Township To Adopt Local Officials Policy On Parks

Councillor Clifford Laycox this week urged township council to adopt a policy with regard to parks.

"I feel the township is going to have to acquire park land," Mr. Laycox said. He suggested that the township might meet dollar for dollar any amount put up by a group or organization for the purchase of park land. He mentioned that the Lions club at the Rouge would like to purchase the Howe property adjoining the present park.

Councillor Edgar James said, "I hesitate regarding the parks because I feel there will be other requests and I wonder if we can stand it."

Councillor Ross Deakin said he favoured the idea.

"I think it is a way to limit the number of parks because I don't think there will be many requests," said Reeve Sherman Scott.

Deputy-reeve Ross Hawthorne suggested a committee be set up to study policy with regard to parks.

Reeve Scott named the following committee: Councillor Edgar James, chairman; Deputy-reeve, Ross Hawthorne, Councillors Harvey Spang and Clifford Laycox.

Local Officials Meet On CNR

Last week a special meeting was held to discuss access line crossing of the C.N.R. in connection with township roads.

Present were: Reeve Sherman Scott, George Todd, chairman of Planning Board, Road Supt. Jack Chapman, L. T. Johnston, township clerk and H. S. Pearce, Planning Board clerk. Mr. Ray Desjardins for Metro Planning was there along with J. L. Cann, A. E. Oulton and D. McCorquiale for the C.N.R.

It was a preliminary meeting and very little was finalized.

It was agreed that there would be an overpass over Highway 401. Probably a subway under No. 2. All agreed that Altona Road would be a grade separation (this means over or under the railway). Other roads that will have to be studied further will be Pine Ridge, Spruce Hill, White's sideroad, Bayview, Rosebank, Woodview and Pine Grove.

Mr. Cann pointed out that the Board of Transport Commissioners must approve every crossing. Normally if the railway and municipality can agree, the Board will go along with the proposed solution.

It was agreed by the meeting that C.N.R. carry out further studies in connection with all these crossings and that the township engineer work with the C.N.R. on such matters as drainage and grades for overpass and diversion roads.

Subdividers May Have To Bring Some Industry To Locate Here

Pickering Township council has adopted the policy, at least in principle, that all future residential subdividers must also bring a percentage of industrial assessment to the township.

A motion was passed that read—that the council adopt in principle the policy that any residential subdivider be required to provide a percentage of industrial assessment and that residential subdivisions only be approved where services (water and sewers) are available or available within one year.

This motion was sparked by councillor Ross Deakin, who said he had been recently in discussion with Mr. Wilson of the Metro Industrial Commission. He said that Mr. Wilson told him that he felt that advertisements in foreign newspapers and brochures were useless in attracting industry to an area.

Reeve Sherman Scott said he felt there should be some tie-up with new residential and industrial assessment but said the whole idea required a great deal of study.

Deputy-reeve Ross Hawthorne said he agreed with the principle but not the wording of the motion that was made. Councillor Harvey Spang also objected.

Twp. Garbage Men To Be More Courteous

Pickering Township sanitation men will be told to be more courteous in the future to taxpayers and to return two five gallon cans to a West Rouge resident that they carted away a week ago.

This business results from a West Rouge resident's complaint that the garbage men did not return his cans and were anything but courteous to his wife when she inquired about them.

Bay Ridges Plan Not Registered Yet

Pickering Township, as matters stand at the moment, are no nearer a water and sewage plant, than they were two years ago, according to Reeve Sherman Scott.

Mr. Scott told council this week that delay in registering the Bay Ridges plan at Fenchman's Bay is because it has yet to get the minister's approval. Once that is obtained, the plan will be registered at once.

Mr. Scott said that former township engineer, T. O. Jefferson and engineers for the developer had agreed on a design for the sewage plant. This design had been used in other countries but not here. The O.W.R.C. would not approve the design so a new design is being drawn up.

Museum Again At Indian Village Here

Members of the Royal Ontario Museum's archaeological department are again working on the Indian village north-west of the village and will be there for the summer. There are about 17 on the job and the public is invited to go up and see the site at anytime.

The site is located at the top of Valley Farm Road. Watch for the blue and white signs and the red arrows.

The "dig" is under the direction of Walter Kenyon who became a very popular figure with Pickering residents during his stay here a year ago.

The Indian village believed to be one of the greatest finds ever made by a museum crew received a great deal of publicity last year in the press and on TV. The members of the crew are working on the ground inside the village wall and expect to be making the discovery of a new burial any day.

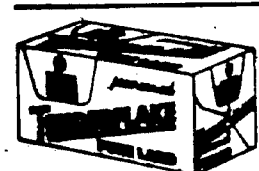

We also hope that it will induce the right kind of people and not just those who see dollar signs in connection with the job.

It has been said that because council work today takes up so much of a person's time, many qualified and interested persons hesitate to offer themselves. We think there is truth in this.

The present rate of pay for councillor's, on the average of a regular meeting and a committee meeting, 50 weeks of the year would net a councillor \$1,500 per year plus mileage to and from all these meetings. Not bad.

This may do a lot to strengthen council, or it may weaken it. Only time will tell.

Gets Driving School License Here

Mr. Jensen of Oakwood Drive, at Rosebank agreed before council this week to pay the \$60.00 required to open a driving school and to establish his business in an area where zoning would permit it.

He said he did not feel it was fair that he pay this amount when taxis only pay \$27.50.

It was pointed out by Deputy reeve Ross Hawthorne that taxi stands also pay a business tax in the township.

Mr. Jensen was told he could not operate from his home under the present zoning bylaw.

Mr. Jensen said he felt his probing into the matter was only making matters worse for himself. He had previously uncovered the fact that the police were issuing driving school permits under the taxi by-law; then he ran into the zoning problem.

Consumers Gas Want To Lower Rates

The Consumers' Gas Company has asked the Ontario Fuel Board to approve on an interim basis rate reduction it estimates will save residential and commercial heating customers approximately one million dollars in the 12 months ending September 1961. These reduced rates will be effective on meter readings on and after October 1st, 1960. It is expected that they would remain in effect on an interim basis, until a public rate hearing has been held.

A. L. Bishop, President, in announcing the move, said this would be the 9th voluntary rate reduction made by Consumers' Gas since 1955, when Natural Gas replaced manufactured gas in Metropolitan Toronto.

"This follows our stated policy that our customers are entitled to the lowest possible gas rates and highest standards of service consistent with good business practice," Mr. Bishop said.

"The new heating rate would, if approved, apply throughout Consumers' greatly expanded distribution system from Brampton in the west to Bowmanville in the east, north to Barrie and along Georgian Bay to Collingwood, and in Peterborough, Lindsay, Brockville, Ottawa and the Ottawa Valley."

Average saving to house heating customers under the proposed new schedules would be \$4.77 for a year. For commercial and medium sized industrial heating customers substantial saving would result.

Heating customers would benefit next summer by extension of the period of summer billing to include the month of June, as well as July and August. The summer reductions bring June, July and August bills down from a high of about \$7.00, to between \$3.00 and \$4.00 each month, with furnace pilots on and hot water units operating.

Mr. Bishop noted that Consumers' voluntary rate reduction policy had proved highly successful in obtaining house heating and water heating customers. The total of heating customers in 1955 was 3,500. Today it is over 70,000.

Lawyers Will Study Twp. Assessment

Pickering Township lawyers will investigate the matter of township assessment in regard to appealing the county's equalized assessment that will boost the township's assessment by \$1,547,544 and also boost the amount they pay to the county by \$16,174.

Reeve Scott said the solicitors feel the matter should be considered very seriously. They also said that depending on how far the appeal is taken, it could cost the township considerable.
