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MENTAL HEALTH Highs and lows for Derrick

Derrick Tully knows heights and depths no mountaineer or deep sea diver could ever imagine.

Unless, of course, those adventures happen to suffer from manic depression, an illness that can be every bit as dangerous as climbing Mount Everest or diving miles below the ocean's surface.

The 31-year-old Durham man knew he was ill even before his employer told him. "You go seek whatever help you have to, or else!" It was the rainbow-coloured man he saw floating high above the factory floor of the plastics plant where he worked in Pickering that tipped him off.

"I knew I was hallucinating," he says quietly. "I tried to ignore it."

That was eight years ago and a time in his life that he describes as "pure hell." After a short-term disability leave from his job followed by long-term disability that provides him today with 70 per cent of his 1990 pay, Mr. Tully openly shares his experiences of the illness that plagues him.

"I try to think of myself as being emotionally enhanced," he says with a wry smile. "It's better than saying I'm mentally ill."

The best way he can describe manic depression and how it affects him is to say that it makes his emotions "go haywire."

"It's extreme," he says, "whether it's creative writing that I've done that was good or overspending which was bad. When I'm depressed, I don't eat at all and when I'm manic I eat all the time."

As is common for people with a mental illness, an accurate diagnosis was not made right away. He now knows he has rapid cyclers manic depression with about 40 per cent of his mood swings mixing in with the characteristics of the other.

"I'll get the agitation that you're

Pickering man charged following crash

Police pursuit ends in fatality

An Oshawa family is in "total devastation" after a high-speed police chase which claimed the life of an innocent man and rekindled debate about the need for pursuits.

John Michael Gibbons, 47, was killed early Sunday after a pickup truck being pursued by Durham Regional Police sped into a busy Manchester intersection and slammed into the 1986 Cadillac, driven by the father of six.

Durham Regional Police said the pursuit — which lasted about two minutes — was launched after officers responded to a "domestic situation."

About 1:30 a.m. a 32-year-old woman showed up at the Port Perry police station, unmanned at that hour, and made a panicked call on an emergency hotline.

"She was hysterical and fearing for her life," Sergeant Jim Grimley said.

Police were told the woman had dropped her parents off at home following a dinner when she was confronted by her estranged husband at a nearby gas station.

The call was one of three police received regarding the incident, Sgt.

Grimley said, adding a bystander also phoned 911.

Two units were dispatched and officers arrived at the Port Perry police station just as the 35-year-old suspect fled in the pickup, Sgt. Grimley said.

He said police pursued the 1993 Ford at high speeds west on Hwy. 7A to Manchester, where it entered the intersection at Hwy. 12 and rammed into the car driven by Mr. Gibbons, which was southbound.

"The vehicle was travelling at excessive speeds and went through the intersection, through the red light and essentially T-boned the car," said Leslie Chapin, acting director of the province's Special Investigations Unit, which probes all civilian deaths or serious injuries involving police.

The SIU has identified two "subject" officers and one "witness" officer as part of its investigation into how police handled the pursuit.

Manchester resident Cliff Branton said he and a friend were in his King Street driveway listening to

the car radio when "I saw red lights coming across" Hwy. 7A.

"I followed the lights and then I saw a car in the air. I saw the pickup go into the ditch," said Mr. Branton, who did not witness the collision itself but rushed to the scene.

"I was right there and the truck was in the ditch and one officer was

tending to a guy in the Cadillac, which was on a hill," he said. "I didn't know anyone had died until the next day."

Mr. Gibbons and his wife, Lorna, 35, were returning home from Casino Rama, in Orillia at the time of the collision. Both were rushed to the

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Durham schools get their share of top-up funding

The region's two school boards will receive additional funding for school maintenance and repairs beginning next year under recent changes to the Province's funding formula.

Education and Training Minister Dave Johnson Friday outlined details of the amendments to the government's funding model announced by Premier Mike Harris Nov. 6.

Beginning in the 1999-2000 school year, boards across the province will receive a 20-per cent top-up in operating funds designed to recognize that some schools run at below capacity. Boards will also receive additional funding to reflect the actual size of their schools, a revision designed to recognize schools with

unique design features.

In total, the Durham District School Board will get an additional \$2,116,565, while the Durham Catholic District School Board will receive another \$519,525.

"The 20-per cent top-up for schools at less than full capacity is another long-term, ongoing investment available to boards which decide, in consultation with their communities, that they wish to continue to operate schools which are not completely full," Mr. Johnson said.

"Now, for example, schools at 70 per cent will be funded as though they were at 90 per cent."

Mr. Johnson also announced the Dec. 31 deadline for school boards to finalize accommodation deci-

sions has been adjusted. School boards can now revise their accommodation plans every year as part of their annual planning

process.

"This permanent change to the process, in addition to the long-term funding solutions announced by Premier

Harris one week ago, provides boards with additional time, resources and flexibility that will allow them to avoid unnecessary school

closures," Mr. Johnson said.

Officials from the region's two school boards could not be reached for comment.

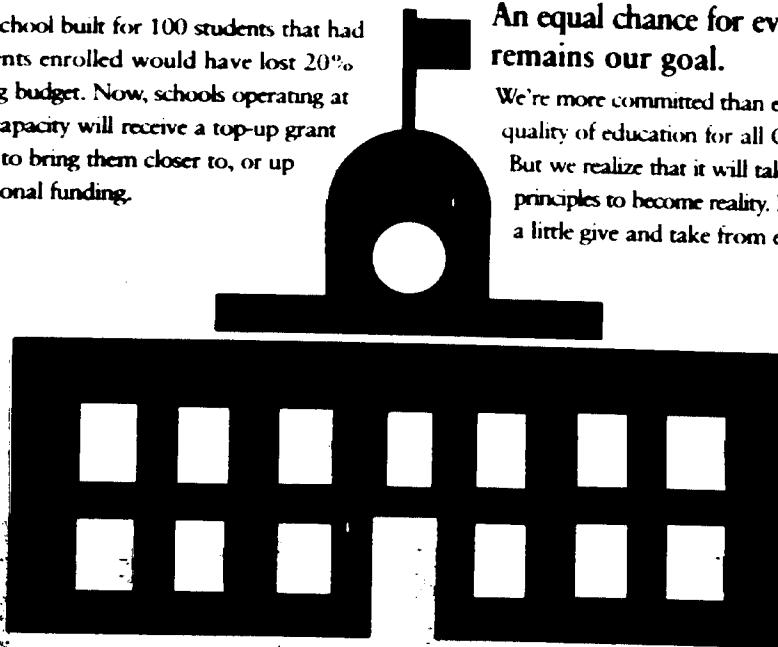

SIU clears Durham police in double fatality

A police officer who was following a stolen van when it crashed killing two suspects at no point launched a chase, mindful of public safety, the Special Investigations Unit has concluded.

Jeremy Arsenault, 22, and Deon Hobbs, 28, both of Oshawa, were killed Oct. 30 when the van they were in raced through a stop sign on a residential street and slammed into a car driven by a 62-year-old woman, who was seriously injured.

The SIU, which investigates all civilian deaths or serious injuries involving police, released its report yesterday on the double fatality, clearing the three officers involved in the events leading up to the crash.

"It is apparent that the police officers' actions did not cause the death of Mr. Arsenault or Mr. Hobbs, nor did their actions cause the injuries suffered by the driver of the southbound vehicle or the third occupant of the van," SIU Acting Director Leslie Chapin said at a news conference.

Ms. Chapin said eyewitnesses "confirmed" that Sergeant Steve Ross was not chasing the van as it sped west along Marion Avenue, before going through a stop sign at Gibbons Street and striking the southbound car.

Prior to the crash, Constable Jerry Dionne spotted the three men — William Woods, 19, of Whitby, survived the crash — getting into the van and driving north on Nipigon Street at 9:20 a.m.

The two deceased were suspects in a string of residential break-and-enters, police sources said.

After spotting the van, the undercover officer requested assistance and followed the suspects in an unmarked vehicle, until he was "delayed by traffic" and lost sight of it, Ms. Chapin said.

Moments later, Sgt. Ross, who was responding to the area and was travelling east on Marion Avenue, observed the van at Park Road.

"The officer, in an attempt to stop the van, pulled his cruiser across the northbound lane of Park Road and activated his cruiser's emergency

lights," said Ms. Chapin.

She said the van — reported stolen Oct. 13 from an address on Linton Road in Ajax — cut around the cruiser and sped west along Marion Avenue, with the officer following behind.

"He (Sgt. Ross) told SIU investigators he elected not to engage in a pursuit as it was a residential area with an elementary school nearby."

Ms. Chapin said the third "witness" officer, Sgt.

Gary Greenley, only arrived at the scene seconds after the impact and had no role in the collision.

Ms. Chapin said SIU investigators were unable to confirm the exact speed of the stolen van when it crashed but she noted the speedometer was frozen at 90 km-h.

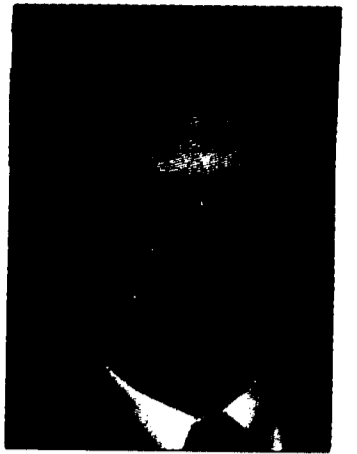
It is believed Mr. Arsenault was the driver.

Police Chief Kevin McAlpine said the SIU's report supported his depart-

ment's position all along there was no pursuit prior to the crash and said the officers involved followed proper police procedure.

"Irrespective of the fact that our people did their job professionally, it is still a tragedy whenever young people are killed," he said.

Ms. Chapin also praised the police force and the officers involved for their "exemplary co-operation" with the SIU investigation.

Coping with manic depression an ongoing challenge

supposed to experience during the depression phase when I'm manic and am a powder keg waiting to explode," he calmly explains, pointing to a red scar on the outside of his palm. "That's how I broke my hand punching a wall."

With incorrect diagnoses came wrongly prescribed medication. An antidepressant, for example, increased his mood swings in frequency and intensity. Another medication caused his blood pressure to go "sky high" making it necessary for him to take medication for hypertension that he says almost killed him. But it is perhaps the reaction of others toward him because he had a mental illness that has hurt the most.

"My mom always tried to understand," he says. "Others denied that I had it or that such an illness even exists. I had one supportive co-worker and one supervisor when I was working but they were too lenient and they got in trouble and I got in trouble. Back then I would go into the wash-room at work, curl up and just cry my eyes out. Now, slowly, I'm getting the right mix."

The mix Mr. Tully refers to consists of support, helping others, improved coping skills and medication. His wife of two years, Samantha, and a VON nurse who visits him once a month, provide support. His involvement as president of Polarity, a self-help group for those suffering from mood disorders and their families allows him the opportunity to help others.

"But the path to wellness can take a long time," he confides. "My coping methods are better but my symptoms have started to include anxiety again. I had that in 1990 and it's come back within the last year."

The swings between the manic highs and depression lows of his illness are what challenge him the most, though.

"A really intense high is followed by a deep, sudden and quick depression, like a falling elevator and I have to bounce back," he says. "It's a never-ending race between coping skills, better medication and the right combination of medication."

At the meetings he runs to help educate, support and communicate with those afflicted and affected by mood disorders, he encourages people to build up their personal networks, eat a good diet, exercise, keep stress low and have something to care about.

"Petting my cat helps," he says. It has also helped him to realize that his hero, Winston Churchill, suffered from the same illness he does. "He might have been crazy to go against

all the odds so early in the Second World War but he was right, even though he was an arrogant aristocrat."

Other luminaries such as Abraham Lincoln, Patty Duke, Ernest Hemingway, Henry Miller, Vincent Van Gogh, Margot Kidder and Michelangelo were or are, according to his research, all afflicted by manic depression, also known as bipolar affective disorder.

During the early years of his illness, Mr. Tully sought help in the Interact Community Mental Health Program. He admits that he was in denial at the time but that the agency helped him to become open-minded and he started to listen. He then took a counselling course at Durham College that he says helped him the most.

"Through the Human Services Counsellor Program I learned about group dynamics and how to run a group," he says. "I became involved in the Polarity self-help group 12 years ago and today am the only original member still active."

But the activities the young man finds meaningful aren't always easy for him to pursue. He'd like to complete two more courses and to do the placements necessary for him to earn the counsellor program diplomas.

"My concentration is off and I haven't had enough money," he says. But one course he took, a suicide intervention workshop, helped him when a friend tried to commit suicide. Mr. Tully is no stranger to thoughts of suicide himself and first attempted to take his own life when he was only 10-years-old.

"I began going for family counselling and that's when kids started picking on me, from Grade 4 through to Grade 11," he recalls, seeming to relive the pain. "They knew I was going for counselling and called me crazy. But my pet cat helped and I started to get into conservation. I've

thought about suicide thousands of times since I was a teenager, about 14-years-old. I socially isolated myself and then between 16 and 18, I tried to be more outgoing and I did make some friends."

It wasn't until he lived in a Canadian Mental Health Association group home for four years, following the rainbow-coloured man episode and having to leave his job, that he met his wife, Sam.

"In my life, there have always been stages," he says. "I've learned to cope and to go on to the next stage. I asked myself back then, 'Am I at the stage where I'm ready for a girlfriend?' and then I spent four years trying to become the best person I could be. In another year from now, I hope to be a father."

In the meantime, Mr. Tully devotes his usually three "good days" a week to developing a web site for the Polarity self-help group which has gained affiliation status with the Mood Disorders Association of Ontario and Toronto. He is also working on a "stress kit" he hopes to market as a fund-raiser for the group.

"It's an introduction to stress and coping and can benefit anyone but for someone with mood disorders, it can literally save their life or at least keep them from having to go to the hospital," he says.

It also gives him the opportunity to meet people and try to dispel some of the myths surrounding mental illness.

"Once you educate people, he says, "they are so understanding and realize you're not a lunatic. There are those who still treat me like a wild beast but I like to try to promote working together. There isn't enough participation in the mental health field by (mental health) consumers. When we go to a hospital as part of a crisis team, it's nice for the individual in crisis to have a person there who's been there and done that."

THE MAJOR MENTAL ILLNESSES

Schizophrenia

Schizophrenia is the most serious mental illness, affecting about 1 per cent of Canadians.

Incorrectly thought of by many as a "split personality," it is an illness that includes symptoms of confused thoughts, delusions (untrue or groundless beliefs), hallucinations (seeing or hearing things which do not exist) and bizarre behaviour.

Tragically, schizophrenia can strike young people in their late teen years or early twenties. Victims of the illness may experience only one episode of very severe symptoms, known as a psychosis.

Others may endure incidents throughout their lives but manage to live relatively normally while some are more or less continuously disabled by schizophrenia.

Anti-psychotic medication is the main treatment for the illness although referral to programs in hospitals or community agencies for counselling can also help people with schizophrenia manage their symptoms.

Mood Disorders (Depression and Manic Depression)

These illnesses affect about 10 per cent of the population. Although everyone experiences "highs" and "lows" in life, people with mood disorders experience them with greater intensity and for longer periods of time than most people.

Depression is the most common mood disorder; a person with depression feels "very low."

Symptoms may include: feelings of sadness or hopelessness, a lack of self-worth, changes in eating patterns, disturbed sleep, constant tiredness, an inability to have fun and thoughts of death or suicide.

People with manic depression have periods of depression and periods of feeling unusually "high" or elated. When the highs get out of hand, a manic episode can cause the person to behave in a reckless manner, sometimes to the point of financial ruin or getting into trouble with the law.

Anxiety Disorders

Anxiety disorders affect about 12 per cent of Canadians. These disorders include generalized anxiety, phobias (unreasonable fear of objects, animals or situations) and panic disorder (a condition where the person experiences bouts of intense, sudden fear and physical symptoms such as difficulty breathing). Another anxiety disorder is obsessive-compulsive disorder, in which a person is unable to control the repetition of unwanted thoughts or actions.

Successful treatments for anxiety disorders include counselling (psychotherapy) and

medication.

Eating Disorders

These disorders are most common in men and women under the age of 30. One of the most common eating disorders is anorexia nervosa, a very serious illness that involves drastic weight loss due to fasting and excessive exercise. Without treatment, this disorder can be fatal.

Another eating disorder is bulimia, a disorder that involves binge eating followed by self-induced vomiting, and the abuse of laxatives.

The main treatment for eating disorders is psychotherapy. Medication may also be prescribed.

Personality Disorders

There are many different personality disorders, each with its own medical name. People with these disorders usually have a hard time getting along with other people. They have a lot of difficulty understanding themselves and others, and as a result, may be irritable, demanding, hostile, fearful or manipulative.

The symptoms vary from one personality disorder to another.

Personality disorders are the most difficult disorders to treat. Those who have them, in many cases, do not seek help because they are able to live normally in some ways — keeping a job, for example.

It is in the area of relationships with other people that they run into trouble. They tend to blame others rather than consider that the problem is within them.

Treatment consists of intensive psychotherapy, sometimes supplemented with medication.

Organic Brain Disorders

These disorders affect about 1 per cent of people. They are the result of physical disease or injury to the brain. Organic brain disorders include Alzheimer's disease, AIDS dementia complex (caused by damage to brain cells by the HIV virus), and damage from strokes or accidents. Treatment usually consists of rehabilitation programs.

A note about labels

Describing mental illness according to diagnosis can cause stigmas by labelling people. A person is not an illness. We don't refer to a person with cancer as "cancerous." It is just as unfair and hurtful to the dignity of people with a mental illness to be called "schizophrenic," or "a depressive."

People who suffer from mental illness are people first. The illness is just one facet of the total person.

Port Perry site of the Lakeridge Health Corporation, where he later died. She was treated for minor injuries and released, police said.

The driver of the pickup, meanwhile, was taken into police custody.

David Franklin Doerfler, 35, of Concession 9, Claremont, has been charged by Durham police with criminal harassment and breach of probation.

Mr. Doerfler, who was to have no contact with his spouse under court-imposed conditions, appeared briefly in Oshawa provincial court yesterday and was ordered detained in custody for three days.

Further charges in connection with the collision are pending investigation by Ontario Provincial Police.

At the Gibbons family home relatives spent yesterday trying to make sense of the tragedy and explain the death to Mr. Gibbons's children.

He leaves behind four children from his present marriage, Michaela, 4, Brandon, 5, Kristen, 7 and Carol, 16, and two adult children from a previous marriage, Kelly, 28, and Robert, 29.

"Everyone is just very devastated. It's a total shock. He was a good dad. He spent lots of time with his kids. They were his life," said brother-in-law Peter Zerf.

Mr. Zerf said the Gibbons's two youngest children aren't able to comprehend their father's death. "How do you explain to a five-year-old or a four-year-old that daddy is never coming home?"

He said his sister was asleep in the car at the time of the impact and has no recollection of the crash. "She's pretty bruised up; nine stitches to the head, a sore neck and leg... But she's hanging pretty tough. I don't think it has all sunk in yet for her," said Mr. Zerf, 39, of Port Hope.

"They were very much a couple in love. It was their first time out together in a long time. They depended on each other dearly. She's so lost now."

Mr. Gibbons is the third innocent person to be killed in the Greater Toronto Area as a result of a police chase in the past year and his death renewed debate about the need versus

the risk of police pursuits.

However, "nobody here is blaming police for this," Mr. Zerf said.

He said his brother-in-law, who was to start a new job yesterday as a mechanic, was the victim of an "unfortunate accident."

"He just happened to be in the wrong place at the wrong time... It's such a tragedy, such a waste."

The police officers involved in the chase which resulted in Mr. Gibbons's death were "just doing their jobs," Mr. Zerf said.

"And you can't blame police for doing their job. If you stop chasing people every time someone runs, we may as well let criminals run everything... Personally, if we stop police chases we are in serious trouble."

Kelly Gibbons, however, said her dad's death is "hard to deal with" given the circumstances.

"My dad wasn't doing anything... I don't think they needed to chase this guy," said the 28-year-old, whose parents separated when she was a baby and who only got to know her father two years ago.

"The police knew who the guy was, why did they have to chase him... They could have gone to his house later," she said.

Chief Kevin McAlpine said yesterday he was saddened by the tragic outcome of the pursuit. He said the department would review its policy outlining pursuit procedures, however, "at this point it is too early to determine" whether changes would be made.

"This last event involved a relatively serious criminal investigation," he said. "This wasn't about a person rolling through a stop sign."

Chief McAlpine said he believes the provincial guidelines on police chases are "quite reasonable," and despite calls by some for greater restrictions, he believes the public "expect and even demand" police pursue fleeing criminals in many situations.

He suggested harsher punishment for people who flee police, which is an offence under the Highway Traffic Act but not under the Criminal Code.

"Whatever the current deterrent is, it obviously isn't working... Obviously there needs to be a more significant deterrent," he said.

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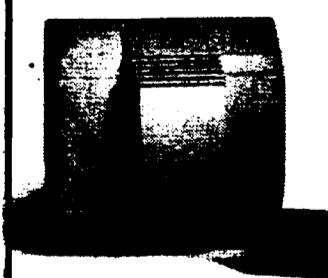

Measures are needed now

Politicians must show will to make changes

Just over two weeks after the terrible two-death tragedy on an Oshawa residential street, a suspect fleeing police has resulted in yet another Durham resident dying.

John Michael Gibbons, 47, an Oshawa father of six, was innocently driving along Hwy. 12 at about 1:45 a.m. Sunday when his life was taken after police say his car was struck by a pickup truck driven by David Frank Doerfler, 35, of Claremont. Mr. Doerfler, who has been charged with criminal harassment and breach of probation, was in a high-speed chase which lasted only two minutes and covered about four kilometres along Hwy. 7A — until Mr. Doerfler's pickup collided with Mr. Gibbons's car at the intersection of Hwy. 7A and Hwy. 12.

While the Special Investigations Unit looks into the crash — it must be called in to investigate all police incidents which result in serious injury or death — and the merits of the chase may be open to debate, but one area is clear. Those who flee police for any reason whatsoever and cause police to give chase are a menace to the safety and well-being of the general public. And such offenders must be severely punished.

The call to eliminate police chases

plays into the hands of criminals across the land. Any suspect who knows police will not give chase will be emboldened to commit any offence that he, quite literally, knows he can get away with. The notion that the police, to borrow a phrase, always get their man, is an essential, critical element of law enforcement. It cannot be eliminated.

What can be changed, and our provincial politicians including the solicitor-general and the premier must take the lead here, is legislation which hammers those who flee from police when summoned to stop.

Such actions must result in mandatory jail sentences and murder charges — where warranted — must be considered for those who cause death.

The facts in the latest case are still very much under investigation and it may be some time before everything comes to light, but Durham MPPs must be alarmed by the events of the past 15 days. Three dead, the result of fleeing police. Surely something must be done. We have to reclaim our roads and streets and make them as safe as possible.

Cracking down on drunk drivers and speeders has helped to cut down on death and injury. Now, we must try to stop this latest highway scourge.

Your editorial on Nov. 4 was right on the money, but some other issues regarding the Pickering airport need to be addressed.

Louis Turpen, head of the Greater Toronto Airports Authority, has said that because Buttonville is privately owned it cannot be counted on to service York as a regional airport. For this reason the GTAA

believes the Pickering site would be an excellent choice as a regional airport to serve York.

The downloading of costs to the Region of Durham from the Province means the entire cost of the infrastructure of the Pickering airport would be paid solely by taxpayers here. Durham taxpayers should demand an answer from their Regional chairman and councillors as to why they are offering to pay for an airport that will primarily serve York Region.

The great majority of warehousing and out buildings from the Pickering airport will be located along the main transportation corridors that currently exist, such as Hwy. 404, Hwy. 407 and the industrial areas of Markham. There are no industrial areas in north Pickering. There will be no payoff for Durham in increased tax revenues from this airport. In fact airports don't pay taxes.

Durham gets the bill for the airport, the noise from the airport, while York Region gets the use and the payoff. That's a helluva deal, Roger Anderson.

Regional chairman Anderson has done his best to censure debate on this issue. VOCAL (Voters Organized to Cancel the Airport Lands) has repeatedly requested an opportunity to appear before Regional Council to present the concerns of the voters. VOCAL won't get this opportunity until the new year, after the vote of council and after the date of response to Minister of Transport David Collenette.

I would hope the News Advertiser, as well as Regional councillors, will start to debate the costs issue of the Pickering airport as this aspect affects all taxpayers of Durham. At the very least Durham Council should allow the other side of this debate to be heard.

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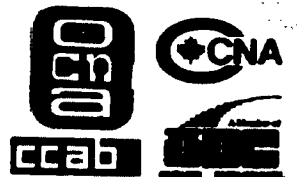

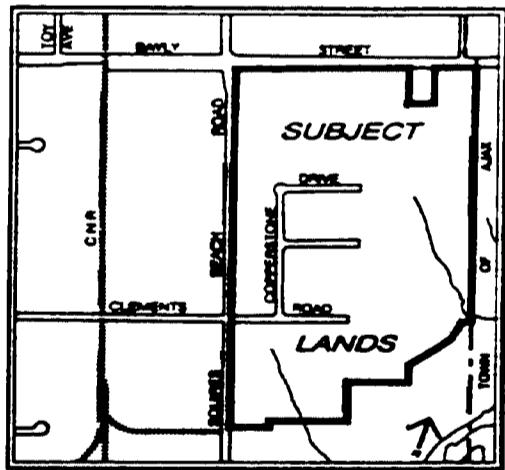

Official Plan Amendment Application OPA 98-004/P
 Zoning By-law Amendment Application A 17/98

Runnymede Development Corporation Limited has submitted Official Plan Amendment Application 98-004/P to change the Pickering Official Plan designation on certain lands located south of Bayly Street and east of Squires Beach Road from "Employment Areas - General Employment" to "Employment Areas - Prestige Employment". The properties located within the subject lands that front Bayly Street would keep their current designation "Employment Area - Mixed Employment". "Mixed Employment" areas have the highest standards for site operation and appearance. "Prestige Employment" areas have the next highest standards, and "General Employment" areas have the next highest standards.

To implement the existing "Mixed Employment" designation and the proposed designation change to "Prestige Employment", Runnymede has also submitted Zoning By-law Amendment Application A 17/98, which would change the current zoning on the subject lands from "M2S" - Yard Storage and Heavy Manufacturing Zone and "M1" - Storage and Light Manufacturing (Special), to "M1-1" Storage and Light Manufacturing (Special). This zoning change would eliminate a number of the currently permitted uses - in particular, the heavier industrial uses and outdoor storage. Uses permitted under the proposed zoning would include business offices, food preparation plants, light manufacturing plants, public uses, scientific or medical laboratories, warehouses, and accessory dwelling units.

The lands subject to these applications are identified in the accompanying map.

Helping the troubled COPE...

An Ajax woman who is verbally abused by her mother, husband and children can vent her frustration with an impartial confidante.

Her outlet is 26-year-old Nerissa Bogdanis of Ajax. Ms. Bogdanis spent roughly two hours a week with the Ajax woman for a year. She took the woman shopping and out for coffee or to run errands, anywhere that could provide the woman with an escape from her troubled home life.

As well, it provided a safe setting for the woman to talk and for Ms. Bogdanis to simply listen. The COPE Mental Health Program volunteer doesn't instruct the woman to leave the abusive situation, even if she feels it's crucial to the woman's well-being. She knows it's not her place. But she can offer a fresh perspective to a problem.

"They want a non-judgmental ear and someone who is outside their family and friend circle so they can just release," Ms. Bogdanis

says. The COPE Mental Health Program, a branch of the Durham Region Community Care Association, offers adults with emotional or psychiatric problems a coping mechanism through one-to-one relationships and group sessions.

The organization provides free services through funding by the Ontario Ministry of Health and the Ajax-Pickering United Way. Its clients are usually referred to the program, but anyone 16 and older can apply.

Last year the COPE program helped 163 people through individual matches or support groups.

COPE volunteers take part in an eight-week training session to equip them with the necessary communication and life skills to provide support for their clients.

In 1994, Ms. Bogdanis read in the News Advertiser's billboard section that volunteers were needed for the COPE program. Interested in psychology and sociology, COPE was a perfect match. Ms. Bogdanis is pursuing her masters degree in so-

cial work at Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo this fall and will be leaving the COPE program.

But not empty-handed. Reflecting on her experiences, Ms. Bogdanis recalls, "It took a lot of time to build a rapport" with the verbally-abused woman, her last client. "It moved slowly, but progressively. She was so afraid that I would be burdened," she says.

As the woman became comfortable and confided in her, Ms. Bogdanis realized her client was not living in a healthy environment. The volunteer admits it was difficult to bite her tongue. "I'd love to help her in a more profound way but I can only provide an ear," she says.

However, listening can be good medicine. For the first time, this woman has an outlet, Ms. Bogdanis says. She didn't take the news of Ms. Bogdanis' return to school well. If the client wishes, she can be matched with a new volunteer.

Ms. Bogdanis says being paired with women has enticed her to direct her energy towards working

with women once she is finished school in two years. Her dream is to own and operate a healing centre for women in Costa Rica. Call the COPE Mental Health Program at 686-3248 for more information.

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Area boy likes life in the fast lane

Racing title not bad for someone too young to get a driver's licence

AJAX — Daniel Coratti likes fast cars and idolizes Canadian racing star Jacques Villeneuve.

Revvng up the engine of his 5.5-horsepower Sodi Kart which can reach speeds just under 100 kilometres per hour has taken the Ajax resident to the winner's circle more than his fair share of times this season.

At one of the bigger events of the season — the Canadian

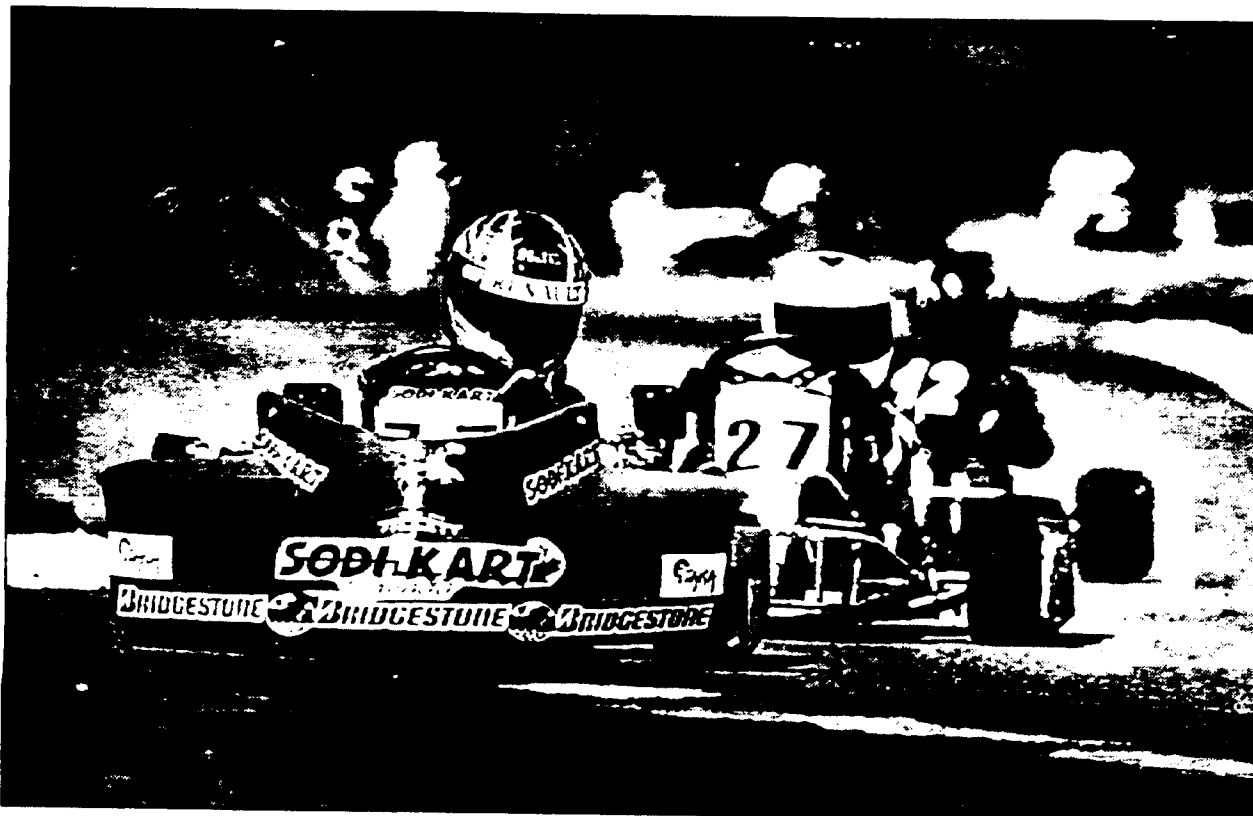
