## TAXPAYER CHARGES THAT TOWNSHIP TAX BILLS ARE ILLEGAL

Mr. S. A. Osterhout, of the 4th concession, appeared before council this week, stating he represented a number of ratepayers from various sections of the township who wished certain questions answered. He asked if the power vested in the office manager was dictatorial. He said he called the dog catcher and was told that instructions had to come from council.

Reeve Scott said council does not instruct the dog catcher at any time. At the moment people do phone the municipal office in this regard. In an emergency, call Mr. Gerigs. Councillor Harvey Spang said he understood that in the past two weeks, a number of emergency calls had not been taken care of.

Mr. Osterhout asked if it was customary when buying equipment to get more than one price.

Reeve Scott said that where possible, it is policy to get three prices. He said invariably the low quotation is accepted.

Mr. Osterhout said he understood that some school assessments were left off the tax bill. "I believe this tax bill is illegal," he said.

Reeve Scott said he presumed the office manager is responsible for the tax bill and said that the township's solicitors would check into the matter at once.

Mr. Osterhout asked if mail was opened, if a letter was addressed to a certain person in a certain department.

The reeve said that unless the letter was marked 'private' it was opened.

Mr. Osterhout said he believed this was a federal offence to open anyone else's mail. He told council he thought the office manager's job should be annulled to see if the township was saving \$7,000. He suggested a firm of efficiency experts be called in to study the matter.

Reeve Sherman Scott said that the office manager has considerable dictatorial power within his own department but is responsible to council for his actions.

Mr. Osterhout said that owing to the number of mistakes in the office manager's office, he doubted if the office was a necessity. "Any office can make errors" said the reeve.

Reeve Scott said, "those members of the staff who resigned were given a chance to come before council and before a committee of council and did not wish to do so. I don't see what council can do."

A motion was made that the resignations of Mr. Baker and Mrs. Spang be not accepted before May 30, 1960 but shall be accepted on that date, unless they see fit to meet with council or a committee of council, prior to that date, to express their view with Mr. Turk present.

"This is the third time they have been offered the chance to appear" said the reeve. "They may wish to

have it a public meeting, and I would be more happy if they do".

## High School Gets Criticism

Mr. S. A. Osterhout told Pickering township council this week, he knew there was a great deal of dissatisfaction with the Pickering High School.

"Can the board be elected, instead of appointed," he asked.

Reeve Sherman Scott said it can't change under the present set up. For the township to set up a board of education would create some difficulties, he said.

"When any school has 60 per cent failures and the drop-out that this school has, there is something wrong," Mr. Osterhout said.

"Have you brought this to the attention of the Board," asked the reeve.

"Not yet," said Mr. Osterhout. "I brought this to the attention of the board chairman this week and suggest that other ratepayers do the same," said Reeve Scott. "The wheels are in motion for a change."

Reeve Scott referred to a meeting of Ajax, Pickering Township and Pickering Village last week, when Ajax announced they wished to withdraw from the high school area and form their own board of education. He said the two Pickering municipalities asked time to study the move before another meeting was arranged.

## Claim Rosebank Lot Is Hazard

A lot on which a house is being built in the Rosebank area was said to be littered, a fire and health hazard by neighboring residents this week.

Messrs. Lowery, Neil and Churcher all appeared on the same matter, claiming that the yard in its present condition was lowering the values of homes around it. They said there was enough litter around the home to build several homes, and that the litter was attracting rats. They asked that something be done to have the owner clean up the yard. By-law Officer Harry Ashton said he only heard about the matter on Saturday and had talked to the building inspector and the health unit about it.

He said the builder was a widow with four children and the building inspector was trying to hurry things along.

Mr. Lowery said he felt it would be a good house when completed, and was not objecting to the house, only the condition of the yard.

Mr. Ashton said the by-laws would be enforced and the litter would be moved.

Mr. Lowery said it had already been moved several times to different parts of the yard.

## New Phone Books Out This Week

Over 4,100 copies of the new Bell Telephone directory will be distributed throughout the area this week. The 1960 edition of the directory serves 23 communities.

The books will be multi-coloured which is a completely new concept, replacing the traditional beige covers.

As an indication of the growth, more than 70,750 of the books are slated for delivery in this territory this year which covers Oshawa, Port Hope, Port Perry, etc.

## REEVE SCOTT SAYS COUNCIL MEETINGS WON'T BECOME A CIRCUS

Council meetings in Pickering Township are not going to become a circus, Reeve Sherman Scott announced at the opening of this week's session.

"This is a council meeting and not a public meeting," he said. "Anyone wishing to be heard, will be heard now, not later on."

Mr. Scott said that council is a democratic institution elected by the people of the municipality.

"We will not allow anyone to go into a tirade to discuss members of council or items discussed by members of council," the Reeve said.

"Everyone will be treated with respect," he added.

The reeve said that anyone wishing to be heard, would be heard.

## First Boating Accident Reported At Bay

The first reported boating accident of the season, fortunately was not too serious. It took place at Frenchmans' Bay on Sunday afternoon.

According to Pickering Township police, a sea flea, driven by Nathan Barkwill of Toronto, struck a cabin cruiser, which was tied up to the dock at Keancraft. One of the planks above the water line was stove in.

Police said no one was injured and no charges have been laid.

## No Funds Left For Land Valuation

Pickering Township council informed their solicitor this week, there were no funds in the account to pay the valuator of the Picov property.

The valuator's bill was \$314.33.

The bill was returned to the solicitor, stating there are no funds to honour this account.

## Township Will Study Procedure Bylaw

Councillor Ross Deakin asked this week, if it was possible to have a procedure by-law.

"Most other municipalities have," he said.

Clerk Johnston said that a procedure by-law had been prepared some years ago, but never passed.

Councillor Edgar James said there were clauses in the other by-law he did not like.

Councillor Clifford Laycox said he favoured a procedure by-law.

The clerk was instructed to prepare a procedure by-law for council's consideration.

## Suggest Central Fire Alarm

Councillor Ross Deakin told council this week that he had been informed by the Bell Telephone that a fire alarm system could be installed, connecting all fire departments in the township for the amount of \$140 a month. It would be a rental alarm system.

Councillor Harvey Spang said he wondered if this would work with the party system on the old crank type of phone still used in the north end.

"Some women won't get off the line even for an emergency," said Councillor Deakin. "I have heard people can't get through for a fire or a doctor. However if you keep cranking, they can't talk."

The fire committee and fire chiefs will meet with the Bell and discuss the matter.

## Plan Layout Of Museum Buildings

A comprehensive report, submitted by E. C. Petitjean, who, with Wm. Rankin and T. W. Beddall, Architects, studied the Pickering Township Museum site in Brougham last week, was accepted by the Executive of the Township Historical Society, at their meeting May 12th. Attached to the report was a blueprint made by Mr. Rankin, showing the Green River School at the rear of the old Brougham school-house, facing west, with a plan to

ultimately connect the two buildings with a breezeway type structure. The log house now on the site will be placed in the south-west corner, at the rear, among the trees.

The general layout was described by E. C. Petitjean in his report as based on different factors: philosophy and aims of the Historical Society, general appearance, visitors' conveniences, provision for future buildings and limited funds.

To beautify the grounds, it was recommended that a fence be placed alongside the road, with one means of entering through a gate, which locked; placing gravel along the front part of the lot, and flower

beds, so as to give a colourful aspect from the road; providing a gravel loop of approximately ten feet wide in the rear part of the lot, leaving the centre part with grass, and possibly locating an old well, to be placed in the centre. A fenced service yard will be located at the east of Brougham school in which large articles can be stored, and the parking space will be restricted to 25 or 30 cars.

Following the report, discussion arose about the moving of Green River building. Mr. Frank Prouse, Twp. Building Inspector, a member of the Museum Committee, suggested the Green River School be

dis-mantled, moved, and re-built on the Brougham site. Final arrangements on this to be made on May 19.

### "The Indian Doctor"

A book suggested as a valuable acquisition to the Museum by Miss Blodwen Davies, historical writer, is "The Indian Doctor - Family Guide to Health". This volume was printed in Oshawa in 1818, and is considered desirable by the Museum Committee. If any can tell of the whereabouts of this publication, Robert Miller, Chairman of the Museum Committee may be contacted at WH2-4637.

Mr. Frank Brown, Windsor, reveals that he is the owner of an "autographed quilt" - Pickering Tp. names, done in 1860, and has offered it to the museum. Steam threshing engines (six of them) are being investigated. A few articles of historical value from the recent sale of the J. D. Kemmer estate, were donated - iron boot-jack was one of these items.

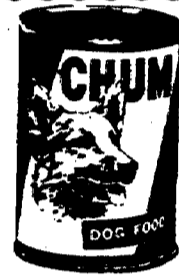

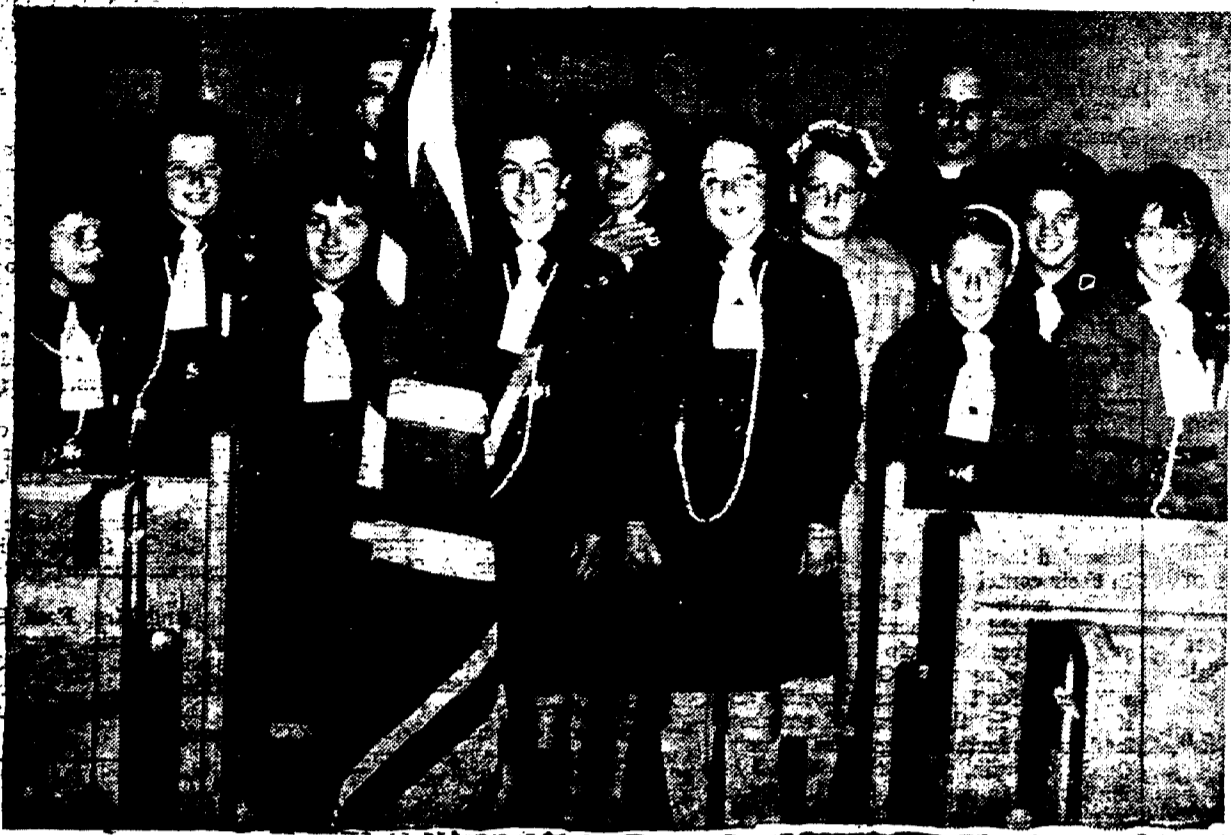

### Pickering Township Weed Control Act

1. Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner shall destroy all noxious weeds thereon as often in every year as is necessary to prevent the ripening of their seeds.

2. Where the land abuts a river, stream, or lake, or other body of water, the occupant or owner as the case may be, shall destroy all noxious weeds as required under Sub-Section (1) that are growing between the limit of his land and the low water-mark of the river, stream, lake or other body of water.

15. No person shall deposit or permit to be deposited any noxious weed seeds in any place if to do so is likely to cause the weed seeds to grow or spread.

Every person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or of the Regulations or refuses to obey any lawful order of any inspector, or who interferes or obstructs any inspector in the performance of his duties, shall be liable to a penalty up to \$50.00.

## Water Course Said Blocked

1. Every occupant of land, or if the land is un-occupied, the owner shall destroy all noxious weeds thereon as often in every year as is necessary to prevent the ripening of their seeds.

2. Where the land abuts a river, stream or lake or other body of water, the occupant or owner as the case may be, shall destroy all noxious weeds as required under Sub-Section (1) that are growing between the limit of his land and the low water-mark of the river, stream, lake or other body of water.

15. No person shall deposit or permit to be deposited any noxious weed seeds in any place if to do so is likely to cause the weed seeds to grow or spread.

Every person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or of the Regulations or refuses to obey any lawful order of any inspector, or who interferes or obstructs any inspector in the performance of his duties, shall be liable to a penalty up to \$50.00.

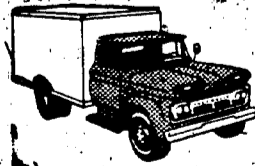

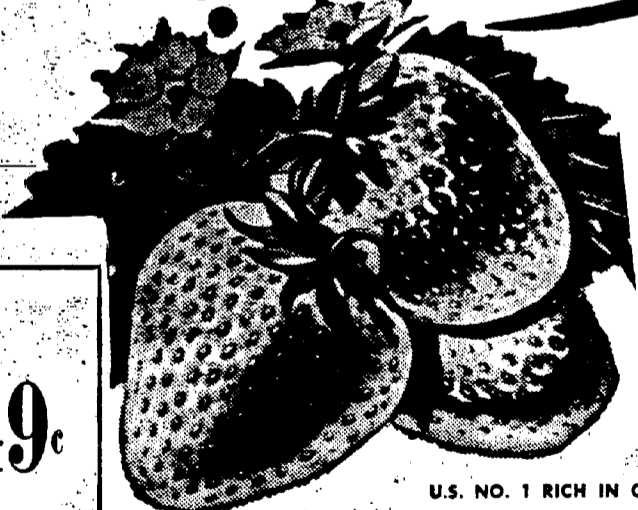
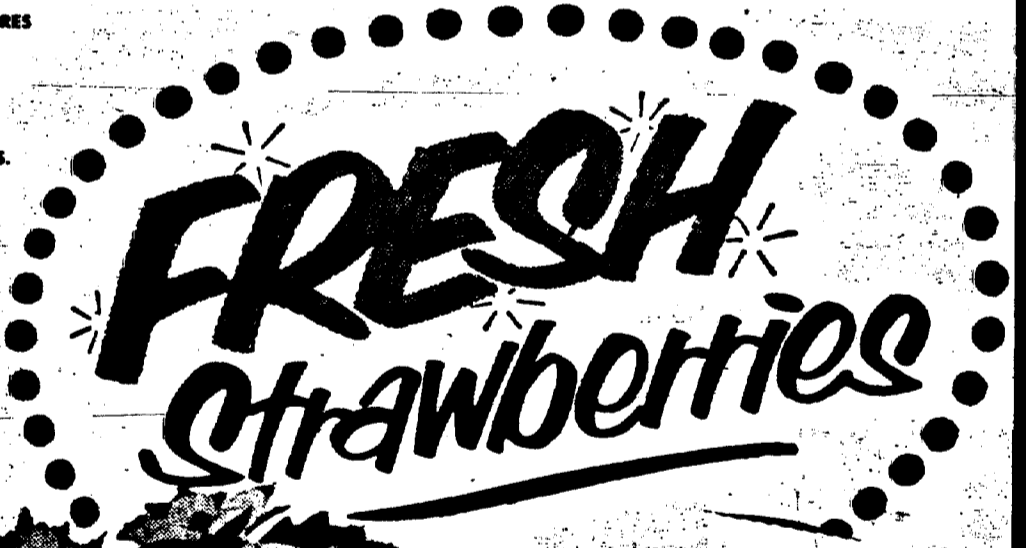
