Sparks Fly In Discussion On Township School Areas

A resolution from School Area 2 Board, asking council to endorse the idea of one area for the township of Pickering, touched off a debate on Monday night, that got nowhere and ended up with the council agreeing to meet with school trustees of the township and the school inspector, in an effort to come up with some facts and figures and opinions.

Clerk L. T. Johnston advised the council that the inspector is willing to sit in on a meeting with the trustees and this meeting may be held next week.

Councillor Herb Wank said he felt that in time, the north end would benefit from south end assessment. He said the matter of one school area requires a lot of discussion.

Councillor John Campbell said, "it was supposed to be one school area in the first place, until the north end boys began lobbying."

"I take exception to that. I don't like that word lobbying. There were lots of delegations into the Department over the very same thing," said Councillor Bill Newman.

"Why was there so much of a secret about it?" asked the Reeve.

"The Federation of Agriculture presented a brief. I went along with them. I told the council that before," Councillor Newman said.

"I think council has been pussy-footing on this matter for weeks," said Mr. Wank, "and there is no doubt about it."

Councillor Don Waring said he felt there was information available to council that has been withheld.

"Have you facts and figures as to why there should be one area?" Mr. Newman asked Mr. Wank.

"Have you facts and figures as to why there should be two?" Mr. Wank asked Mr. Newman.

"Yes," said Mr. Newman. "I have. Firstly it is a matter of dollars and cents and secondly, the north end does not want all the trills you have in the south, nor do they want to underwrite them."

He pointed out that a large percentage of the graduates of Grade 13 are from the north end of the township.

Councillor Waring said he felt the north end children were entitled to all the opportunities of those in the south end.

"The north wants the best education; they can get for their children," Mr. Newman said.

"I think the north is interested in two areas mainly because of the cost," said Reeve Clifford Laycox.

Councillor John Campbell charged that the north end of the township has been riding on the tails of the south end for years.

"If this goes through, I'll move for a split of the township," he said.

Reeve Laycox said he wanted to have it proven which was best for all, a one school area or two.

Deputy-reeve Mrs. Jean L. McPherson said she could not vote on the resolution until she had heard all the pros and cons.

During the discussion there were inferences that information was being withheld, charges of lobbying, and the old north versus south brought out again. The reeve accused the Deputyreeve of not showing respect for the chair, and tempers flared right and left.

On a recorded vote, it was carried to endorse the School Area 2 resolution that Pickering-

Now \$25.00 To Move Your Buildings

Mrs. McPherson said she felt that if a farmer wanted to move one of his buildings, he would just go ahead and move it.

Purpose of the bylaw is to prevent people from moving shacks into the township and living in them.

This is the last old bird Eastern Course. Congratulations to Tripp and Son for winning the "Old Bird" average speed, and to H. Horton who took second place.

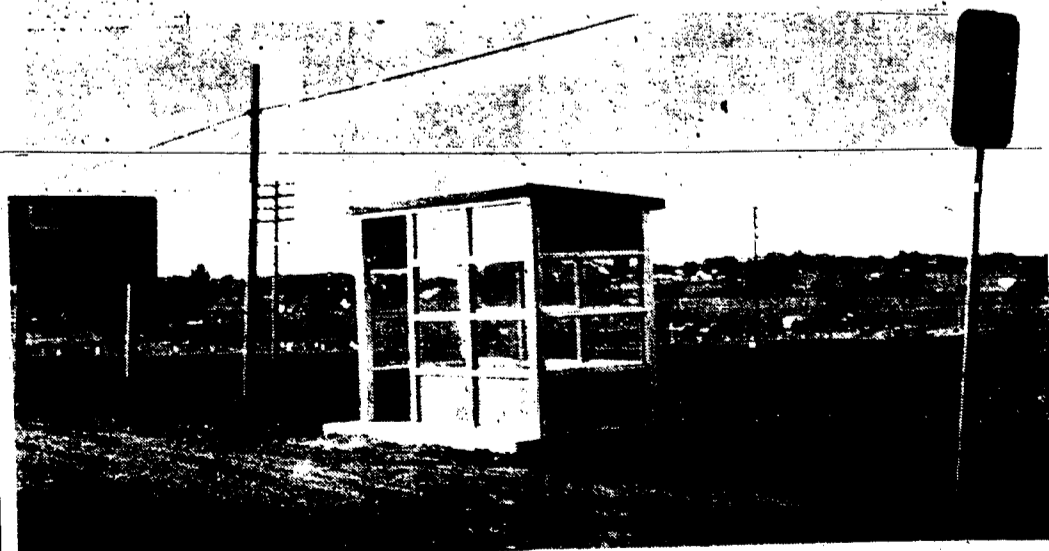
Village Council Okay Signboard, Church St.

For about twenty years now, this writer has been covering the local council scene and, during that interval we have heard many a heated argument and debate. In fact, a good lively discussion often bolstered up for us, what would have been an otherwise boring evening.

Ten or fifteen years ago, debates issues were left in the council chambers at the close of the meeting and most often, were never brought up again.

It is so different today. The arguments in today's township council meeting, and we are speaking here only of the township, because we have never heard a village meeting even approach the conduct that took place at township council this week. Some of it was downright disgusting. Thank goodness, none of our high school student council members were on hand to hear it.

This year especially, there has been a noticeable lack of respect for the reeve's chair and this bothers us no end.

If a council member has a personal dislike for the reeve or any other member, we suggest this feeling be kept under wraps and not brought out in the open for all to see. This childish, sulking, bantering, name-calling and the assinine accusations are certainly not in the best interests of the taxpayers, who are paying the council's salaries and expecting they are sitting up there getting the work done.

The last two meetings have lasted into the early hours of the morning. The work, that is done, under other conditions and in any other place could be finished in half the time, if members did not keep getting involved in personal discussions and raking over old discussions, that were obviously aired in committee.

The reeve, deputy-reeve and all councillors hold an office they were elected to, by the people. Each of the offices demands and should receive respect.

Again we repeat, keep your personal feelings to yourselves. No one else is interested in them, nor do the press or taxpayers sit in Brougham just to hear them. Both the press and taxpayers have much better ways and certainly more pleasant ways of putting in an evening than sitting listening and observing the type of performance that was put on by assumably intelligent and refined ladies and gentlemen, than was put on this week.

Enough said.

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REPORT from PARLIAMENT

The sitting hours of the House of Commons have now been extended as they normally are toward the end of a Session or the first half of the Session. On Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays, the House now sits for a total of six and one-half hours. On Wednesdays it sits four hours and on Fridays, seven and one-half hours. This is in an effort to get the business before the House the House completed before any summer recess can be entertained.

The Government has been changing its mind from time to time as to which legislation they wish to proceed with, and the priority of this legislation to be dealt with by Parliament. Two weeks ago, the Government was adamant that the flag question should have priority over all other legislation. The question now is that legislation such as student loans and extension of family allowances to the ages of 16 and 17, plus a few other measures, should have equal priority with the flag.

After a meeting of leaders of various parties, a schedule has been drawn up and agreed to by all parties, that will bring about the desired result in the expediting essential legislation.

Interim Supply will once again come up during this scheduled period, and in this case, the Government may ask for sufficient monies to carry on the business of the country for a period of two or three months. This is an indication that the Government has in its mind, a recess, commencing the end of July and continuing until about the middle of September.

Some few weeks ago, a Member of Parliament asked a question in the House of Commons as to whether the Government would consider a study of economic, cultural and social effects upon the rest of Canada, as a result of separation by Quebec.

On Friday, June 26, the Prime Minister advised Mr. Scott, on further questioning on this matter, that the Government was considering it, and went further and advised that officials of the Government were making that kind of an investigation.

This is indeed a strange procedure for the Government to take, inasmuch as it gives the impression to everyone that the Government might be thinking of a possible separation by Quebec from the rest of Canada.

In talking to a great many people in the past few weeks, I find that their opinion is that Parliament should get down to business and pass rightly-needed legislation, rather than spending time on debating about a flag. In most cases people feel that we should not be in a hurry to bring about a conclusion with regard to the adoption of a flag, since this matter has been under consideration for a great many years.

The changing of the Guard on Parliament Hill commenced on Monday, June 29, and great crowds of tourists are attracted to this colourful spectacle.

Preparations were made for the celebration of July 1, on the lawns in front of the buildings, and in this celebration of Dominion Day, Canadians of various racial backgrounds participated.

By-Ways of Nature

The Warbler season may be over, but these has been other kinds of activity to take its place. Although occasionally, the odd Warbler has remained later, such as the Bay-Breasted Warbler and Mourning Warbler, both of which I saw the first week in June, while out for a walk, and during the same week, there was a Wilson's Warbler in our garden. Sometimes, in smappy areas, I have heard the Alder Flycatcher's "fee-bee-o" and usually close at hand the "wicity, wicity" call of the Yellowthroat. Around 7:00 a. m. one morning, I walked along the part of the belt line which continues west across the Scarborough Town Line, and was surprised to see what looked at first like a Jersey calf lying near a clump of bushes, but on closer examination, found it to be a doe. I was thrilled to see it, as I had only seen deer tracks in the winter. Several people spoke to had seen a number of deer in the Pickering area, so one need not go all the way to Algonquin Park to see them. Over at Joe Amos' Pond I saw a female Florida Gallinule and Mr. Amos had seen a male

a day earlier. They have the curious habit of pumping their necks as they swim. There was also a Hooded Merganser and near eth edge of the pond, I saw a Raccoon stand up on it's hind legs. While out for another walk, I startled a Ruffed Grouse, which took off with a thunderous roar. Over at the Anderson farm, three little lambs were born, one of them completely black, which I was told was rather unusual. The Speirs' always have something interesting to report. On a few occasions they have seen a Red Shouldered Hawk circling around a certain spot in their woods, so they concluded it must be nesting nearby, but too high up to find the nest. They also heard a Canada Warbler singing one day in their garden. While they visited Niagara Glen, they saw Bonaparte Gulls. My uncle was down at Point Pelee a month ago, and saw some very unusual birds. For example: Hudsonian Curlews, Black-Bellied Plovers, Ruddy Turnstones, Blue-Gray Gnatcatchers, Orchard Orioles, Red Headed Woodpeckers, and a Yellow Breasted Chat. All of these are unknown to me, except the Red-Headed Woodpecker which I once saw in High Park, Toronto, about twenty years ago. With all the flowers in bloom, June is certainly a delightful month.

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More people in Ontario receive better and more costly hospital care than ever before

On the average day some 56,000 patients — enough people to populate a city — are under care in hospitals of all types in Ontario. These patients are receiving skilled treatment which has never been equalled in the history of the province. Furthermore, the cost of medically-necessary hospital care is no longer a problem for over 98% of Ontario's residents who participate in their government-sponsored hospital plan . . . the plan that ended hospital-expense worries in Ontario.

BETTER CARE—HIGHER COST

For many years the cost of hospital care has been going up steadily, not only in Ontario but also in the rest of Canada and in other countries. Though costly, the advanced scientific facilities and special skills available in hospitals are essential in treating the sick. The quality of necessary hospital care cannot be sacrificed. Since 1959 the average cost to the Commission for one day of patient care has increased by approximately 50%.

WHY COSTS CONTINUE TO RISE

PRICES ARE UP

Hospitals, like everyone else, are paying more for salaries and wages, food, drugs, equipment, supplies and services.

About 70c of every \$1.00 in hospital costs is used to pay hospital employees. Hospitals, today, have more and better-paid employees to serve more patients and provide essential round-the-clock care.

HOSPITALS ARE USED MORE

Greater use is being made of hospitals as medical science now provides many new, costly types of treatment which require admission to hospital. These procedures require more skilled staff, more facilities, drugs and other expensive supplies. Furthermore, there is no longer a financial barrier

to necessary care, so more people obtain the care they need without being burdened by the cost. Also, there are increasing numbers of elderly citizens many of whom require prolonged treatment in hospital.

MORE BEDS AVAILABLE

In 1947, Ontario had only 17,473 active treatment, chronic and convalescent hospital beds; in 1958 there were 31,000. Today there are over 40,000 such beds available to insured persons and, by 1970, it is anticipated there will be 47,000. More beds mean more patients, more cost. In addition, insured patients are entitled to care, without charge, in provincial mental hospitals (23,000 beds) and tuberculosis sanatoria (1,825 beds).

ADDITIONAL OUT-PATIENT SERVICES

Beginning July 1st, 1964 the following services will be included as out-patient benefits:

- 1) Hospital visits to complete treatment of fractures which were originally treated on an in-patient basis. (Previously, this benefit was only for fractures originally treated on an out-patient basis within 24 hours of an accident.)
- 2) Radiotherapy hospital services for the treatment of cancer in clinics of the Ontario Cancer Foundation and hospitals approved by the Commission for these services.
- 3) When prescribed by a licensed physician as a medically-necessary course of treatment and provided by hospitals approved by the Commission:
 - a) Use of physiotherapy and occupational therapy facilities where available. *Note: Consideration is being given to approval of other physiotherapy facilities at an early date. A further announcement will be made.*
 - b) Speech therapy where available and provided by qualified therapists for the treatment of an organic illness or injury.

Note: The above summary is for your convenience only. For detailed information please refer to the provisions of the Provincial and Federal Acts and Regulations respecting these matters.

NEW PREMIUM RATES

(Standard Ward Care)

Because of continued rising costs, the Provincial Government has announced increased premium rates for Ontario Hospital Insurance beginning with the regular advance payment to cover the benefit month of October, 1964. In 1961, 1962 and 1963 the Provincial Government prevented, by subsidy, a rise in premiums. In those years the Government contributed \$125.8 million to the plan from general revenues. It

also paid an additional \$157.8 million for the care of patients in mental hospitals and tuberculosis sanatoria.

Even with the higher premiums the Provincial Government must continue to subsidize the cost of hospital care, and the Federal Government's contributions to the plan will also increase as the cost rises. (The cost of the plan does not include the Government grants which are paid to assist communities build their hospitals).

AUDIT QUALIFICATIONS

- The deferred capital cost on Statement "A" amounting to \$39,342.46 represents the additional cost of providing oversized trunk sewers to the industrial area. It is the intention of Council to raise this amount by a general mill rate on the whole municipality in 1964 and 1965. However, the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board for this department of this expenditure was not obtained, contrary to Section 64, of the Ontario Municipal Board Act.
- Contrary to the regulations under the Residential and Farm School Tax Assistance Grants Act, different rates were not levied in 1963 on residential and commercial assessment for the Pickering District High School Board. According to the regulations, the mill rate on residential assessment for high school purposes should only be 90% of the mill rate on commercial assessment. In 1963 there was only one mill rate levied on all taxable assessment in the Township for high school purposes.
- In 1963, a payment for accumulated sick leave credits was made to an employee who left the employ of the Township and who had less than five years' service with the Township. In our opinion, this payment for sick leave credits contravenes by-law 2631 of the Township which states that an employee must have completed five years' service in order to obtain this benefit.

- At December 31, 1963, the sub-dividers' grants in the amount of \$19,268.80 had not been deposited in a separate bank account as required by Section 299 of the Municipal Act. However, this situation has since been rectified.
- Surety bonds were not submitted for our examination for the Secretary-Treasurers of School Section No. 5. and Union School Section No. 3. and 7. In accordance with Section 234 (7) of the Municipal Act, these officials should be bonded.

Subject to the audit qualifications numbered 1 to 5, we hereby report that in our opinion:

- The financial transactions which have come under our notice have been within the powers of the municipality.
- The audit has been conducted in accordance with the instructions of the Department of Municipal Affairs.
- The financial statements present fairly, the financial position of the municipality as at December 31, 1963, and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date.

We appreciate the courtesy and co-operation extended to us by your officials during the course of our audit.

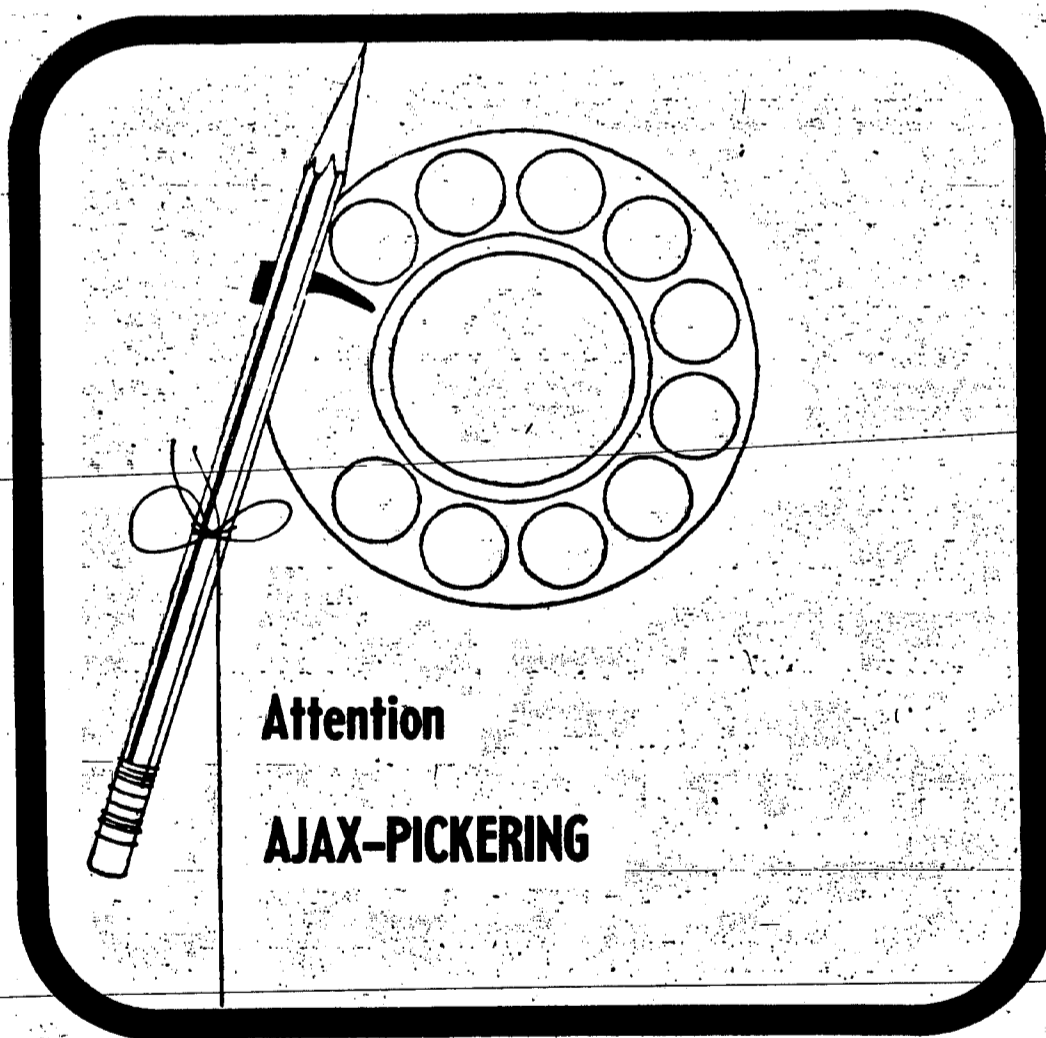

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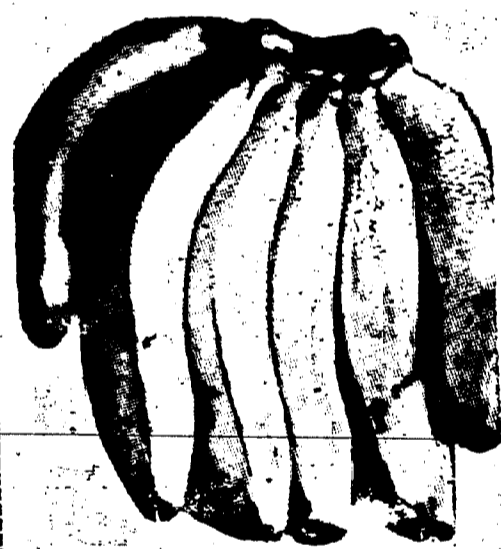
