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Dunbarton High School Opening Attended By District Dignitaries

The new 17-room Dunbarton High School was officially opened last Friday evening when the building was dedicated by board member Dr. W. A. McKay, minister of Dunbarton United Church.

Tenders are to be called this week for an additional 14-room vocational school under the new plan of the federal government, 75 per cent of the cost to be paid by the government.

Guest speaker, A. H. McKague, assistant superintendent of the Department of Education, stressed the importance of what these new vocational schools will do for the students, who ordinarily would drop out of the general course, but now will be able to go and learn a skill. He said the department is enthusiastic about the new plan because they feel it will provide more people with skills and education.

He said that grade nine is an exploratory year and that teachers should act as guidance counselors.

Board Chairman Harold A. Mitchell chaired the program.

Re-Assessment

This matter of re-assessment is a complexed bit of business that we will not undertake to explain here, even if we could.

But it has been drawn to our attention this past week, rather forcibly that some means of explanation should be given to the ratepayers. Many of them are angry, some even crying discrimination. They ask at Brougham, but according to them they still do not understand why such big jumps on one piece of property and not another. We gather this is the main source of annoyance.

One man says his assessment has gone up 500 per cent on a two-acre pie-shaped piece of property, another says his is up 600 per cent, while his next door neighbor with more land and better buildings has not been increased at all. This man claims to be living on a \$3,000-a-year pension but it now classed as a gentleman farmer.

The assessment department uses rules for assessing but even they must acknowledge that people wonder and ask questions when they hear such complaints as the above.

Surely some form of explanation, written in layman's language could be sent out or published so that taxpayers could digest and understand just what is being done as regards re-assessment and why.

It is a public relations job and a big one but we feel it would be well worth the trouble.

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season. This procedure had been followed since then and had proved to be very popular with patrons. The post office hopes that patrons will take advantage of the new packaging not only at Christmas time but throughout the year.

The postmaster-general said that in the introduction of packaged stamps for year-round sale represented another step in the post office department's campaign to offer better, more efficient service to the public.

The sale of postage stamps packaged in transparent sealed envelopes is now underway in post offices across Canada. It was revealed in an announcement made by the postmaster-general, the Hon. William Hamilton. In making the announcement, he pointed out that these packages are another original innovation by the Canadian Post Office Dept., as no other postal administration has ever offered a similar item for sale. The new attractive clear plastic packages contain blocks of 20 five-cent stamps or 50 two-cent stamps and sell for the regular price of one dollar. They are designed to provide patrons with a more convenient method of purchasing postage stamps in quantities to carry in one's pocket or purse. The packages protect the stamps against dirt, moisture and heat. In addition, the packaged stamps provide maximum sanitary protection from printing to point of sale at the postal wicket. It is anticipated that the packages will prove to be very popular with postal patrons since they will reduce the number of calls that are normally made at post office wickets. The packages will also be more convenient to the patron as they can be kept easily and safely in pocket or purse after opening and in this way, the stamps are fully protected.

Mr. Hamilton said the idea for the plastic packs had originally started with the sale of special one-dollar envelopes of stamps during the 1958 Christmas

Co-op Sales
Indicate Big Year

The volume of business handled through the Claremont Co-op during the year, ending July 31, 1961, reached an all-time high according to the financial report presented to the 13th annual meeting of shareholders in the Village of Brougham on Thursday night. Net sales totalled \$41,259, an increase of almost \$34,000 over a similar period in 1960. Net savings for the year, before patronage returns, amounted to \$19,339. This is \$4,351 over 1960.

The president, Mr. Allan Ellcott, informed the gathering that the sales volume had set a record high and profits were also up accordingly. He pointed out, however, that due to Claremont's proximity to Metro Toronto, local business was becoming less dependent on feed sales and more dependent on sales of hardware and petroleum products. Petroleum purchases have increased from \$66,922 in 1960 to \$89,318 in 1961. A new truck has been purchased to provide improved customer service. Mr. Ellcott praised the work of the manager, John McIntyre, and expressed the board's regret at his leaving to take over managerial duties at Alliston. He also commended the other members of the Co-op staff for their efforts.

New Store



"We are in a financial condition that allows us to be progressive," said the manager, Mr. McIntyre. "I am sure that when the store is completed, you will all be proud of it."



Father Officiates **Bus. & Professional Women's Clubs**
At Local Wedding **To Mark 'Business Women's Week'**

The role of women is becoming increasingly important in the overall economy of Canada. To help Canadian women to discharge their growing responsibilities more effectively, the Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women Clubs have launched several important projects.

Among these is a Canada-wide study of inheritance laws as they affect the status of women. The study is being conducted by the legislative committee of federation. Also projected is a three-part study of the employment conditions committee of their 7,000-member body. First of these, is a survey among members of the federation of the implementation of equal pay legislation and the extent to which pension and retirement benefits are provided. Secondly, the 170 business and professional women's clubs in Canada will undertake "Careers Preview" programs in their communities. These will provide counselling to girls in high school and pre-high school level and assist them with information pertinent to the career they may choose to

follow. It is hoped that the program will encourage young girls to take full advantage of educational opportunities available to them in view of the steadily rising demand for qualified personnel. The third phase of the employment program is continuation of the campaign to eliminate differentials paid men and women under minimum wage laws in provinces where such discrepancies still exist.

Business Women's Week, being nationally observed October 16-22 will draw attention to the contribution Canadian women have made and are making in all fields of endeavour related to Canada's development.

Following is a letter received from Mr. J. G. Diefenbaker, Prime Minister, to the Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs:

In observing Business Women's Week, you are reminding Canadians of the increasingly important role women are taking in the business, professional and public life of this nation. The Canadian Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs has helped to create an awareness of the benefits of society through greater scope for women. Indeed, today the number of women employed in Canada is greater than ever before.

The federation has been a powerful force in the campaign to remove discrimination against women in business and professions and contributed much to the enactment of the bill of rights, which specifically provides that there shall be no discrimination because of sex.
