Is it that time already?

Some Durham students hit the books Tuesday

More than 320 students from across Durham are preparing to hit the books Tuesday as C. E. Broughton Public School kicks off its year-round program for the fourth year.

And, as the popularity of the modified calendar continues to increase at the Whitby school, several other communities across the region are examining the possibility of year-round schooling in their neighbourhoods.

"I think it would be ideal for some schools," says Durham District School Board chairman Doug Ross, noting the board "struck a bylaw that each new school would have a committee to investigate the modified program."

The modified calendar, first launched at Broughton in 1996, begins in August and runs through to the end of June, finishing the same time as regular schools.

However, students and teachers attend classes for shorter stretches of time, with breaks spread more evenly throughout the year. The longest period students are in class is nine weeks without a break, which means the program is more continuous.

"It's been an effective calendar and it's worked well," says Broughton principal Katie Brown. "It's very smooth. It really does feel continuous."

Ms. Brown, who replaced Jack Smyka as the school's principal in February, reports enrolment in both of the school's programs has "steadily grown" since 1996, with enrolment in the modified school year calendar more than double what it was three years ago.

According to Ms. Brown, approximately 325 students start classes this week, with another 235 beginning after Labour Day.

Not so happy trails in south Pickering

Residents' group opposes waterfront plan

PICKERING — A proposal to veer the Waterfront Trail away from Lake Ontario and instead pass directly behind some homes here has concerned residents asking for local support at a Town Council meeting Tuesday.

Those residents formed the Waterfront Trail West Neighbourhood Committee this summer to come up with alternatives to the proposed route through the east part of the Petticoat Creek Conservation Area.

Committee members believe the trail should be routed along the waterfront, which would require construction of a bridge over the creek.

A proposal, however, calls for the trail to pass about eight feet behind homes on Broadgreen Street, which residents feel is an "expedient route", but not the "best route", literature from the committee says.

Not only would the proposal block some of the "best vistas" on the route, it would mean the disruption of an area that is home to "incredible wildlife", as well as raspberry bushes and trees, says Arlene Driedger.

Residents are also concerned about the impact on their quiet neighbourhood, as it would bring increased public traffic, overhead

lights and could possibly become a teenage hangout, Ms. Driedger reports. The committee has met with members of Town Council and the Toronto Region Conservation Authority. It believes it has come up with several worthwhile alternatives, including a trail at the top of the bluffs from the west entrance at Rodd Avenue to the mouth of Petticoat Creek at the eastern end of the park.

Several members of the committee will speak at Tuesday's meeting, which begins at 7:30 p.m. in the council chambers at Town Hall at One The Esplanade.

Durham gets \$500,000 in grant funding

Foundation to help Grandview among others

More than \$500,000 is heading to community groups in Durham including money for a regional treatment centre for disabled children, a boys and girls recreational facility and a high school-based community centre.

The money is part of \$100 million to be distributed across the province by the Ontario Trillium Foundation, a provincial government agency. One of the recipients, the Grandview Children's Foundation which runs a regional treatment centre for disabled children in east Oshawa is "ecstatic" with its portion of the funding which will total \$205,000 over three years.

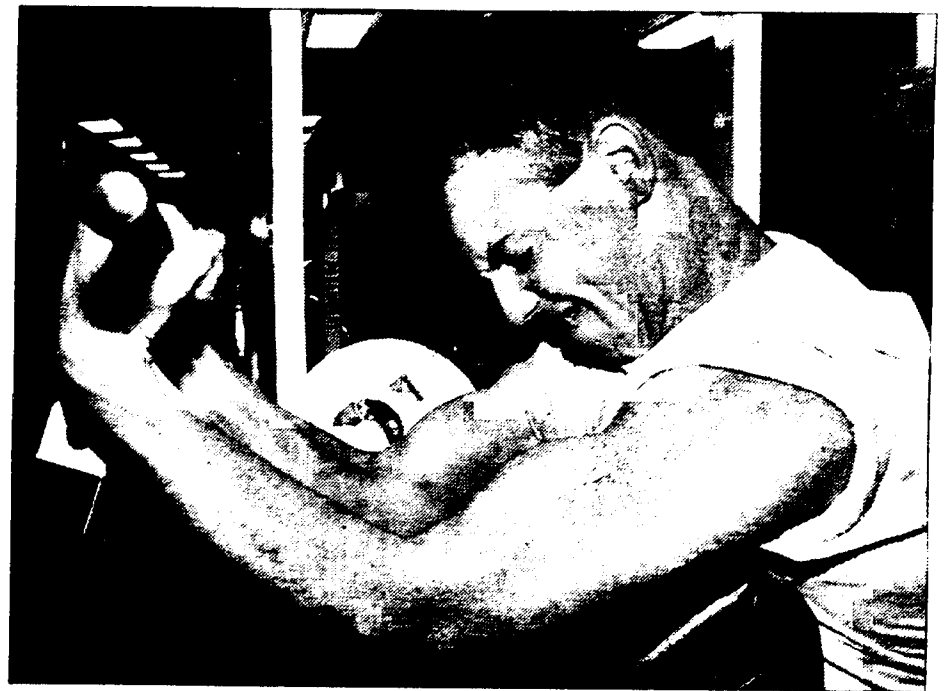
"We're ecstatic and thrilled. We're the only centre that doesn't receive any funding for a recreational therapist or recreational programming," says the

centre's spokeswoman Pam McColl, explaining why the centre applied for the grant. The centre did provide "as much as it could" in the way of recreational opportunities for the approximately 1,400 disabled children who use it, says Mrs. McColl. (Almost half of the 2,800 children who come to Grandview for treatment have a physical disability while the other half receive speech therapy at the centre.) Because of funding limitations, the centre could not staff the facility, which includes a therapy pool, after hours and on weekends. This money will allow it to do that, she says. "We're going to offer a swim program and music therapy and other social recreational programs." Ms. McColl says there is a real need in the community for these types of programs because although municipally-run programs always wel-

come disabled children, "sometimes it is not possible for some disabled children to keep up. A lot of parents here are ecstatic to hear this news; especially parents of young teens," she says, noting the scope of suitable programs narrows as the children become older.

Other funding in the announcement includes \$147,000 over two years for a community centre to be based out of G.L. Roberts, a south Oshawa high school. As well, the Eastview Boys and Girls Club, a sports and recreational facility in Oshawa will receive funding of \$75,000 over one year to improve and repair the existing facility.

An initiative to establish a community-based radio station for the Oshawa, Whitby and Clarington area will also receive \$75,000 over three years.

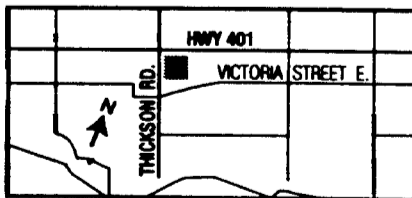

Modified calendar students back to class next week

"It seems there's lots of excitement about coming back," she says, explaining students in the modified calendar program tend to pick up where they left off "much more quickly" when they return from their five-week summer vacation.

"The enthusiasm is there," she says, noting staff members have been in all week and several students have already dropped by to check their class list.

And, although the school is located in Whitby, the program draws students from municipalities across the region because it's the only alternative offered.

In Uxbridge, trustee Nancy Loraine reports the modified program will be explored at Quaker Village Public School, slated to open early next year.

"My understanding is the SCC for the new school is going to have some discussion around that," she says, adding she's "sensitive to the fact that

there's a choice.

"Personally I feel there's a lot of validity to what (the year-round program) offers," Trustee Loraine says.

Don McLean, superintendent of Whitby schools, reports the possibility of setting up a modified calendar is up for discussion at all new schools, including Winchester Public School in Brooklin where Mr. Smyka, the principal, has formed a parent committee that's "exploring the possibility" of adopting a modified program.

Mr. McLean explains parents in each community where new schools are being constructed under the board's system-wide accommodation plan — including Ajax, Pickering, Uxbridge and Oshawa — will make a decision about whether or not to adopt the modified program.

And, while he says there has been "a certain degree of interest" in Brooklin, he notes the school "is not going to open on a modified school year calendar. A decision hasn't been made yet."

Street racing senseless

Speed is about thrills, power, machismo, but it's also about stupidity

It's about speed, thrill, power, machismo.

Or, in a word, just plain stupidity.

On any given weekend, hordes of adrenaline-pumped men, and even some women, rev their souped-up engines and put the pedal to the metal on a dark - and deserted, we hope - roadway in Durham Region and surrounding areas.

Among the favourite local strips frequently converted by devoted drag racers into late-night raceways are Colonel Sam Drive, Harbour Street, Winchester Road and Harmony Road North in Oshawa, Wentworth Street in Whitby and Taunton Road, Pickering.

And while there are no laws banning stupidity, there are when it comes to street racing, the pastime police say has risen in popularity in recent years.

In a effort to drive dragsters out of the Motor City, Durham Regional Police has assigned its special enforcement team (SET), aided from above by Air One, the high-tech Durham/York police helicopter, to shadow the midnight speed demons on nights when they gather.

"We're getting the message out firmly but fairly - it's not going to be tolerated," says SET Sergeant Gil Hughes.

"We're basically shadowing and monitoring them in marked police cars so they're aware of our presence. We're recording licence plate numbers and officers will also inspect cars

for violations," says Sgt. Hughes, adding the local crackdown appears to be having the desired result.

"It hasn't been a confrontational approach. We're finding it's successful with the threat of tickets and fines."

Such punishment may not be enough to deter the majority of these road rebels without a cause, simply because in the words of Bowmanville racer Anita Goodrich, "the risk of getting caught is half the fun."

We assume the risk of getting killed isn't enough.

Last year, there were four racing-related deaths in Greater Toronto, though none in Durham, and the toll is sure to rise given the illegal sport's following.

Auto racing belongs on designated tracks like Mosport, not on our neighbourhood streets where the risk of death or injury to innocent motorists is present. It's incumbent on the rest of the community to lend support to police in their efforts to put the brakes on the pastime. If you're a drag racer, please stop. If you're a witness to this activity or are aware of upcoming race locations, pick up the phone and call police.

You could be saving a life.

Rabies case shouldn't be overblown

To the editor:

I recently read in several papers about the first case of raccoon rabies in Ontario on the St. Lawrence south of Ottawa (Maynard). Obviously, this is of great concern to all but I hope not being blown out of proportion. The Ministry of Natural Resources

expends a great amount of energy toward the protection of wildlife and the public.

We have several raccoons and foxes living in our area (Dunbarton/Amerlea). The young foxes are frequently seen in our yard in the mid-morning and evening. They behave very much like young puppies, as they have not yet learned to fear people. They are curious and playful. Most importantly, they have been vaccinated for rabies by the Ministry. This very successful program of rabies vaccine baiting has virtually eliminated the incidence of fox rabies in Ontario. This year the ministry will dispense another 1.1 million rabies vaccine baits.

Another concern many people have is the possibility their small pet may be hunted by foxes. We have three outdoor cats who have survived six years of fox exposure even when the young foxes are being raised.

I have seen raccoons, ground hogs and even my smallest cat scare off the adult fox. On the flip side, I agree it is prudent to keep cats inside at night as there is a possibility foxes hunt more aggressively at night. So, if you see a fox during the day, don't be afraid of it, consider yourself fortunate.

Who knows how long we will be able to enjoy sharing our backyards with these and other beautiful wild animals.

The Ministry of Natural Resources is full of information about rabies, foxes and raccoons. Look them up on the Internet: www.mnr.gov.on.ca.

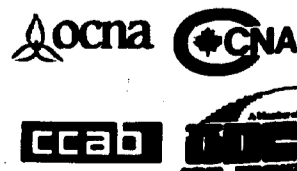

She just loves to burn rubber

Durham's hot rod mama can't get enough speed

Illegal street racing is presumed to be the nocturnal pastime reserved for hordes of young men revving their engines in a show of unquenched male virility.

For the most part, it still is.

But watch out, because that 'guy' in the icy-blue chariot next to yours, waiting with clenched teeth to launch down the track in an ear-popping, metal-grinding screech, just might be Anita Goodrich.

Yes, Goodrich. No relation to the tire company, mind you.

The Bowmanville resident is 26, a wife, a new mother, and more than most of the dragsters out there, an extreme speed demon.

"In a five-speed," she graciously explains, "you gotta load it up at the start, get your RPMs up you know? Then drop your clutch about halfway out so you still got traction off the line."

"If you can launch good out of the hole you got a good race," she continues. "As long as you don't misshift..."

Huh?

Mrs. Goodrich is racing under the stars, bumper-to-bumper with an overwhelming majority of men.

"Wake up, it's the '90s," she says.

Yet the scene last weekend near 2 a.m. on Coronation Drive in Scarborough was typical: of the 200 or so racers, only one was a woman.

No one knows how many racing junkies are women, but as one performance garage mechanic in Woodbridge says, "It's very,

very few."

Ask about her motivation? "Seeing guys who can't drive. I thought, 'I've got to be able to do better than that.'"

A true racing enthusiast, Mrs. Goodrich has always been a spectator at the race tracks and the illegal midnight runs that happen all across the city and on which police in Greater Toronto are now cracking down using a state-of-the-art helicopter.

It's over the past year she's taken to the track herself.

"The best was when I beat my buddy's Mustang II," she winks as she peels off her fire-retardant, racing jacket. "That's what racing's all about — bragging rights."

As for her friends, well, they're mostly male.

"I've always been a tomboy, more into guy things than girl things," she confesses. "It was Tonka Toys and Matchbox cars, not Barbies," she says.

In high-school, Mrs. Goodrich would run "field cars" with the boys. They would buy heaps from the junkyard for 50 bucks, smash out the windows, replace the gas tank with a Jerry can in the trunk, and "go Baja in a farmer's field trying to destroy the car."

So it comes as no surprise that she's just "one of the guys" on the quarter-mile strip.

"I've never had a problem, most respect me for running the races. Once some guys said, 'Oh cool, a broad.'"

"There's no reason why it should be a male sport, it has

nothing to do with gender."

So far, the police haven't stopped her, and for Mrs. Goodrich, "the risk of getting caught is half the fun."

But as she embraces her 18-month-old son Taran, the fiery redhead says she still considers her family her top priority.

"I am still a wife and mother. I've still got a job to come home to, so I can't be totally nuts," she says.

Mrs. Goodrich has another baby, though. A newly-purchased '68 Chevelle, which she says she'll paint canary yellow, and outfit with — what else — BF Goodrich performance tires.

And, the car? As if you had to ask. "It's a she."

Police aim to put stop to speed demons

Durham street racers put on alert

A Durham Regional Police special enforcement team (SET) is vowing to drive drag racers out of the motor city.

The seven-officer squad, formed this year to take on special projects, recently launched 'Project Welcome Mat' to curb the popular but illegal sport of street racing.

"We're trying to roll out the 'unwelcome mat' for drag racers. We're getting the message out firmly but fairly — it's not going to be tolerated," says Sergeant Gil Hughes, officer in charge of SET, an Oshawa-only unit.

"For years, Oshawa has been known as a hot-rod city, and that's fine, as long as it's not for drag racing."

Sgt. Hughes says street racing isn't as great a problem in the Durham Region as in some of the other 905 regions like York and Peel.

Still, several popular stretches

of roadway in Oshawa, Whitby and Pickering are frequently converted on weekends to late-night make-shift raceways.

Among the strips commonly used by the racers are Colonel Sam Drive, Harbour Street, Winchester Road and Harmony Road North in Oshawa, Wentworth Street in Whitby and Taunton Road in Pickering.

SET fired up the project last month and has aggressively hounded hot-rodders at their favourite pre-race gathering spots, parking lots down at the lakefront or the Hy and Zel's plaza at Ritson and Taunton roads.

"We're basically shadowing and monitoring them in marked police cars so they're aware of our presence. We're recording licence plate numbers and officers will also inspect cars for violations," says Sgt. Hughes.

"It's been working out very well. Since we've started shadowing them, the races aren't

going on in Oshawa. It hasn't been a confrontational approach. We're finding it's successful with the threat of tickets and fines.

"They're used to running around undetected, so I think just the (police) presence has made it uncomfortable for them and they've been moving elsewhere."

Several racers have been slapped with Highway Traffic Act charges for tire and seat-belt violations.

With drag racers equipped with modified engines, police scanners and cell phones, tracking their movements is like playing cat-and-mouse — except the mouse packs a turbo punch it throws with the touch of a button.

Now, however, the police department has its own high-tech tool to give them an extra boost.

Air One, the shared Durham/York air support unit helicopter, equipped with a 30-million candlepower search light, is providing police with an upper hand.



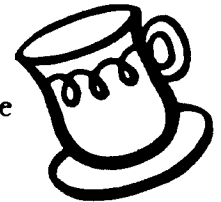

My name is Kurt Johansen. I'm project manager for the environmental assessment of Ontario Power Generation's proposal to return Pickering A to service. It's my job to ensure that a thorough assessment is carried out — one that meets the requirements of the Atomic Energy Control Board (AECB) and addresses the concerns of the community.

My interest in the project, however, isn't simply professional. My family and I have lived in the area for 25 years. I want it to continue to be a safe and clean place to live.

Here are answers to some questions we've been asked recently.



Q We have heard that the AECB asked you to do an environmental assessment. Will you do it?

A Yes. We've hired a qualified and experienced team of consultants and we're committed to doing a thorough assessment. By "thorough," we mean that the assessment will meet all the regulatory requirements, which will be determined by the AECB in the near future. In addition, our assessment will address the issues that were raised through the community consultation process last year as part of the Pickering Environmental Review program.

We have already begun preliminary planning for the assessment and are keen to begin consultation with the community and with other stakeholders — people and organizations who have an interest in the operation of the station.

Q Will the public have the opportunity to participate in the assessment process?

A Yes. We're committed to involving the community in the assessment process. Members of the public will have the opportunity to participate both before and after our submission of the environmental assessment report to the AECB.

Before the submission, the community will be invited to provide input to us and to the AECB on the details of the assessment. Once the details of the

assessment have been determined, the AECB will again invite public comments. As we conduct the assessment in accordance with the established requirements, we'll continue our community consultations.

After we submit the assessment there will be a period for public review and comment, and the AECB will provide an opportunity for community views to be heard at a meeting of the Board.

Also, the new Community Advisory Council — which represents a range of organizations and viewpoints in the community — will be reviewing our progress on the issues identified during our 1998 Pickering Environmental Review.

In addition, we've made an offer to the Town of Pickering that we would consider paying for an independent consultant to monitor the environmental assessment process on behalf of the Town.

Let's be friends: Trucking association works to change driving perspective

It's a motorists nightmare; being closed in on both sides by two trucks careening along the 400 series highways. What is more frightening is the fact that both truck drivers are unaware that the car is even there.

A terrifying possibility, and a likely one according to Brian Little, director of programs and communications for the Canadian Alliance for Roadway Safety.

"There's a lot of bad feelings out there between cars and trucks," says Mr. Little adding, "if motorists knew how many times they put their life in jeopardy every day around trucks they would be flooded."

After driving a truck for 17 years Mr. Little has experienced first-hand the chaos on the roads between cars and trucks.

In response, Mr. Little started the alliance in 1997 and created a program called 'Let's Share the Road' and has traveled around Ontario since educating drivers about blind spots and breaking distances of trucks.

"The program educates cars on how to share the road with trucks, a lot of information you're not taught in driving schools, nor tested on at the point of licensing," says Mr. Little.

The key element of the 'Let's Share the Road' program is the mobile educational centre which allows motorists to sit inside the cab of a truck with cars positioned around it. Once inside the motorist realizes that most of the cars surrounding the truck are invisible from the cab.

"Some people are very shocked by the display," says Mr. Little adding, "once you do the demonstration you'll never forget it."

So how do motorists make the roads safer for both trucks and cars?

Mr. Little offers one simple tip, "give trucks lots of room!"

In its third year, the non-profit organization has increased their demonstrations from five in the first year across Ontario to eight in Durham Region alone this year.

And the alliance plans to continue expanding their program in the new millennium possibly to the national level and also plans to introduce another program called 'Let's Be

Friends' to target road rage. Let's Be Friends is aimed at promoting courtesy on the roads."

says Mr. Little adding "the number one problem on the roads is aggression and lack of patience."

Once both programs are in full swing the goal is to encourage safer, more enjoyable highways.

"I hope to make the highways a very happy and normal place to be," says Mr. Little.



It will provide \$2,500 for the creation and enhancement of fish habitat and \$3,000 for improving wetland habitat within the Frenchman's Bay Watershed, though with some "strings attached," warns project coordinator Patricia Lowe.

"We are obligated to match those funds through in-kind support from community groups, government agencies and corporate sponsors," she explains.

"The time from our volunteers, donations of supplies and support for the various volunteer events from our project partners are all part of the deal."

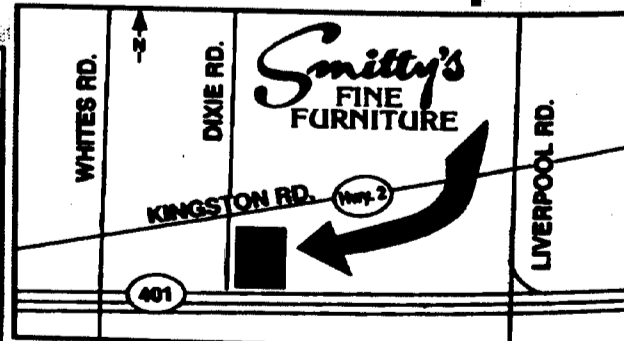

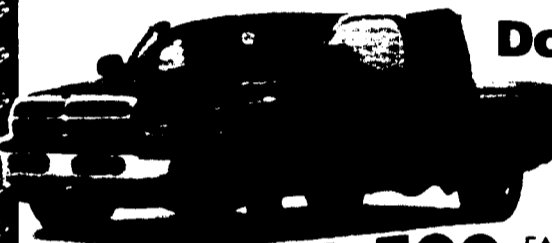

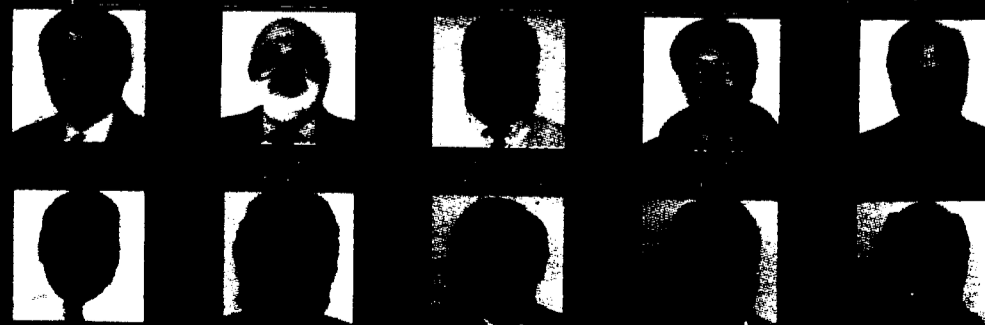

More great cut flowers for your garden

I have mentioned often over the years that the reason I really started to grow flowers was so that I could always have some in the house. So far this year, because of the beautiful weather we are enjoying, my garden is being very kind to me. I recently told you about a few of the plants that I consider great cut flowers. Here are some more:

Baby's Breath or Gypsophila

Nothing enhances a vase of cut flowers like a cloud of Baby's Breath. Gypsophila blooms late spring to early fall and prefers sandy soil. Cut when one-third of the flowers on the stem have opened. It is a very reliable plant and you know if you plant the annual varieties, you'll see flowers about six to seven weeks later. I have a beautiful pink double variety (whose name escapes

me) that is outstanding. Among white-flowered types (G. elegans), 'Snow Fountain' is the most upright and has the strongest stems. It also is the most prolific. You might have to stake Baby's Breath because it can become quite floppy. This is one flower however, that when it does flop it complements the other flowers nearby. You can expect Gypsophila to last five to eight days in a vase.

Lavatera

Lavatera is an old-fashioned annual that deserves more attention. Also called mallow, the blossoms of the pure white variety ('White Beauty', 'Silver

Cup') and the ruby-veined pink type ('Ruby Regis', 'Mont Rose') look like glossy hibiscus or hollyhocks. Maple-like leaves form bushy mounds 24 to 48 inches wide. The flowers are up to three to four inches. Lavatera flowers from mid-July till hard frost. They do best in moist, fertile soil. The time to cut the flowers is when three or four have opened on the stem and the others are buds. As a cut flower I have had Lavatera last well over a week.

Rudbeckia

Known as gloriosa daisy, coneflower and black-eyed Susan, this North American native plant blooms nonstop from midsummer until frost, even in partial shade. Rudbeckia is a tough plant. Most rudbeckias reach 24 to 42 inches in height. The stems are very strong and hold up very well to life in

a vase. Harvest flowers when the centres are still "tight." Technically Rudbeckia is a biennial or short-lived perennial, although it is often treated as an annual. Varieties to look for are 'Irish Eyes' which has five-inch, single

yellow, green-eyed flowers and 'Indian Summers'. 'Indian Summers' is a 1995 All-America Selections winner. This black-eyed, gold-petalled beauty boasts single and semi-double blooms of six to nine inches across.

NEW WASTE DISPOSAL FEES AT REGION'S WASTE FACILITIES

The Region's Waste Management Facilities in Oshawa, Port Perry, Blackstock and Brock Township will be collecting new waste disposal fees, as of September 8th, 1999.

There will be a minimum charge of \$2 per vehicle for all materials delivered for disposal, except for dedicated loads of Blue Box materials and Household Hazardous wastes. These special materials must be delivered as a separate load in order to be exempt from the \$2 minimum charge.

The \$2 minimum charge will apply to all vehicles, including cars.

It is anticipated these changes will improve the waste management services offered by the Region of Durham.

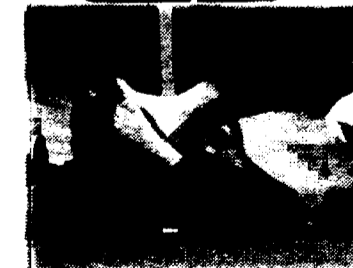

Freshen the spirit

Relax on Gulf Islands off B.C. coast

Salt Spring Island in British Columbia is the perfect place to veg out, enjoy the scenery, try new sports, eat oneself into oblivion and enjoy smelling the roses.

Although it may be an unknown entity to many, 10,000 call it home.

Salt Spring is the crown jewel of a group called the Gulf Islands in the Strait of Georgia, just north of the U.S. San Juan Islands and a 30-minute float-plane ride from Vancouver.

B.C. Ferries from Victoria or Vancouver also run to Salt Spring.

Sheltered from rough weather, these charming islands are covered with green forests and lakes.

They offer a peaceful interlude between visits to the two urban areas of Victoria and Vancouver.

The pace is slow. Creative juices flow in the scores of painters, sculptors and wood carvers who live and work here.

The laid-back style, mild climate and white beaches lure both the young and retirees.

Islanders raise sheep, make pottery and kayak in the nearby waters.

Bed and breakfasts dot the landscape, especially around Ganges, the island's main town. Beyond just relaxing, visitors venture forth to hike Mount Maxwell or camp at Ruckle Provincial Park.

The park was settled as a farm in 1872 by Henry Ruckle, whose descendants still live on the property.

Visitors may also run into residents with Hawaiian blood, descendants of some of the first settlers.

For a wonderful few days near Ganges, stay in a cottage or suite at Hastings House, an English country estate with 30 acres, a member of Relais and Chateaux, a worldwide group of hotels and restaurants.

The manor house was built in 1930 to match a 16th century Wessex Manor in England, so coziness is the theme.

A wicker basket of muffins

and hot drinks is left at your door each morning to tide you over until you make it down for the enormous breakfast.

A mammoth fireplace dominates the living room where, each afternoon, from 2 to 4, an elaborate and complimentary high tea is served featuring cakes, cheeses and fruit.

The menu is changed daily under the watchful eye of Swiss chef Marcel Kauer and often features fresh lamb and other local products.

Post House, the island's original post office now on the lush lawn of Hastings House, is a two-room cottage furnished in antiques and with a fireplace.

Its views embrace the nearby harbour and seaplanes which arrive regularly at the resort's dock.

Friendly geese and sheep wander the property and mountain bikes allow guests to explore the neighbourhood.

Manager Mark Gottas often suggests taking a map of art studios on the island and visiting as many as possible.

Our favourite among the nearly 20 we visited was David Jackson's Tufted Puffin Gallery, with its duck decoys and other carved works.

An extra treat on the trip was a friendly herd of deer.

The best view of the outer islands can be had by driving to the summit of Mount Maxwell, which is not all that high. Ganges has several fine restaurants as well as stores selling Alaskan and Canadian clothing and merchandise.

Tree House is a funky little eatery with a garden and the freshest of food. Other restaurants feature seafood.

The parks offer a variety of picnic sites.

And the calm bay waters tempt one to try kayaking, especially around sunset.

hunted. Finally, one night after the last ray of light had left the forest black, they were never to be seen again.

Despite hours searching the Black Hills area, neither of the filmmakers nor any trace of their gear was found. One year later, a bag full of film cans, DAT tapes, and video tapes were found. The behind-the-scenes video footage and the film are cut together to make a fictional movie which seems more than real.

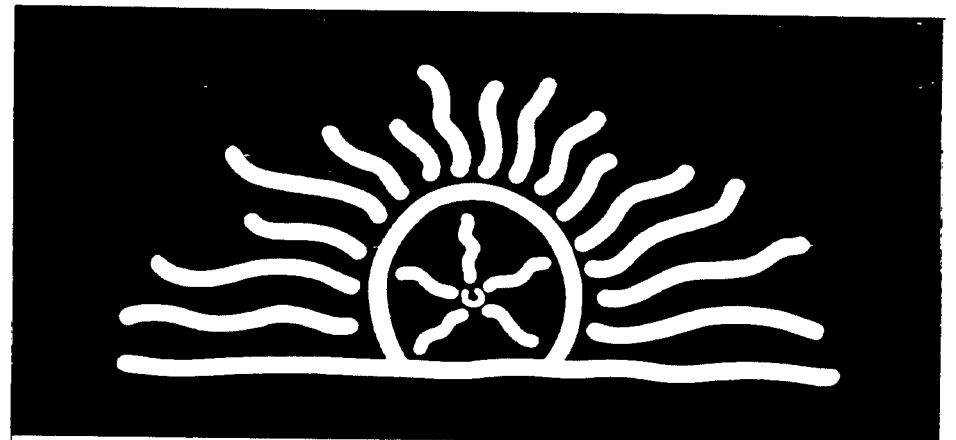



A number of local players will play for local entries in OBA elimination tournament

Durham junior teams to play ball in Ajax and Pickering this weekend

They're only rankings, but the seedings suggest two of Ontario's top junior teams are right here in Durham.

The Whitby Chiefs are ranked eighth, while the Oshawa Legionaires are the 10th best team in the province, according to the Ontario Baseball Association.

The Chiefs, who play in the Eastern Ontario Baseball Association league, are 20-5 in league play, 34-9-1 overall.

The Legionaires vaulted into the top-10 on the strength of a seven-game winning streak and a 17-8-3 record in the Leaside Junior Baseball League.

Both teams will compete in the Ontario Junior Elimination Tournament this weekend, hosted by Oshawa with games also being played in Whitby, Ajax and Pickering.

Seventeen teams are entered in

the Elimination, with the winner advancing to the Canadian championships Aug. 18-22 in Kitchener.

The Chiefs bring a potent supply of lumber and aluminum to the park, with six hitters above the magical .400 mark, led by pitcher-right fielder Ryan Balan, hitting an astronomical .594 with a team-leading five homers and 36 RBI.

"Top to bottom, we can hit the ball," says Chiefs' manager Rod Holinaty. "We can hit for power, but our strong point is hitting for average."

The Chiefs carry just 12 players and all of them are "starters" says Holinaty, praising his team's balance.

In addition to Balan, the offence features shortstop Terry Arges (.448, 34 runs), first baseman Mike Bridge (.444, 13 doubles), catcher Chris Huinink (.424), second baseman-pitcher Mike Ovsonka (.406) and infield-

er-outfielder Doug Clarke (.400).

Whitby also has an ample arsenal of arms, including righty Darryl Jenkins, who tossed a no-hitter against Port Hope earlier this season, has 4-2 record with 1.79 ERA. Balan, a lefty, is 2-1, with a 2.40 ERA, while Kyle McFarlane is 4-0 with a 3.24 ERA.

The team rode its bats and arms to six straight wins and the championship of its own tournament last weekend in Whitby.

If the Chiefs have an achilles' heel, says Holinaty, is its inability, to date, to come up big against the stronger teams in Ontario. As a result, the team recently returned from a nine-day trip to Florida, where it posted a 2-3 record against stiff opposition, including one team of players over 30 which featured five players with major league experience.

"Sometimes we don't play up to par against the better teams," concedes Holinaty. "It comes

from just not playing enough good teams."

The trip may already be paying dividends, as the Chiefs beat another top-10 team, Brampton, in the Whitby tourney.

The Legionaires' success is also predicated on their ability to swat the ball, says general manager Jim Lutton, pointing to the team's .334 batting average.

"We're a damn good hitting team," says Lutton. "We can hit with any team in the province. We can score runs, but we also give up a fair number of runs. I believe we have a legitimate shot (of winning the Elimination) but we have to play smart ball."

Among the leading hitters are centrefielder Al Stephens, of Ajax, who has a .494 average, John Skwarchewsky (.439), of Ajax, third baseman Adam Dupont (.372), rightfielder Ryan Sebris (.345), utility fielder Mark Cairns (.338), shortstop Lee

Delfino (.333), a Pickering resident, and catcher Darryl Reid (.269, 7 HR).

Delfino, a Blue Jays' prospect who finished his first season at East Carolina University on an athletic scholarship, is playing for Canada at the Pan-Am Games and won't play for Oshawa this weekend.

Although the team's earned run average is 4.97, the Legionaires believe their offence can take them over the top.

"As long as we've got one more at bat, we're not beat," says field manager Troy May.

The two local teams begin play Friday, with Oshawa hosting East York at 5:15 p.m. at Kinsmen Stadium. Whitby faces Courtright at Iroquois Murkar Field at 7:45 p.m. The final goes Monday at 10:30 a.m. at Kinsmen Stadium and due to the double knockout format, there's the possibility of a second game at 2 p.m.
