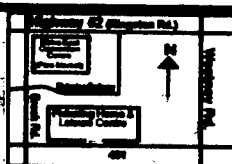

Auction aids in Creating Futures

Pickering event this Sunday aims to add to \$12-million fund-raising goal

Each year, September marks the time when many exciting things happen in Durham and this September is no different.

This month marks the beginning of the final stages in the Creating Futures Durham College and University Centre Fund Campaign.

In 1995, with reduced government funding, Durham College was faced with a dilemma. How would it successfully continue its state-of-the-art technology and teaching methods and grow the Durham University Centre concept while maintaining traditionally high educational standards of the college? An innovative solution to funding these initiatives would be needed.

In February, 1996 a feasibility study concluded the people of Durham Region would support a \$12-million, fund-raising effort by the college to further develop two key areas: program development-information technology and scholarships and bursaries for students in need. With this information came the birth of the Creating Futures Campaign in April, 1996.

With just four months to go before the end of the campaign effort on Dec. 31, the pace is at a feverish rate to reach the \$12-million mark. To date, \$8.5 million has been committed to the campaign.

Out of that total goal, \$1 million has been raised for the students-in-need portion of the campaign and was matched by the Ontario government to make a total of \$2 million for students in need.

This money will be put in a trust fund, enabling the college to allocate more funds to these students through the use of annual scholarships and bursaries.

In a bid to bring community involvement from across the region, during the last stretch, special event fund-raisers are in the works. Oshawa, Bowmanville, Uxbridge, Whitby, Ajax and Pickering have been asked to officially proclaim Sept. 21-28 as Durham College and University Centre Week in the region. The councils of Ajax and Pickering are in full support.

On Sunday, Sept. 21, the Town of Ajax and Town of Pickering Committee of the Creating Futures Durham College and University Centre Fund Campaign are holding a Gala Silent and Live Auction at the Pickering Recreation Complex. Ken Shaw of CFTO-TV hosts the event and Regional Councillor Rick Johnson will act as auctioneer.

Ajax and Pickering businesses and individuals have already started to show their support toward post-secondary education in Durham Region by generously donating auction items such as autographed Blue Jays and Raptors paraphernalia, full-year gym memberships, tickets and hotel accommodation for a weekend for two in Ottawa, and much more. Previewing for the event will start at 6 p.m. and the silent and live auction will take place between 7 p.m. and 10 p.m.

"I am excited about the support received to date from local retailers and restaurants," said Beth Wilson, chairman of the Ajax and Pickering General Community Committee.

"We still need additional products to make this auction a success. A gala auction is a perfect way for business-

More time in class rates an A

The Education Improvement Commission, asked to deliver a report to the Education Ministry on the future of schooling in the province, has brought forward the Road Ahead, a document which calls for radical changes.

This does not please teachers, nor does it please the unions which represent them.

But for parents and students, the Road Ahead offers a blueprint to help make Ontario's young people competitive among their peers around the world.

The most significant thing about the Road Ahead is its call for two more weeks of school for elementary students and three more weeks for secondary students.

That, in itself signals a desire to take much more seriously the education of our youth.

In several Canadian provinces, students attend school for 200 days a year. In Germany and Japan, students are in class for more than 210 days a year. In Ontario, it's a paltry 185 days per year.

The three to five weeks less per year spent receiving classroom instruction adds up to more than a full YEAR to a year-and-a-half less education over the course of a student's grade school career. Consider that fact for a moment.

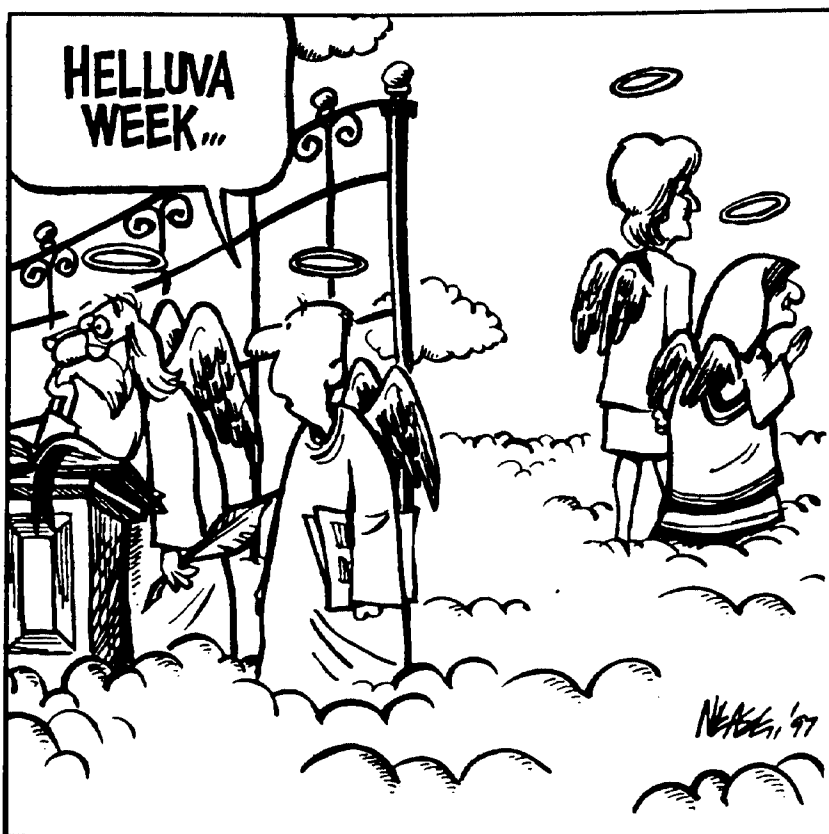
It's not hard to understand, therefore, why Ontario students don't fare well when judged across Canada and fare even less well when compared internationally with their counterparts.

If Ontario is to take its rightful place as leader in Canada and as one of the top places in the world in which to live and work, our education system must again become world class.

If that means more classroom time and a more intense learning environment, then we welcome it.

Teachers, who stand to lose several weeks' vacation time if the Road Ahead recommendations are agreed to and passed by the Tory government, will not likely accept this without a fight.

But, in this instance, what's good for our children must carry the day.

The fact families need two incomes to survive in Canada today comes as no shock at all when viewed as the result of Canada's 'exponential taxation of everything' system.

Living proof that anything's possible

Nelson Bond is a source of inspiration to anyone with a dream and the courage to pursue it.

The 51-year-old Ajax resident who lost his sight to undetected glaucoma four years ago put several years worth of weight training and several months of long-distance running into fulfilling an ambition — to compete in a triathlon. His dream came true near Burlington Saturday.

He took part in the Midland-Walwyn Triathlon, competing in the shorter-distance Friendship Wave event for newcomers to the sport.

No, Nelson didn't win the event. He finished well back in the pack of 20 or so competitors.

But, that doesn't matter. He gave it his best shot in a physically demanding sport. And, he got self-satisfaction and the admiration of hundreds of well wishers and interested spectators who witnessed the event at Gulliver's Lake and Park, north of Burlington.

Teresa Nowell-Simpson, his training partner who also served as Nelson's guide for the triathlon, says the event was a "wonderful" outing from start to finish. It was also an emotional experience for those who saw Nelson gut it out to the end of the 200-metre swim, 10-kilometre bike and 2.5-kilometre run in a time of 39 minutes, 55 seconds.

"The people there were thrilled and really cheering for him," says Teresa. "After he had finished it, a lot of tears were shed. He was thrilled and I was thrilled that he completed it."

Nelson is living proof that all things are possible for people willing to meet challenges head-on. Society is too quick to tell people, especially those with physical challenges, what they can't achieve.

"People say you shouldn't do it because you're going to hurt yourself," says Nelson. "People think you should be in a closet your entire life."

Not Nelson. He's worked out three times a week at the Ajax Community Centre weight room for the past four years. In that time, he has won the support and encouragement of his fellow weight room devotees.

"He's an inspiration to a lot of people in here," notes Teresa, the weight room supervisor at the community centre. "He motivates them by what they see him do."

This past weekend's triathlon is only the beginning for Nelson. He's already making plans to compete again next year.

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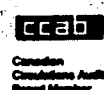

Unauthorized street mural sparks debate in Oshawa

'Highway to Heaven' design on building contravenes Oshawa bylaw

OSHAWA - The controversial "Highway to Heaven" mural in downtown Oshawa remains in artistic limbo.

Artist Inga Bennett's creation on the wall of a building on the southwest corner of Simcoe and John streets was 75 per cent complete when City officials informed her in late July it was in violation of a municipal bylaw.

She was told by City officials she needed a letter of permission from the building's landlord and council's approval for the mural to remain.

But so far, no action has been taken by the artist.

No letters have been written or requests for approval made, says Ms. Bennett, who says the bylaw which requires council approval for murals "doesn't make sense."

"More freedom should be given to people to create," she says. "I have a

vision that Oshawa could be sort of like Paris, with lots of artists in the streets - more tourism rather than relying on GM."

Although Ms. Bennett told This Week she expects to write the City asking that the mural be allowed to stay, the issue of landlord permission is more complex, she says.

The building's owner passed away earlier this year and getting permission from the estate is complicated, says Ms. Bennett, adding the entire process to ensure the mural's survival "is turning out to be a pain in the you-know-where."

City officials say Ms. Bennett's actions will determine the immediate future of the mural.

"Basically, it's in her hands," says Jerry Conlin, manager, bylaw enforcement for the City of Oshawa. "It can't go on forever."

Mr. Conlin says the City will likely meet with Ms. Bennett before the end of September "to see what course of action will be taken."

The artist hopes she'll get the green light to complete the mural.

"If I'm allowed to finish it, it will be stunning," says Ms. Bennett. "It is making people happy looking at it. It's uplifting."

City spends on building repairs

Oshawa expected to approve \$300,000 in upgrades on City buildings

OSHAWA - Fixing the roof at Donevan Recreation Complex heads a list of repairs slated to be done to City buildings, according to a council committee.

The Community Services Committee is recommending council approve \$300,000 in maintenance upgrades to selected proper-

ties.

The committee picked six projects, including \$138,000 to fix Donevan's roof, from a condition audit of 98 of the City's buildings and structures.

The audit recommends the City spend more than \$1.6 million on 175 upgrades in 1997.

Donevan is in need of "some immediate repairs," says a City report written by Stephen Bedford, community services commissioner.

The entrance vestibule at Centennial Pool needs \$47,000 in structural repairs, while \$45,000 is earmarked for repairs to uneven

walkways, damaged sidewalks and broken curbs at 19 locations in the City.

In addition, \$23,500 has been set aside to fix a number of leaky roofs at nine buildings; \$19,900 will be used to upgrade or repair fire alarm systems, fire separations and emergency and exit lighting at 12 City buildings; and \$25,000 will be used for structural investigations and some repairs to 11 buildings.

The proposed projects, if approved by council, will correct or investigate 60 of the 175 recommendations made during the condition audit of City properties, the report says.

Chief librarian Nancy Harsanyi said equipment that can't be used will be offered to other libraries in the region or sold.

Chatter Rings the latest toy craze

All it takes is excellent hand-eye coordination, patience and perseverance

An understanding of physics wouldn't hurt either.

Chatter Rings, alias Gyrating Rings, is little more than a 10-inch stainless steel ring containing five smaller finger-size rings but it's making big waves among both kids and the toy industry.

It's very popular with kids, says Adam Beder, marketing manager for Spin Master Toys of North York.

"I can't believe it; it's unbelievable."

Spin Master Toys, the company that introduced Devil Sticks, Di-ablo, Grow-Things Dinosaurs and Earth Buddies to the world, is now channelling a lot of its marketing energy into this latest craze which, Mr. Beder says, is taking North America by storm.

Although simple in design, the toy requires an enormous amount of practice in order

to keep the five smaller rings in motion, which can spin at 1,000 r.p.m., as the user performs various tricks with the larger hoop. Gravity, momentum, energy, and the position of the larger ring are keys to this complex plaything. "It's addictive," says Mr. Beder. "It's a game of skill and it grabs you. It provides you with endless challenges."

Over the past year more than a million of the spinning, twirling, vibrating units have sold worldwide including in Australia, New Zealand and Hawaii. And although Chatter Rings can already be found here, Mr. Beder says the company hasn't yet officially launched or introduced the toy to the Canadian market.

Currently, Spin Master is negotiating with various toy distributors to carry Chatter Rings in its stores and, soon, a new television commercial will air, giving many people their first glimpse at the latest toy fad.

But unlike Devil Sticks, Mr. Beder

says, Chatter Rings require a special marketing effort so people can witness for themselves why the trinket is so popular.

"You have to wow someone not just let (the toy) sit on a shelf," he says. "The company has hired kids to demonstrate the rings to customers at stores carrying them. But with the...very strong regional demand already shown in Toronto and Durham we will no longer require the toy be demonstrated in the stores."

Among some of the tricks competent Chatter Ring users can perform include Loop Da Loop, Walking the Dog, Nose Dive and a host of others. As the person becomes more experienced the tricks are almost endless, says Mr. Beder.

Anyone wanting to learn more about Chatter Rings before they go out and buy the toy, which costs somewhere between \$12 to \$15, can visit Spin Master's website at <http://www.spinmaster.com>.

First there were Pogs, then Devil Sticks and virtual pets. The latest craze set to sweep Canada are Chatter Rings, which require skill and plenty of practise. A Toronto-based toy company is predicting huge demand for this latest toy and is currently negotiating with distributors to make it available in Durham and other outlying regions.

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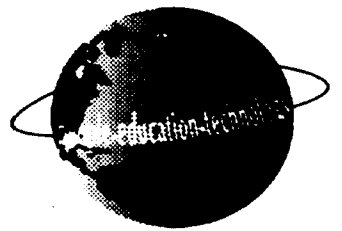
