The new 5 room Separate School which contains 4 Class-rooms and an assembly room is located on a 5 acre site on Liverpool Road. The new building cost \$100,000.00 and was designed for additional rooms. The architects are busy now

preparing the plans for a two-room addition next spring. His Grace blessed the building and grounds in a special religious ceremony held prior to the official opening.

Council Sets Policy On Culverts

Pickering Township Council, last week, passed a Resolution dealing with the matter of replaced culverts on re-constructed roads.

Mr. Ken Pentland, Altona Road, a resident of fifteen years, said that his culvert, a sub-standard type, was removed along with fill, from his driveway. He said he did not mind paying for a new culvert, but felt it unfair to charge him for putting back the fill.

Council's Resolution, moved by Councillor Wank, and seconded by Councillor Greening, stated that—on road construction, re-placement of non-standard culverts would be charged at the rate of \$40.00, to the property-owner, and the township would pay for the installation and fill.

Ajax, Pickering And Whitby Association For Retarded Children

The 1962-63 Funds Campaign for the Aldon School for Retarded Children will see canvassers visiting all parts of Southern Ontario County, October 21—27.

Ajax Mayor Wm. A. Parish, Campaign Chairman, said this year's objective of \$25,000 is earmarked for 18 months' operating expenses, as well as for the retirement of the building mortgage. Last year's campaign was for a 12-month operating period.

While an Educational Campaign for public information on Retarded Children will be conducted in May 1963. The next fund-raising campaign will not be held until May 1964.

This year's campaign will again feature the theme — "A Happy Picture"—using a picture of an Aldon School pupil in advertising and publicity material.

Canvassers and their leader are being organized this week, said Mr. Parish. "The important thing the public needs to know, is that we will need one and a half times the giving, because of the extended, 18-month period between campaigns," he said.

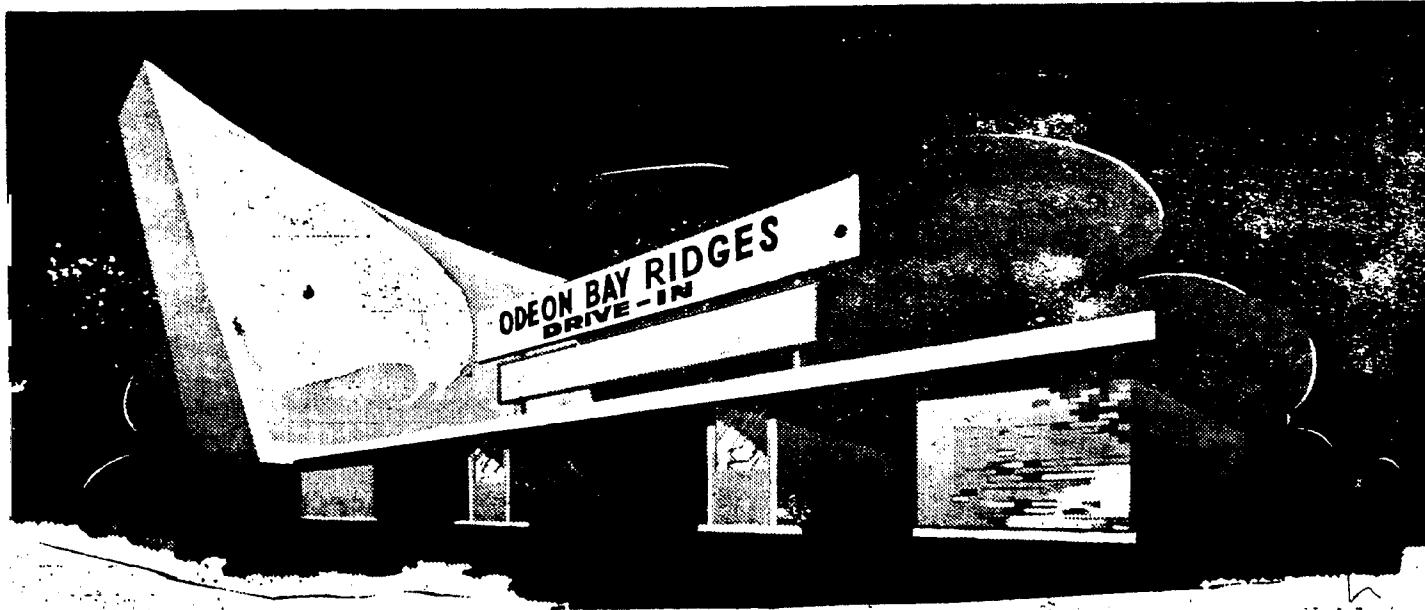
