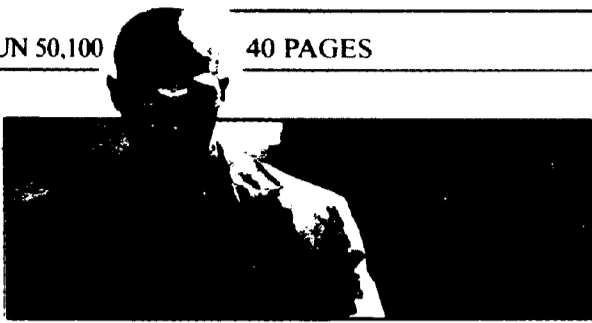

## Pickering may ask Province to force merger plebiscite

**PICKERING** — City residents still might have their say on municipal restructuring in Durham when they go to the polls in the November municipal election.

Although Pickering council voted against placing a referendum question on the ballot earlier this year, the City's executive committee voted Monday to ask the Province to step in and question local voters on the issue of amalgamation.

If that recommendation is approved by council next week, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing will be invited to direct the City to ask citizens here if they are in favour of reducing the total number of municipal governments in Durham by way of amalgamations.

"The minister has the capacity to seek out the opinion of the public on matters of provincial interest," Mayor Wayne Arthurs said.

He explained under the Muni-

## Durham survey poses 'major challenge' in changing views

The Region is facing a "major challenge" in changing the way people travel as it prepares a transportation vision for the area, Durham council heard Wednesday.

In a presentation on the progress of the Durham Mobility Study, which is currently developing a plan to guide the Region's transportation services for the next 20 years, project co-ordinator Gene Chartier told councillors there's a need to change public sentiment toward transit use.

He noted a recent survey conducted for Durham by the Angus Reid Group indicated people here do want to see improvements to local transit, but they're not eager to use the service.

"The public wants to see more public transit, but (they're saying) 'Don't take away my ability to drive or my ability to have good roads.' People want to have everything...they want to make sure there is transit available for their neighbour to take," he said.

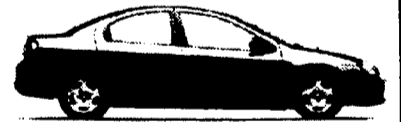

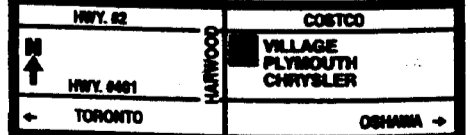

# Report pushes for increased college powers

## But Durham College wants more

A report which would give increased powers and flexibility to community colleges, still isn't enough to match the broad dreams of Durham College.

"It's good for colleges and they are useful recommendations... given that Durham is a big believer in the diversity that it is allowing for. It's just that we see our vision as being far deeper and far broader than what's included in the paper," says Durham College President Gary Polonsky. He was responding to a report prepared by the Association of Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology of Ontario, which represents the province's 25 colleges.

The 51-page document, which would see the first overhaul of the community college system in 25 years, makes the case for an increasingly independent, market-driven system that "will be the most highly respected college system in the world by 2010."

The college association wasn't able to reach consensus on all issues in the statement, but does ask the Ontario government to establish a new charter for colleges that could include:

- Giving colleges the authority to approve new programs quickly, on their own to meet business and community needs - or, at the very least reforming the current system;

- Allowing colleges to specialize if they want.

- The right to grant degrees. The Province has already launched a pilot project permitting up to 24 applied degree programs in Ontario starting Sep-

tember 2001, but colleges want this entrenched.

- Change the funding model to provide 'progressive' and 'adequate' funding. While there's no dollar figure attached, colleges would at least like the current funding of about \$3,000 per full-time student maintained, as well as an additional \$2 billion over the next five years to accommodate the enrolment growth.

- Hire and set salaries for college presidents.

"The word that captures it best overall is greater flexibility for the college system," says Howard Rundle chairman of the college association's committee of presidents and head of Fanshawe College in London.

Mr. Polonsky, who has advocated a new integrated university-college concept be implemented for Durham, says the recommendation are good, but he'd like them to go further.

"Durham is not interested in a little more flexibility," he says. "We want to rewrite the envelope and create a whole new institution."

"Our vision is to differentiate ourselves from Ontario colleges and create a different kind of post-secondary education which merges the best of the university world and the college world to create a integrated university-college."

Mr. Polonsky participated in the formulation of the report, but concedes his vision for a university-college is unique among his peers.

# Pickering residents may yet have their say on merger

pal Elections Act the minister can direct Towns and Cities to include plebiscite questions on their ballots.

The mayor added he believes this approach would be better than holding a plebiscite under the government's new Direct Democracy Through Municipal Referendums Act 2000.

That legislation, introduced in April, allows municipalities to hold binding referendums. But, the Province has the final word on what questions will be allowed and 50 per cent of the municipality's eligible voters plus one must cast ballots in favour of the plebiscite question to make the decision binding.

"It seems somewhat redundant to seek a binding referendum question," the mayor said. He noted the Province's requirements regarding voter turnout will make a binding referendum virtually unattainable because turnout in municipal elections is typically around the 30-per cent mark.

"It's clear to me there are too many (municipal governments in Durham). What the right number is, I'm not sure yet," Mayor Arthurs added.

The executive committee also endorsed various recommendations Monday that were approved by regional councillors at a retreat at Fern Resort in January, including supporting a modified two-tier system with a slimmed down Region, backing potential municipal amalgamations and supporting a review of the number of politicians in Durham.

"What is encouraging about this is that it's a next step," said Ward 2 local

Councillor Mark Holland, who made an unsuccessful attempt in February to convince his colleagues to hold a referendum on municipal restructuring this fall.

"I would hope the minister acts upon this request," he said. "I think we would find the majority of residents are in favour of change in Durham Region."

But, Ward 1 Regional Councillor Maurice Brenner said he is

optimistic the minister will respond favourably to the City's request.

He noted three Progressive Conservative ministers have threatened to force amalgamations in the 905 regions during recent years unless local municipalities could reach a solution regarding restructuring.

"We as the City of Pickering rise to the challenge (and recom-

mended amalgamation with Ajax)," Coun. Brenner said. "And yet every minister has turned down our request for a home-grown solution."

Meanwhile, Ward 2 Regional Councillor Doug Dickerson said he believes 90 per cent of Pickering residents will be in favour of reducing the number of politicians in Durham. But, he'd like the City to ask citizens a more direct ques-

tion. "I'd like to see us be a little more direct and ask, 'Do we want to see an amalgamation with Ajax?'" he said.

Ward 2 local Councillor Dave Ryan noted the committee's decision to seek input from the Province "puts the onus where it belongs."

He added, "It points out the cynical, if not farcical, nature of

# Airport 'stakeholders' cheer as Durham chooses not to push airport designation

Durham Council's decision Wednesday not to push for designation of the federal government's lands in north Pickering as an airport site will allow a group of residents and government officials to continue working toward an agreement on the lands, says an airport opponent.

"Durham Region stood behind the stakeholders' forum," said Stephen Frederick, head of Voters Organized to Cancel the Airport Lands (VOCAL) following the decision by regional councillors to hold off on seeking designation of the property. Last December, Durham Council voted to table a staff recommendation to request that Transport Canada move forward and designate the Pickering lands as an airport site on the table.

And, regional representatives voted again Wednesday to leave the matter on the table at this time.

That's a decision that will allow the stakeholders' forum, established in March 1999 to develop a long-term plan for the airport lands, to continue working on a draft agreement, Mr. Frederick said.

The Pickering resident told council the group of citizens, municipal, provincial and federal government officials has made "excellent progress" since the Region initially tabled the request to seek designation in December.

"Real progress is being made, we're shaping an agreement," he said, calling the stakeholders' forum "the first avenue in 28 years to really provide a long-term solution."

Mr. Frederick also told councillors federal Trans-

port Minister David Collette recently informed the City of Pickering that he won't proceed with des-

ignation of the lands at this time. "If the man responsible for the designation process continues

to endorse us, we ask that Durham Region continue to support us as well," he said. Under the fed-

eral Aeronautics Act, designation would allow Ottawa to impose zoning regulations on the area that

would limit the height of buildings, prohibit electronic signal interference which could endanger

aircraft, and prohibit land use that may be attractive to birds (such as landfills), or the planting of certain

crops. It would enable the government, in effect, to protect the site for possible future use as an airport.

"We want to get this wrapped up before the municipal election," Mr. Frederick said.

### Poor children just won't go away

Statistics are an indictment of policies to eradicate child poverty

There it is in black and white and it's read all over. The statistics clearly show child poverty in Canada is a problem that isn't getting better and it's certainly not going away.

In a poll of 23 industrialized countries taken by the United Nations, Canada comes in a dismal 15th in child poverty figures. A whopping 15.5 per cent of Canadian children live below the poverty line. Those figures were released Monday.

The countries that have the least child poverty are, not surprisingly, the four which make up Scandinavia. Leading the list is Sweden with just 2.6 per cent of its children living in poverty, followed by Norway at 3.9 per cent, Finland at 4.3 per cent and Denmark at 5.1 per cent.

These countries invest heavily in children with massive public day care provided, among other programs.

Canada ranks below the Czech Republic, Hungary and Poland among others and is just ahead of Ireland, Britain and the U.S., second last on the list with a child poverty rate of 22.4 per cent.

Not that Canadians have ever compared our social programs with those provided in the United States. Nor should we. Certainly our tax rates are higher, our social safety net more comprehensive. But, given that we have had five solid years of economic expansion, lowered unemployment and a flat rate of inflation, shouldn't the child poverty

rate be dropping? Ontario brags constantly that there are fewer welfare recipients - hundreds of thousands of them - over the past five years. But more poor children and homelessness in the GTA is a catastrophic problem.

Somewhere in all the rhetoric about better times there has to be a workable plan to cut child poverty. The goal of eliminating it by the year 2000, Parliament's objective back in 1989, was far from realistic. After all, even in Sweden two of 100 children are poor. But surely, we can try to reduce the number.

The key to eliminating child poverty is in providing worthwhile jobs, not minimum wage ones, for the parents of poor kids. The Province and the Feds must establish training programs, back-to-school incentives and educational inducements to keep kids in school and encourage their parents to go back. A person who works part-time in a store might not be on welfare or unemployed, but surely that person can't adequately support his or her children.

Unless we make changes, we will reap the whirlwind of the poverty cycle: increased crime, more students dropping out and poverty continuing. We can do better.

The time for these tasks, by the way,



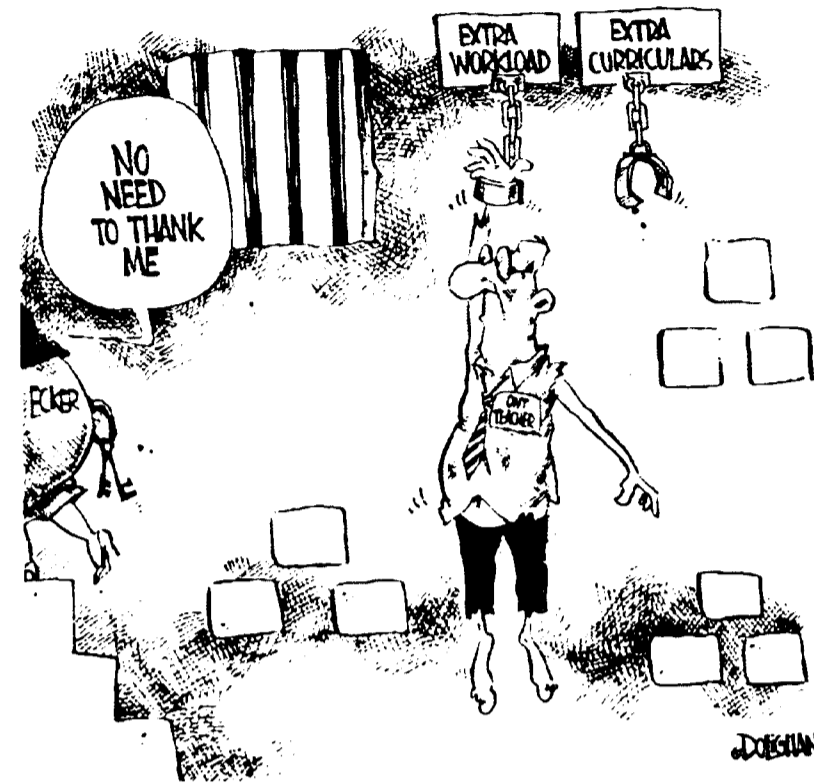

Blake Purdy's June 4 column regarding a meeting I held with some parents to discuss the provincial government's teacher testing program is inaccurate. The meeting that has him so

concerned was not a public meeting, but a gathering of individuals I invited to give me feedback on the teacher testing program. Their names were not secret and the media were free to attend or not as they wished.

I have held public meetings, where teacher testing along with any other subject that people desired to raise could have been raised - in Pickering on April 20, in Uxbridge on April 26 and at my annual community brunch on June 4 in Pickering. All of these events were publicly advertised in Mr. Purdy's newspaper.

It's true that I did not attend an Oshawa forum on education issues, which Mr. Purdy criticizes. However, the organizers did not do me the courtesy of asking whether I had a prior commitment before they organized it. I was already booked to deliver a speech in Peterborough that evening. Fortunately, my caucus colleague, John O'Toole, MPP for Durham, ably stood in for me.

Implementing a teacher testing program was a commitment we made to voters in last year's election. To keep that promise, I have met with and received the advice of many groups and individuals in the education sector, including school boards, teacher federations, the Ontario College of Teachers and parents. We have not always agreed on all points but their advice has clearly shaped the comprehensive teacher testing program that I announced on May 11. We have many excellent teachers, but this initiative will ensure that all of our teachers are as good as they can be.

# Top authors paged to the stage by young readers

Durham students honour book writers named Canada's best

The story of a girl who hides from the Nazis during the Second World War has been chosen the top fiction book in Canada by about 40,000 elementary students.

Approximately 700 Durham public and separate board pupils attended a celebration at the Oshawa Civic Auditorium Monday when the Silver Birch Award winners were announced.

Each year, a committee nominates 10 Canadian fiction and 10 non-fiction books to receive the annual award. The books are presented to Canadian students in Grades 4 to 6 who must read a minimum of five from each category to cast a vote for their favourites.

For Toronto writer Kathy Kacer, author of the winning fiction book 'The Secret of Gabi's Dresser', it was a day of firsts.

"This is my first published novel and the first time I've been a part of Silver Birch," she said.

Obviously impressed by the enthusiasm of the students around her, Ms. Kacer added, "Look at this. It's a remarkable thing."

The novel is deeply personal for Ms. Kacer as it's based on the true story of her mother, who was living in eastern Czechoslovakia when the Nazis invaded the country.

Her name was on a deportation list, but Ms. Kacer's mother hid in a clothes dresser and avoided detection as other children were taken from their homes.

"It's a very important story for me, part of my childhood bedtime stories," said Ms. Kacer. "I'm very committed to stories of the Holocaust and feel they need to be told."

An eager reader of the book was Kathryn Pecore, a student at St. Paul Catholic School in Whitby, who said she never knew the Nazis made children work until she read the book.

"It was actually sad, because if that was me I'd be very upset

that I didn't have my family and friends with me," said Kathryn, who read all the fiction nominees.

She was impressed with the writing, which made it easy to picture the words in her mind, and said she was anxious to see what would happen to Gabi, the book's central character.

Classmate Michael Blair voted in the non-fiction category, which was won by Sheree Fitch's collection of poetry entitled 'If You Could Wear My Sneakers'.

But Michael voted for 'Animal Defenses: How Animals Protect Themselves', by Etta Kaner.

"I found it really interesting," said Michael. "The paragraphs that explained the animals made a lot of sense."

He learned a lot of obscure facts about animals and the avid

camper figures some of them might come in handy one day.

Janelle Shaw, a Grade 4 student at Conant Public School in Oshawa, read all 20 books and was one of the pupils at the celebration honoured for doing so. Janelle said it took her about three months to read the 20 titles.

Her non-fiction vote went to Mary Wallace's 'The Inuksuk Book', which explains how the Inuit use the stone markers called Inuksuk.

"It taught me a lot and the pictures were beautiful," said Janelle. "I just really enjoyed it."

Lee Farrington, a Grade 6 student at Joseph Gould Public School in Uxbridge, had his fingers crossed when the fiction award was announced.

He had voted for Karleen Bradford's 'Lionheart's Scribe',

about a young boy's dream to join the crusaders as they head for Jerusalem.

"It had the most action and I liked it the best," said Lee.

Classmate Buck Sully read all 20 books and agreed with his friend.

"It was well-written and a lot of action," he said.

Amanda Weare, a Grade 6 student at St. Patrick Catholic School in Ajax, took about four months to finish the 20 books nominated for awards.

"I voted for someone else for both categories," she said after the winners were announced.

A committee of about 20 teacher-librarians from both school boards organized the celebration, which went Durham-wide this year after being held in Uxbridge in past years.

### Catholic board objects to Ajax official plan

The Durham Catholic District School Board is objecting to a section of Ajax's official plan because it says the Town is too restrictive in allowing where high schools can be built.

The Ajax plan, adopted two months ago and now being circulated by Durham Region for comments, states schools can only be built in residential and central area designations. The board wants the Town to allow secondary schools in employment areas.

Ajax objected when Durham's Catholic and public school boards acquired the site for the new multi-use facility in north Ajax in an employment area. The matter went to the Ontario Municipal Board which, in a site-specific decision, ruled in the school boards' favour.

"The new Town of Ajax Official Plan is disregarding the Ontario Municipal Board's decision by not allowing for future school sites in employment area designations in the town," states a report from Walter Yewchyn, support services superintendent for the Catholic board.

The Durham Catholic District School Board in turn asks schools across the Region to suggest students.

The OCSTA criteria include students who have strong Catholic leadership qualities and relate well to fellow students and teachers.

Receiving a certificate from OCSTA as the board's nominees were Anne O'Connor from St. Bernard Catholic School in Whitby and Serena Schwab, a student at Pickering's St. Mary Catholic Secondary School.

The nominees at the Durham level were: Jolene LaFlamme (Father Joseph Venini Catholic School, Oshawa); Danielle Visconti (St. Elizabeth Seton Catholic School, Pickering); Desmond Cole (Father Leo J. Austin Catholic Secondary School, Whitby); Matt Zimmer (Monsignor John Pereyema Catholic Secondary School, Oshawa); and Jason Hewitt (Archbishop Denis O'Connor Catholic High School, Ajax).

Mr. Chartier also reported the survey, which polled 400 residents during March, indicated respondents believe "there is a need to reduce, from an overall perspective, our auto usage."

But, 88 per cent of residents who participated in the survey indicated they drive to work. And, when asked how the Region could best improve transportation here, the majority said road improvements would be the best use of tax dollars.

Mr. Chartier told reporters the Region is facing "a major challenge in

terms of changing public sentiment" and encouraging people to leave their cars behind. "We have to

get people to realize what the implications are of their actions."

He notes the current municipal transit services work well in serving the GO system. And, he says staff recognize a "need to have some inter-municipal connectivity" within the Region.

But, he adds, there's the challenge of getting people to use the service once it's provided.

Mr. Chartier reports the Durham Mobility Study isn't anywhere near making a recommendation about possible transit amalgamations in Durham, noting at this stage the committee is

simply "highlighting the issues."

"We're hoping we can get some public involvement at this point in time. Hopefully, we can come up with a plan that is workable," Mr. Chartier said, noting Durham is seeking the public's input on a "blueprint to help guide the Region's transportation system" at a series of public meetings being held next week.

The committee has produced several working papers outlining the opinion poll results, the vision for creating a sustainable transportation network in Durham through the year 2021 and opportunities to

reduce the role of the automobile.

Members of the public are invited to comment on the study at three open houses being held next week, including a session June 20 at the Ajax Community Centre, June 21 at the McLaughlin Auditorium in Oshawa and June 22 at the Port Perry Town Hall in Scugog. All open houses run from 7 to 9:30 p.m. with presentations taking place at 7:30 p.m. each night.

# Nuclear regulator rejects deadline extension for comments on review

**PICKERING** — City officials and local residents won't get any extra time to provide input on the draft environmental assessment (EA) on the proposed restart of the 'A' side of the Pickering Nuclear Generating Station (PNS), an area politician reports.

Ward 1 local Councillor Dave Ryan says the Atomic Energy Control Board (AECB) has turned down a request from the City to extend the 60-day comment period beyond the June 30 deadline.

Pickering councillors voted unanimously last month to ask the AECB for an additional 60 days to review the lengthy document which was released to the public May 1.

The draft EA consists of two volumes — a main report and a set of appen-

dices. There is also an annex report on the more than 160 issues raised during the 1998 Pickering Environmental Review and nine technical support documents which provide more information about radiation and radioactivity, atmospheric environment, hydrology and water quality, aquatic environment, terrestrial environment, geology, hydrogeology and seismicity, community and stakeholder consultation, land resources and socioeconomic conditions.

"They rejected it on the basis that (interested parties have enough time to review the EA because it only consists of) two books," Coun. Ryan says.

"The good news is the City's peer review team will be ready on time (to provide its input)," he says. "The

bad news is there is no additional time for the public."

Coun. Ryan reports council will deal with the matter June 26

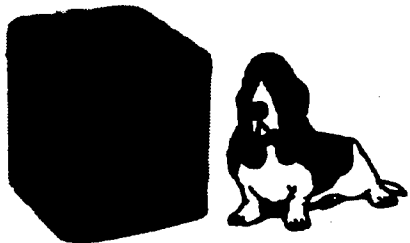

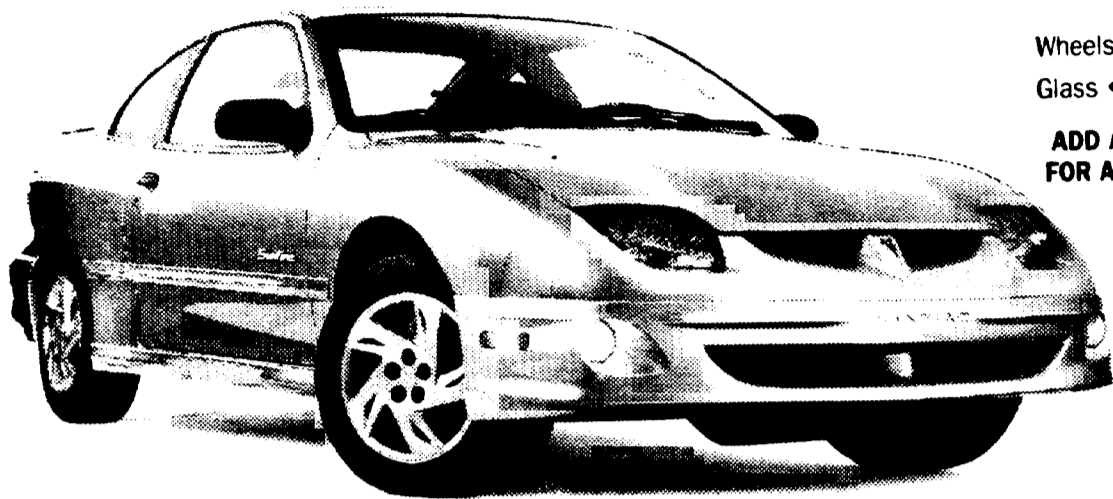

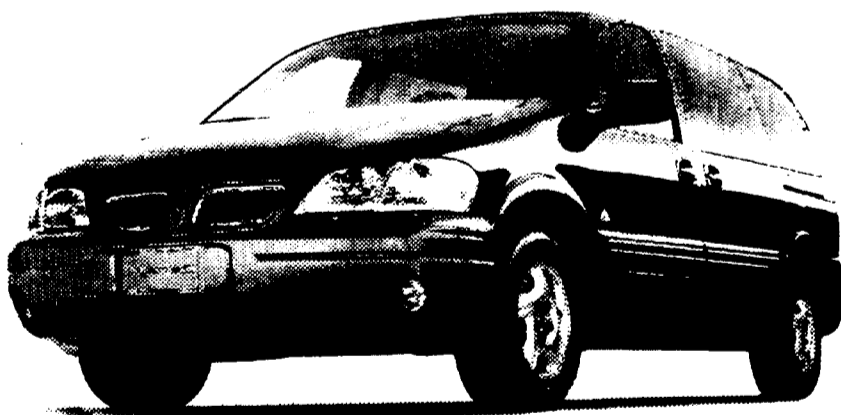

# Pickering shores up its waterfront plans

## Millennium square and boardwalk project to cost \$2.75 million

**PICKERING** — After years of legal wrangling and extensive planning by City staff and local residents, Pickering's vision for the waterfront is about to become a reality.

Pickering councillors approved a tender for a \$2.75-million millennium square and boardwalk project during a special council session following the executive committee meeting Monday.

"This is a legacy that this council has an opportunity to leave," said Mayor Wayne Arthurs.

He noted the project, which will get under way with a ground-breaking ceremony Saturday, has been a long time coming.

During his first term on council a dozen years ago, the Town was engaged in a legal battle with the Pickering Harbour Company over ownership of land under and around Frenchman's Bay, Mayor Arthurs noted.

"It took the councils of the day some six years to resolve that matter," he added. Without that resolution, "We would not be where we are today."

The mayor also noted one of the most "critical elements" in creating a vision for the waterfront has been the contribution of the community over the years.

"The story of this waterfront is one of partnerships," said Ward 2 local Councillor Mark Holland, who headed the ad hoc committee of politicians and citizens who drove the Millennium Trail project.

And, the reason that committee "was as successful as it was, was because it

was driven... Clearly it was partnerships that drove the success of this," he said.

Pickering Council approved the \$3.45-million waterfront plan in May 1999, including more than \$2.5 million worth of boardwalks, recreation facilities, environmental improvements and a public square on the lakefront between Alex Robertson Park and West Shore Boulevard which will comprise the Millennium Square and Trail, as well as an \$850,000 expenditure on improvements to the waterfront trail between the West Shore and the Rouge River areas.

And, while some elements of the project are being delayed, the items included in the tender, awarded to Miwel Construction Ltd. Monday, will create a trail which extends across the Pickering lakeshore from its eastern to western borders, with the exception of a few small areas where the waterfront is still in private hands.

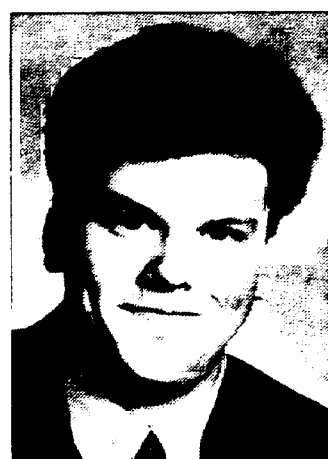
The City is contributing approximately \$1.7 million toward the project from parkland reserves and development charges.

A further \$1 million is being contributed from outside sources, including \$340,000 from the federal government; \$38,000 from the provincial government; \$200,000 from the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority; \$200,000 from Ontario Power Generation; \$100,000 from the Optimist Club; and \$100,000 from the Rotary Club.

Ward 2 Regional Councillor Doug Dickerson, who convinced his colleagues to include the construction of

an asphalt pathway through Alex Robertson Park in the tender approved Monday, at

an additional cost of \$83,000, said the project "captured the imagination"

of the Waterfront Regeneration Trust and the conservation authority.

"What we ended up with is a project that isn't just another trail," Coun. Holland said.

He added the plan has been infused with the vision of local artists and historians.

Coun. Holland reported the trail will feature works by local artists as well as signs which will tell the story of the municipality. There will also be a children's splash park on the lakefront.

"We have the underpinnings of something truly great," he said. "I think this is a journey."

The City won't complete this year the viewing node at

Krosno Creek, the umbrella shelters, picnic shelters and playground equipment for the millennium square, planting around the Liverpool Road parking lot, the washroom building at Frenchman's Bay west park, the paving of the roadway at Frenchman's Bay west park and the construction of a lighthouse. But, Coun. Holland is confident additional funding will be secured to continue with those elements of the project next year.

The Saturday's ground-breaking ceremony for the project is being held from noon to 2 p.m. at Alex Robertson Park. It's expected the trail will be completed prior to the end of the year.

# Pickering nuclear station passes six of eight targets

Local plant not turning out enough power to satisfy operator

**PICKERING** — The Pickering nuclear station met six of the eight performance indicator targets set for April by Ontario Power Generation (OPG).

It failed the targets in two categories, according to the latest monthly 'report card' released by the corporation to make itself accountable to the public.

April report card results were as follows, for the first four months of 2000, except for measurements that are quarterly, as indicated:

- In an index reflecting 11 industry standard performance measures set by the World Association of Nuclear Operators (for the first quarter of 2000) — 77.8 per cent, bettering OPG's target of 77.6 per cent, but short of the industry median of 94.9 per cent.

- Public safety Level One and Two events reportable to the Atomic Energy Control Board (AECB) — two, worse than OPG's target of one. There were no Level One or Two events in April.

The two events represent the year to date.

- 'Reactor trips' or the number of unplanned automatic reactor shut-downs per 7,000 hours — zero, better than the OPG target and the industry standard of one trip per 7,000 hours.

- Capability factor or amount of energy capable of being produced per month as a percentage of perfect performance — 58.1 per cent, worse than the OPG goal of 58.9 per cent and also falling below the industry median of 88.2 per cent.

- Radiation dose to the public from both the 'A' and 'B' stations — 1.2 microsieverts ( $\mu\text{Sv}$ ), an international unit of dose, bettering the quarterly target of 4  $\mu\text{Sv}$ .

- Major and moderate preventable spills — zero, improving on the OPG goal of one.

- Industrial Safety Accident Rate, the number of accidents per 200,000 work hours that result in lost work

time, restricted-work injuries or fatalities — 0.16, better than the OPG target of 0.32 and the in-

dustry median of 0.21. • Accident severity rate or the number of days lost for injuries

per 200,000 hours worked — 0.3, better than the OPG goal of four.

OPG states performance listed worse than target is not an indication the reactors are unsafe.

# New rural service for abused women offered

Abused women in rural areas of Ajax and Pickering now have a service they can turn to for help.

APPLE House has launched a free, confidential consulting program called the Rural Outreach Service.

APPLE Community Project outreach counsellor Wendy Leeder says abuse of women is "even more of a problem in rural areas. There are more obstacles to overcome."

For example, she notes, there's no public transportation for women who don't drive.

And, "In rural areas, there's a fear everybody will know what's going on," Ms.

Leeder says. "The isolation factor is huge up here."

She reports about 30 per cent of all women have been or are in an abusive situation.

Ms. Leeder can meet with women in neutral locations, such as churches or an office in the community.

"I can take them to places — a food bank, to medical attention or a shelter," she adds.

The project is funded by the Ajax-Pickering United Way.

Abused women who live in the country can call the rural line at 427-7300. The 24-hour crisis line is 619-2556.

### Getting The Most From Your Compost

(CSPMA) - Turning kitchen scraps, lawn clippings and weeds into compost produces a nutrient-rich, organic amendment that improves garden soil and keeps unnecessary waste out of landfills. But for all its benefits, both to the soil and environment, many gardeners find composting takes too long and requires too much effort for the end result.

How can you make the work of composting easier and more effective? According to Randy Monk, executive director of the Composting Council, add Canadian sphagnum peat moss to the compost bin. "Research has clearly shown that the combination of peat moss and compost is very beneficial," says Monk. "It's good for landscaping, horticulture and agriculture. Peat moss and compost each show their strengths when combined, making an excellent soil amendment."

Peat moss is a natural, organic soil conditioner that saves water by absorbing and holding moisture, loosens heavy soil and adds body to sandy soils. In the

compost bin, peat helps produce better compost by speeding up the process, reducing odours and controlling air and water in the compost pile.

Simply mix a 2.5-centimetre (1-inch) layer of peat to every extra 10 centimetres (4 inches) of compost materials. Using a garden fork, flip over the top layers of organic materials every week or two. Add water when needed, so the centre of the pile stays moist. To cut down on odours, put a 5-centimetre (2-inch) peat cap on top of the pile.

Once your compost is ready for the garden, make the most of this rich, organic matter by blending the compost with equal parts of peat moss.

According to Gerry Hood, president of the Canadian Sphagnum Peat Moss Association, "Peat decomposes much more slowly than compost - several years versus several months for compost, ensuring longer-term organic matter in the soil, peat also reduces compost's tendency to compact."

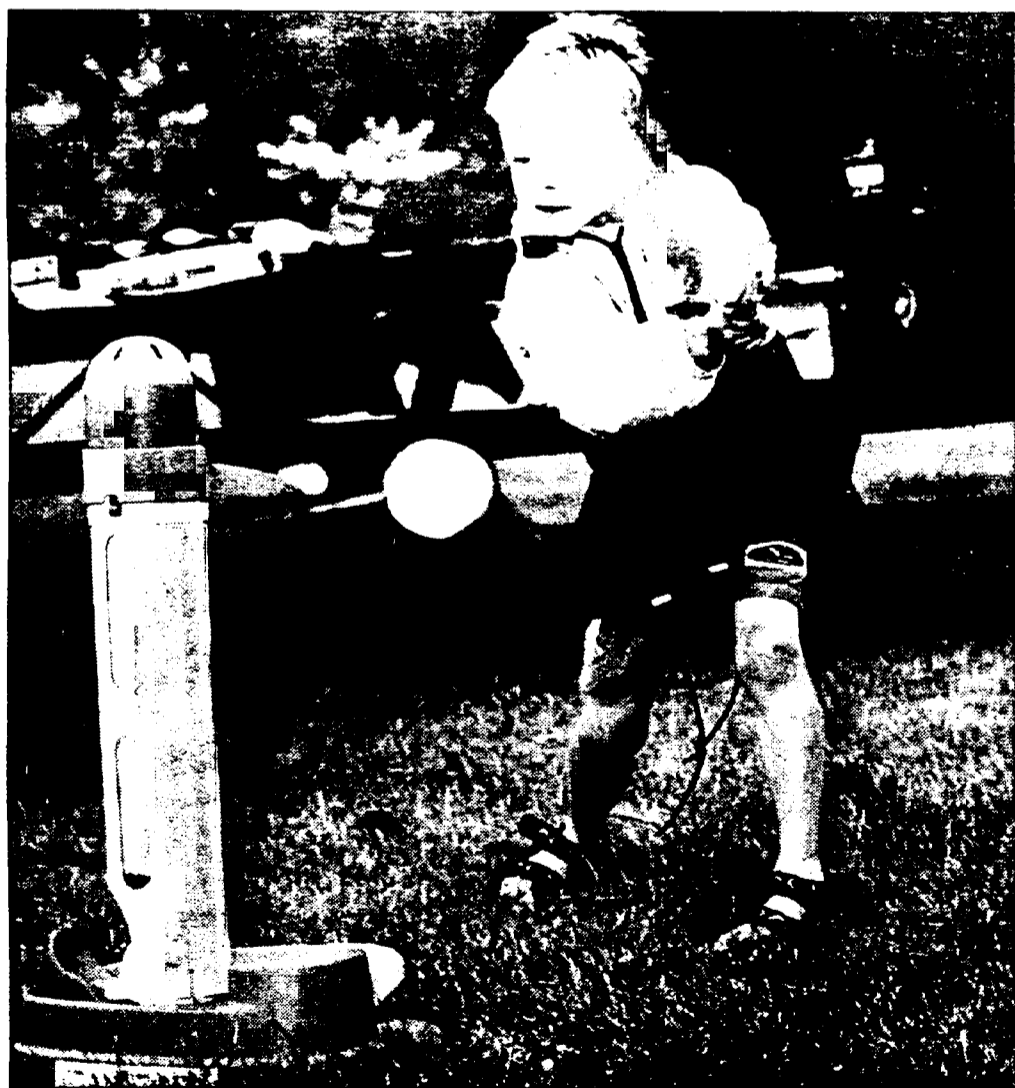

## Pickering teacher's motion may dissolve LOSSA Upcoming meeting may decide fate of high school athletics association

What next? A difficult enough question with respect to Lake Ontario Secondary Schools Athletics over the past two years will likely become all the murkier following the association's annual general meeting June 27.

The first order of business at Whitby's Sinclair Secondary School that day will be to elect a new executive.

If that happens, and there's no guarantee it will, the new executive will have to deal with a motion from Pine Ridge Secondary School teacher Jim Barclay to dissolve LOSSA entirely.

"Basically this motion is to hold the executive accountable for their undemocratic actions," says Barclay, referring to a decision by the executive to overturn a motion which passed "overwhelmingly" last year that would have forbidden teachers from coaching without a negotiated contract.

Bowmanville High School's Bill Todd headed a skeleton LOSSA executive this past school year to try to provide sports for LOSSA members who weren't part of the Durham school boards and interested parties within Durham.

But Todd and others may not be back to deal with the latest mo-



the school boards, principals and vice-principals to organize high school sports.

If there is an executive, all teachers within LOSSA schools will be eligible to vote on Barclay's motion.

Although the provincial government backed off on forcing teachers to supervise extra-curricular activities on Monday, the threat of Bill 74 has worsened already-bad relations between teachers and school boards.

"I think we have a similar situation to last year where we have a lot of people out there who are worried about Bill 74 and angry," says Todd. "To be frank with you I'm also angry."

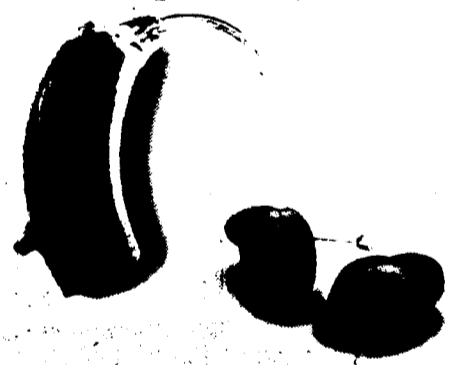

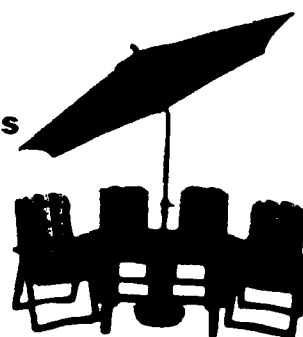

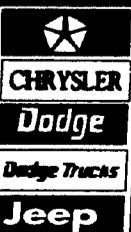
