Ross A. Murison Elected Reeve Of Pickering Village Council

Ross A. Murison was elected Reeve of the Village of Pickering Council at the inaugural meeting last Thursday evening.

Mr. Murison will hold the post of Reeve for 1964, completing the term left vacant by the resignation of Reeve C. E. Morley.

Following the swearing-in of Mr. Murison, as Reeve, Clerk B. A. Hogarth, swore in Mr. Victor Dingley, as a member of Council for the year 1964.

Reeve Murison in his inaugural address, said that he accepted the position with pride, and felt that, with the help of Council, the village should have good government, as in the past.

"In taking over this post, I have a large pair of shoes to fill," Reeve Murison said. He reviewed some of the accomplishments that have taken place in the village during Mr. Morley's reign of office, such as the purchase of the Hydro System, water services installation, building of the new fire hall, buying a garage for the Works Dept., building a new Municipal Office, street paving and new street lights.

Mr. Murison said the village is well within the 1963 budget and may end up with a small surplus.

He said, in comparing 1962 with 1963, there had been an increase in assessment of \$41, 111.83, and the population had gone from 1777 to 1816, an increase of 39. Nearly 90% of the 1963 taxes have been collected. The total tax arrears amount to \$27,203.02.

The Debenture Debt outstanding is \$335,819.00. Of this amount \$600 is for the hospital and is assumed by the County. \$151,582.00 is for the

Hydro and Water, and the balance of \$183,637.00 is for the schools.

The final payment on the hospital debenture will be made in 1964, and the final payment for "waterworks" will be made in 1969, and the Hydro in 1977.

"I think we are in very good shape," said Mr. Murison. He said Council would be discussing the "sewer question" in the near future.

"It was a first" for Mr. Morley, who, after eighteen years of public service, sat in the audience, instead of the Reeve's chair, Mr. Morley said, "it was with some regret that he stepped down from the Reeveship. He congratulated the new Reeve and Councilors. He expressed personal appreciation of the assistance of Clerk B. A. Hogarth, and Mr. Hogarth's courteous manner, to both Council and the Public. He said he had always received co-operation from the village people, and hoped the same spirit would continue to prevail.

Councillor Len Burningham said that 1200 feet of storm sewer had been laid during the past year. He said the paving had been held up, pending a decision on "sewers". He said, the Road Dept. would end up with a small surplus.

Councillor Bas. Kearney said that last year the village signed a contract with the Township, Police, and expected it would be renewed in February. He said he felt it has worked out well. He said some new street lights had been installed in the south end of the village. A contract signed with the Twp. Dog Control Officer, and the Building Inspector was re-engaged for another year.

Councillor Ron. Watson said he was sorry to see Mr. Morley vacating the Reeveship. He said the rink house is now being used. He has been chairman of this Committee for the past two years. He said "Welfare" in the village is down a little from 1962.

Councillor Dingley said he was glad of the opportunity to be of service, and hoped he could prove himself during the year, so that, at the next election, he could get in by the "front door instead of the back".

Rev. Dr. H. S. Shepherd, of St. George's Anglican Church, Pickering, conducted the induction ceremony at the inaugural meeting, above.

Council Building In Disgraceful Condition - Reeve Cliff Laycox

Reeve C. W. Laycox in his inaugural address said that office conditions at the Municipal Office were disgraceful, especially the clerk's office located in the council chambers. Mr. Laycox said he felt such conditions cut down efficiency, and council would have to consider a new building in future plans. He said he was opposed to County Assessment and asked council to support him in having the bylaw rescinded. He said he would look on his job of reeve, as a full-time job. He said expansion of services will have to be considered and he plans to push for greater educational grants. Mr. Laycox said he would go out and he hoped with the support of the council, to try and get some new industries located here.

Deputy-reeve Jean McPherson said she was entering her 6th year on council. She said she was making no promises, other than to work in the best interests of the township.

Councillor Harvey Spang (1) said he agreed with bringing the assessment back to the township and felt it was time to straighten some things out in the assessment department. He said he would take a stand on any matters that come up, and felt "if we all share problems that are at hand, there will be less dissension among the ratepayers".

Councillor Wm. Newman (2) said that although he had served 6 years previously on council, times change and he felt he was now a newcomer. Mr. Newman said he felt council has to face problems head-on. He is concerned about township capital debt and said this must be kept down, or people will be taxed out of the township.

Councillor Don Waring (3) said being a newcomer he had a lot to learn and felt if the council would help him, he could help them. He said he would look after the welfare of the township in general.

Councillor John Campbell (4) said that he felt that a council that agrees on everything is not a good council and that out of disagreement comes agreement. He said he would be making no promises, other than to work to the best of his ability.

Councillor Herb Wank (5) said that council has many problems to face and that the township must have planning and controlled development.

Rev. Hunter of West Hill gave a brief but inspiring message to the new Council, urging all to have convictions and to face up to them.

Pickering High Plans 23 Room Addition; Cost Over \$1 Million

High School Board To Meet With Councils, Of Township, Village, Ajax

Pickering Township Council was informed this week that Pickering Dist. High School Board will meet with the three municipalities to discuss their proposal of a 23-room addition to the Pickering High School.

On May 21, the High School Board asked Council to issue debentures for \$637,606.00 for a 19-room addition, which the Council approved, but which the Board has now abandoned.

The Board is now asking for \$1,333,462.00 to build the 23-room addition. This will include: 13 class-rooms at 725 sq. feet each; 1 special classroom, 900 sq. feet; 2 laboratories at 900 sq. feet each; 1 library at 1400 sq. feet; 1 general shop, 2500 sq. feet; and another at 2000 sq. feet; 1 gymnasium at 3150 sq. feet; 1 cafeteria, 3500 sq. feet, and administration office (no specifications included).

"It appears the cost has doubled since last year, with the addition of only four rooms," said Councillor Newman.

The Councils of the Township, Pickering, Village and Ajax will meet soon with the High School Bd. to discuss this proposal, in more detail.

Township To Plow Private Lanes

Pickering Township Council passed a motion this week to rescind a former bylaw which will now allow workmen to go in and plow private roads at a minimum charge of \$7.00 for the first hour.

The motion put by Councillors Newman and Spang was strongly opposed by Councillor Herb Wank on the ground that the Department of Highways advised Council they will not pay subsidy on this work, nor cover any damage to machinery while on this work.

Mr. Newman and Mr. Spang countered by saying that the farmer is getting very little in the way of services for his tax dollars at present.

Reeve Clifford Laycox broke the tie on a recorded vote favouring the motion.

Yeas - Reeve Laycox, Deputy-reeve McPherson, Councillors Newman and Spang, Neys were Councillors Wank, Waring and Campbell.

A second motion was passed in connection with the above, to the effect that the Township assume no liability for any damage done to property, persons or livestock while plowing private lanes.

Daughter Presents Gavel To New Reeve

Reeve Clifford Laycox received a gavel at the township's inaugural meeting on Monday as a presentation from his family who were present for the occasion.

His daughter Leslie made the presentation, on behalf of her mother, two sisters and brother. The inscription read "To Daddy on the occasion of his inaugural as reeve of the Township of Pickering January 6 1964. Signed Mother and the kids".

W. H. J. Thompson Named In Honour List

Receives Q. C.

W. H. J. Thompson, of Pickering was among the Ontario lawyers named in the Queen's Honour List, on New Year's Day.

Mr. Thompson, local Barrister and Solicitor, received his Title of "Queen's Counsel". He resides in Pickering Township, and conducts his law practice from his office in Ajax.

Mr. Thompson graduated from Osgoode Hall in 1953, and has been practicing here for the past nine years.

Mr. Thompson has always taken a keen interest in local affairs, especially the local political scene, and is widely known throughout this district.

Reeve Laycox commented on the matter, by saying that by returning the same people every year, tended to cause a certain amount of staleness.

Councillor John Campbell said there are a number of capable persons in the township who are willing to be of service, but don't know just how to go about it.

Rosebank Home & School Asks For Footpath On Toynevale Road

The Rosebank Home and School Association appealed to council this week to put in a walk or footpath for the children along Toynevale Road, who have to walk to Rosebank Public School and St. Mary's Separate School. A child was killed recently along this road.

Councillor Herb Wank said that Altona Road and others were also in need of such a walk.

Reeve Laycox said he felt an expenditure for a walk was little to give away, if it would save a life.

Deputy-reeve Jean McPherson said she would like to see a walk in several areas, but the problem has always been the maintenance, after they have been built.

It was agreed the Road Committee should look into the matter and report to council.

Motion On County Assessment Held Over Until Next Week

A motion by the Township Council to have the reeve and deputy-reeve request that the bylaw, passed by Ontario County, to have Pickering Township under county assessment rescinded has been held up for another week.

The motion had been made by Councillor Wm. Newman and seconded by Councillor Harvey Spang.

Councillor John Campbell charged there was a lot of emotionalism in connection with the pro and cons argued in the meeting on the subject, and that he was not prepared to vote on the motion until he had heard both sides and studied the matter.

Councillor Herb Wank argued that county assessment was a means of eventually getting equalized assessment in the county and that this type of administration by the larger bodies was being favored by the Provincial Government. In answer to Reeve Laycox's remark that municipal bodies will soon be only policy making bodies, Mr. Wank said that is just what they are, because that is their function. He said that only when all townships in the county are on county assessment, will there be a yardstick to go by. He said as it is now, the township is carrying the bulk of the load.

Deputy Reeve Jean McPherson said she had argued against county assessment, as far back as 1959, because she felt they were trying out the

township as an experiment. She said now that it has gone through and two others are in on it, she would favour giving it a chance. "I think the minister will want some good reasons for us backing out now. It will make us look stupid to have a bylaw passed one month and then go back the next month and ask that it be rescinded," she said.

Councillor Wm. Newman did not like the suggestion he had made the motion, because he had made a statement on the political platform. He said, he had given the matter a great deal of thought, and feels the assessment should be brought back under council control, or soon they won't have any control at all. He said he feels the assessment department needs a complete overhaul.

Councillor Harvey Spang said that a lifetime resident, he had never seen so much dissension among the ratepayers. He too agreed the assessment department needs an overhaul.

Councillor Don Waring said he did not feel council was doing a job of representing the people, if they throw the control over to the county.

Reeve Cliff Laycox said he had an "on reasonably good authority, the costs under the county system, would be increased by at least 10%," he said it might be a good thing if all the county was under the system, but feels it will be a cumbersome thing to handle as it is now.

A Good Start

Pickering Township Council appeared to get off to a good start on Monday night. It is obvious there is a mixture of personalities on council and there is bound to be a clash sooner or later. However, on Monday night it appeared that all members were working to get the business at hand taken care of, and efforts were also being made to keep the blood pressure down at times.

We admired John Campbell's stand on the question of assessment. He wanted to hear both sides of the argument on County Assessment and time to think about it after hearing the arguments. These are important decisions and a new Councillor or an old one, is foolish to let a motion, resolution or bylaw get by them if they don't completely understand what it is all about.

One move Council made this week that we feel could get them into a lot of trouble, was in rescinding a motion of a few weeks ago, and now allowing the plowing of private lanes. They have been told there will be no subsidy on this work and their insurance is no good if they damage their machines at this work. We are not opposed to the farmer getting some help, nor does the cost bother us. It is the liability problem that might arise, if someone is injured or even killed while this work is being done, that bothers us. Council's motion to absolve the township of any liability for damage or injury while this work is being done, in our opinion at least, would not look very strong in a serious law suit.

This particular move could have far reaching effects and could become a real headache to both Council and the Road Department, even if there are no claims put forth to Council.

Objective Not Yet Reached

Ontario County Tuberculosis

And Health Association

In speaking for the Ontario County Tuberculosis & Health Association, Mr. D. L. Crozier, the hard-working Chairman of the Christmas Seal Campaign, stated "We have not yet reached our objective, but I am confident the citizens of Ontario County will answer their Christmas Seal letters." He went on to say that the campaign really has two jobs to do — one, to get funds for our year round preventive work, and the other, to keep us abreast of the facts about TB. Mr. Crozier said "What is required is persistence, a reason-

able amount of money and common sense. The persistence is in finding new cases and following up former patients, making sure they are not having a relapse. The money is to pay for such services. The common sense is in getting all concerned to use the diagnostic and treatment services which are available. Despite the availability of chest clinics conducted throughout Ontario County, patients still are found with far-advanced disease before starting treatment. This, of course, keeps the chain of infection going."

In speaking of the global situation, Mr. Crozier stated that not all countries have Seal Campaigns, for, in some countries, letter writing is not yet an activity in which the bulk of the population indulges. The countries whose TB Associations have no Christmas Seal Campaign, are the ones where rates are as high or higher than Canada's were in 1900. Their task looks hopeless today, but it looked pretty hopeless in Canada sixty years ago.

East Woodlands Association Reports Year's Highlights

The Association's year is coming to a close, and we wish to tell you some of our activities during the past year. Our boundaries were enlarged last year to include the area in the No. 2. 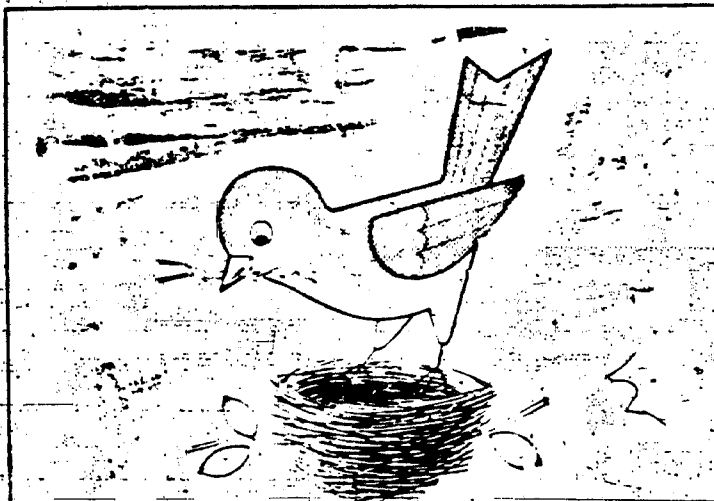

By-Ways of Nature

After the mild fall, winter suddenly overtook us by surprise. Early in December, a small flock of Pine Siskins flew across the Rosebank Road N., into a field, while several Mourning Doves and a Meadowlark were near the railway tracks. A Pileated Woodpecker put in its appearance again near Joe Amos' pond, and just lately, three Mallard Ducks flew over their house. I even saw a Robin in Frank Mitchell's orchard a day or so before the first snowfall. From time to time the Amos' have unusual experiences with their pets. During the summer, I was told, a mother cat and a mother Bantam Hen exchanged sitting services. At first they each had their own nests in some bales of hay which they gradually merged into one nest. The cat took her turn to sit on the one chick, while her hen reciprocated by doing the same to the small kittens. Three days after Christmas, I saw two Crows on the Altona Road, and while walking through the woods I was startled by a heavy thud as an object apparently fell from a tree; then was buried by the deep snow. As I went over to the spot, there was a sudden "whirr", and a Ruffed Grouse arose, followed by another, which seemed to appear from nowhere, take off deeper into the woods — another of Nature's tricks. I saw a Northern Shrike just recently, near the railway tracks, waiting for a chance to catch an unwary field mouse or small bird. Dr. Speirs, along with some other naturalists, took the bird census for Pickering Township, on December 26, and reported that forty-five species of birds had been seen, some of the highlights of which were: 9 Robins; 14 Crows; 1 Towhee; Pine Grosbeaks; Evening Grosbeaks; A Sparrow Hawk; A Brown Creeper; a Winter Wren; a Hawk-Owl; several species of Ducks and Geese on the lake, and a Cow. Winter-time can be a good time to look for animal tracks in the snow, which can tell a story, and one can enjoy a country walk amidst a sparkling world of freshly fallen snow.

"The Church And The World Today, As I See It"

Rev. M. R. Butters, Minister of Pickering United Church, scheduled to speak at the dinner meeting of the local Rotary Club, on Monday, on "New Year Resolutions" decided on something different for a topic. "Something" that any loose-lipped reporter might be inclined to say was "an address that gave his listeners something to put their teeth into", "something to bend an ear on" or just "something to think about at your leisure".

Commencing, Mr. Butters made the observation that "he was speaking to many who listened to him regularly every week, and—some, not so regular. He did acknowledge a relaxed atmosphere at this table, and probably said some things that he would not find quite so easily spoken from the pulpit.

He claimed the local minister, (he believed) retained the honour and respect of his congregation, but was now "an old man", and may not be taken seriously—the church-going public had become "careless and indifferent". There was a day when the church and the little red school-house was the centre of community activity, which has now given way, in a large measure, to the school—a situation with which he had no quarrel.....he acknowledged the many fine things the school had done for his own family.

"Let's face it", said Mr. Butters, "we have pluralism in our society of today". The Bible is not read, as at one time Genesis is no longer accepted as "historical fact" by a great many persons".

One statement by Mr. Butters (one that brought forth a bit of chuckle) was that, he "was afraid too many people did not know where the local United Church was located..... he had to enquire of the Village Municipal Clerk as to the "street number of the church building," so he could advise many in the neighbourhood.

"Fundamentalism" and the "modern" as distinct trends of thought and study may not be as pronounced today as at one time, but the Bible is still the biggest seller and an exciting book to read. Science and Religion were closer together in understanding and interpretation, and with this there is still the conviction that "the Christian Faith is still The Ancient Power".

Though the recognition of Christianity is still a powerful force, the future of religious life and activity is unknown, the speaker looks as always to Christianity to re-mold the lives of men, as it has ever done.

The address listened to by Rotarians on Monday evening, will be remembered as one of the most thought-provoking presentations they have received in some years.

(If any of the readers of this report doubt that the church is something to be reckoned with, we suggest you read the story on the front page, Globe and Mail, January 7, about the Anglican Clergyman in England, and learn how he handles his problems. — Ed.)

Ontario Secondary Teachers' Federation

Toronto—Universal public education "has failed abominably to produce thinking human beings," and revision of the system, "is necessary. Margaret Robinson, retiring president of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, told the Federation's Annual Assembly here last week. Speaking at the annual dinner of the 18,000-member organization, Miss Robinson, who is a teacher at Forest Hill Collegiate in Metropolitan Toronto, expressed serious concern over the results of the public education program and called not only for a change in the system, but for a new basis of finding the revenues necessary for education. "Mass Education, so far, has tended in the main to produce an average conformist who thinks what they are told to think and to do what they are told to do. We have given our people democracy without

freedom," she said. Miss Robinson said that consideration will have to be given to the tremendous range of technical devices available to mankind today and tomorrow, to re-draft the whole teaching process. Teachers would have to be re-trained, new concepts in school design would have to be accepted and "we must resist all attempts to put control of education costs in the hands of those who do not share our concern for real education," she continued.

A society which would indulge in luxuries, legislators who will spend vast sums on defense, the industrial structure which will uncompromisingly spend money on unimportant activities, will have to re-shape its thinking, she felt. "We are going to have to change the whole public philosophy about the value of education."

Among the more than three hundred and fifty delegates to the assembly, were Mr. A. Andrew, Anderson St. High School, Whitby; Mrs. Bloom, Henry St. H. S., Whitby; Mr. R. Farrell, Central Collegiate, Oshawa; Mr. G. Minard, Dunbarton H. S., Miss I. Moote, Uxbridge H. S.; Mr. R. Sheffield, Donevan C. I., Oshawa; Mrs. E. P. Rogers, Pickering D.S. High School; Dr. O'Neill, Life Member: O. S. S. T.F., of Oshawa.

The teachers were told by their new 1st. Vice-Pres., Miss Phyllis Monkman, Royal York Collegiate, Etobicoke, not to be content with their "status quo of the classroom" but to take the leadership in the field of education studies. She said the Federation should extend help to their colleagues in the newly-emerging nations of the world. Ontario Secondary school teachers, she stated, should seriously ask themselves

if they were really doing enough to improve the teaching profession on an international basis. The meeting voted to oppose any attempt to control teacher-school board bargaining through compulsory arbitration. I. M. Robb, deputy general secretary, of the Federation, warned of the movement to have conciliation and arbitration procedures made part of provincial legislation. Contract negotiations between teachers and trustees should be on a local basis, Mr. Robb maintained, and free from enforced arbitration.

Concern was expressed by Scarborough delegates over the fact that "at least two-thirds of Ontario's Senior High students are being overlooked by an outdated system of scholarships." It was felt that scholarships were on the whole directed to helping academic students only, with the result that many vocational students were doing without higher education through lack of available scholarship assistance. Canada's pool of native skilled craftsmen was drying up, and the situation was being helped very little by the school system, it was maintained. A resolution calling for further study of federal and provincial scholarships for vocational and technical students was put forward for study and report by a special committee.

The meeting also agreed to establish two \$2500 Fellowships in the name of the late Rumer Henry, of Toronto, the Secretary of OSSTF for twenty-three years. The Fellowships would be available to teachers undertaking study and research in education matters. A grant of \$1000 was approved to send an Ontario teacher to Africa to assist teachers there in training course.

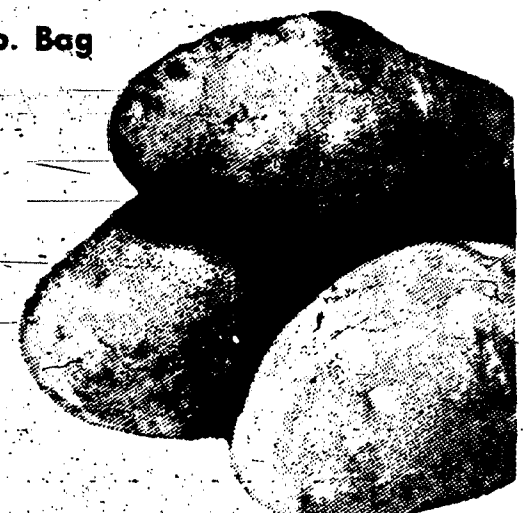

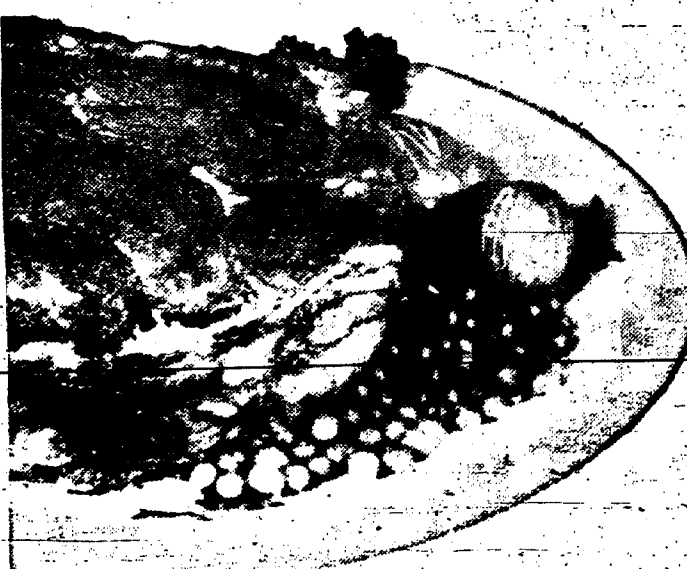
