

"SAFARI" IN EAST AFRICA

"Safari" in Swahili—one of the prominent languages of East Africa means "journey", and Ernie Howard of "Howard Travel Bureau Ltd., Ajax", has recently returned from a camera safari in Kenya and Tanganyika (now Tanzania) together with several Agents and other representatives of the "travel industry".

Forty-eight hours after touching down at Nairobi's modern airport, following an exceedingly smooth flight aboard a new BOAC VC 10, the group were encamped at Amboseli Game Reserve, within the sight of snow-capped Kilimanjaro, at 19,340 feet (Africa's highest mountain).

During the morning and evening "game runs", many animals were seen, including: elephant, rhino and lions, as well as vast herds of gazelle, zebra and other plains game—all in close proximity for any kind of photography.

After further game runs, the following morning, the group travelled via Land Rover, to Lake Manyara by way of Arusha, an attractive town situated at the foot of Mount Meru. An excellent lunch followed, and a visit to the native market (an indescribable colourful sight), then off to Lake Manyara, where the night was spent in a modern lodge on the edge of the Great Rift Valley. A short game run was taken in the morning, when a species of tree-climbing lion were seen, peculiar only to this area. Excellent photographs were obtained including the beautiful pink and black flamingoes.

Turning north, toward the great Serengeti Plains, we visited Alduvai Gorge, a 300-foot natural cleft, 30 miles long, where in 1959 Dr. and Mrs. Leakey discovered the Zinjthropic skull, which has been dated by potassium argon process at 1.75 million years. Here we met Richard Leakey, born in East Africa, and son of the great archaeologist, who very kindly conducted us to several important excavation sites, and gave us a most informative outline on the work in process at Alduvai, under the main sponsorship of the National Geographic Society.

After a few hours on the "road", we reached Seronera Lodge, a well-run establishment with every modern amenity, yet blending with the African landscape. Two days were spent on the Serengeti, during which we saw lion, giraffe, leopard, elephant and again huge herds of plains game. We were fortunate enough to discover a pride of lions feasting on a fresh kill of zebra, whilst vultures perched in the nearby acacia trees and hyena lurked in the bush, ready to vie for the pickings.

On the sixth day out of Nairobi, we journeyed across the plains to Ngorongoro—an extinct volcano crater, twelve miles wide, exceptionally steep and literally teaming with game. The Conservator, Mr. H. A. Fosbrooke, conducted a full day excursion into the crater, pointing out many interesting features. Here we saw an ostrich sitting on 29 eggs.

Leaving the crater, we drove to Marungu in the foothills of Mt. Kilimanjaro, stopping en route at a Masai "boma" (village). After much discussion, conducted through our Kikuyu driver Patrick Swahili, we were allowed to take some photographs of members of the tribe and their kraals. These primitive nomadic people have changed little over the past 2000 years and continue to roam the African plains with their poor herds and continue to eat the main staple of their diet. This is in contrast to the Kikuyu tribe from this area, many of whom gravitate toward the towns and are quick to adapt to many of the Western ways of life.

Following a night spent at Kibo Hotel—we returned to Kenya through the 8000 square mile Tsavo National Park, stopping at Maima Springs. Here, in the crystal clear water holes, it was possible to see hippo, crocodiles and many tropical fish. The night was spent at Mito Andei Hotel.

Wednesday saw us on our way again, driving through typical African Bush and cattle ranches on the main Mombassa road for our return to Nairobi, where our group boarded the VC 10, for the homeward journey via Rome and London.

A "safari" in East Africa is, to most people, more than a holiday—it is an unforgettable experience, one of life's great adventures, and one above all others which conjures up the phrase—"before it's too late".

Open Tenders, January 19, For School Addition

On January 19 next, at 3.00 p. m. tenders for the addition to Pickering District High School (\$2,245,000) will be opened by High School Board Members and Architects, Shore and Moffat Limited.

After a number of alterations to the original plan, here is what contractors are bidding on: 16 Classrooms—one Art Room; one Library; one Typing Room; one Business Management Room; two Laboratories; two Drafting Rooms; one Auto Shop; one Carpentry Mill; one Electrician Shop; one Machine Shop and one Girls Occupation Shop.

Outside of instructional rooms, the tender price will include an addition to the cafeteria and kitchen, to triple its present size; a double gymnasium with dimensions of 70 by 90 feet; with a folding door in between (Pickering already has one); and an athletics room in the gallery of the new gym; new school administration offices, since the existing ones will be used for Guidance and Health.

Pickering District High School, now rated at 640 pupil places, with the addition, seat 1400 students. The increase in the Area High School population, which includes Ajax and Dunbarton High Schools has been between 250 and 300 annually for the past five years.

Since Pickering District High School was opened in 1951, it has had two additions to bring it up to the present 25 rooms; Ajax High School, which was originally built in 1956, has had four additions for a total of 29 rooms. Dunbarton High School has already had two additions since it was opened in 1961, and now has a total of 43 classrooms.

These figures indicate the growth of Pickering Township. In 1960, a total of 1240 students attended the Ajax and Pickering High Schools; by 1964 this figure has almost doubled to 2316.

Already, the Pickering and District High School Board is looking to the future. A 14-acre parcel of land has been purchased, south of the existing Ajax High School, and plans for an addition are already on their way, and will come under the consideration of the Board as soon as the Pickering addition is completed, in about one year's time.

A. Ross Irwin, Administrator for the High School Board, said the reason for making Pickering District High School an Academic-Vocational School was that under the Dominion-Academic-Vocational Plan, the Federal Government would pay 50 percent, and the Provincial Government 25 percent of what- ever part of the school was deemed vocational. Under the plan a number of main shops have to be built for both boys and girls, a number of which the whole high school system is swinging over to the "vocational system", since students can now acquire Senior Matriculation without taking a strictly academic course, and they are allowed to change courses without losing a year between Grades 9 and 11.

One of the features of the two-storey addition is the more walls-less-window-space" idea. More wall space will allow more blackboard space, and it appears that with the curtains-to-celling window design of a few years ago, the curtains would be invariably drawn. Cost is also a factor in the new design.

The Pickering District High School Board is maintained by three municipalities: Pickering Township, which in 1964, paid 66.32 percent of the bills, while 65.29 percent of the students from its area attended the schools; the Town of Ajax paid 28.64 percent, with 28.97 percent attending the High Schools; and Pickering Village picked up 5.04 percent of the "tab", while accounting for 5.74 percent of the school population.

- NEW YEAR'S MESSAGES -

"For You in 1965—A Quiet Place"

My wish for You in 1965, is that you will have a quiet place. Men tell me that they are too busy to read the newspapers; they are out every night; they have two or three meetings on the same night. Many women tell a similar story. Young people and children are pushed into frantic activity. This results in weariness; mediocrity or failure in work attempted; fragmentation of family life; irritation and frustration. Sometimes a break-down follows, with all its ramifications for the individual, the family life and the wider circles of fellowship and useful effort.

Most of us know something of this tyranny. We face a compulsion to be active; a desire to "succeed"; the sacrifice of quality for quantity. Threats to high standards of life and work are subtle and real. On the wider canvas are pictures of a changing and ever-faster-moving world; vague anxiety about mass destruction by frightful devices; the poignant spectacle of two-thirds of our brothers going to bed hungry each night.

In this context of living, I wish for you a quiet place. A place to meet God and confront yourself. In such a place apart, perspective is restored; strength is renewed; guidance is secured; cleansing is known; battles are won before the conflict is joined in the external world. From this place one goes forth with courage and steadiness. Calmness prevails, even when the day's plans, or the arrangements for many days, are frustrated.

God speaks in this place: "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the Most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty." "Be still and know that I am God." "Jesus Christ the same yesterday and today, and for ever." "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

The best time for the daily visit to the quiet place is the morning. Any time will do, as long as we go to it regularly. It will be a major source of help for a productive—and, as a consequence—A HAPPY NEW YEAR.

"Those Good Old Days, and These Good New Days"

I've fallen for that kind of talk too, one time or another, about the good old days. But they never were good; well, not as good as they are often made out to be.

The fact of the matter is, that we tend to forget the unpleasant and remember the good. It is the same when a person dies. We forget his meanness and praise his virtues. A former Canadian Prime Minister, now deceased, implanted a memorable phrase on my mind back in High School days, when, in criticizing his opposite number, he declared "Stop slandering the dead". No one argued with that. It is natural, and proper too, to respect the past, and the people of the past.

In this New Year, we ask "what of these new days?" Since everyone sees the world through his own eyes, I see it through the Church.

We talk of early Christian martyrs, but a responsible world analyst writes, "We do not need to look to ancient history for examples of brave Christian loyalty. It may well be that in our own time more Christians are facing danger and even death for Christ's sake, than in any previous period in the history of the church."

We talk of courage displayed in former days, but this past summer two hundred ministers and rabbis went into Mississippi to help the negro fight for equal rights and privileges. There were four hundred and fifty civil rights workers in all, among them: lawyers, doctors, ministers, college students. They endured much, tongue lashing, pistol whipping, beatings and imprisonment. A few died. Courage can be read about, but it also can be witnessed these days, on this very continent.

We read about how the early Christians cared for one another, but a recent example of caring comes from London's Notting Hill. Like many other places in the world, housing has been in short supply. It has been bad too, in that whole families had only one room, with as many as five families sharing one toilet. Individual churchmen and churchwomen got together and formed a "housing trust". In recent months, not waiting for the ten-year political program, they bought large houses and converted them into simple homes. Four hundred people have recently been housed. One said "I didn't know the Church cared about this kind of thing."

We talk of the days when the churches used to be full, but it happens today too. An experiment in noon-day worship, was tried in Sydney, Australia, twelve years ago. Every Wednesday since 1952, at 1.15 p. m. that Church has been packed, mainly with commuters from the suburbs who work in the city. The Church holds one thousand people. A closed-circuit television system is used for the overflow attendance, which has been as high as six hundred people.

Within our village, I have been greatly heartened when, during this past year, we have been able to meet with people of other churches, including Roman Catholic, and discover the great Christian truths we share together. "All one body we", has taken on new power and new perspective. May it continue, and grow from more to more.

Actually, all of this is only indicative of a great stirring among Christian people everywhere. Nor should we forget the recent Christmas response to need. The God who created in the beginning, is creating still, and working to accomplish His purposes.

Give credit where credit is due. Much of the past is good, but may I suggest that those good old days do not equal these good new days. But these good new days could do better yet, and must be—in the New Year.

What happened to Carlyle was this. He took a number of years to write a book that required a tremendous amount of research. During these years he lived in poverty, but awaited the day when he could turn the manuscript over to the publishers, and receive the acclaim that he would deserve for his work, as well as some money that would make his life a bit more easy.

His work was to be titled, "The History of the French Revolution." And having finished writing, he gave the manuscript to his friend, John Stuart Mill, who would make corrections. Meanwhile, Carlyle waited for Mill to finish, so that the work could go to the publisher.

Then one day Mill dropped around to see Carlyle with heart-breaking news. Mill's housemaid had thought the loose sheets to be waste paper, and had used them to light a fire. Carlyle was left a broken man. He felt he would never be able to write another line.

For many days, he just sat looking out his window, brooding and moaning his fate. Then one day he saw some bricklayers at work across the street. They were re-building a brick wall that had collapsed. They were replacing the bricks one by one,

And Carlyle did finish his book, and this time it was published, and he became world famous as an authority on the French Revolution.

New Year's Day is a time of beginnings. For many, it's a case of starting all over again after failure. One can always give up in moaning and despair, as those who see a situation to be hopeless. Or look out the window of hope and be inspired to start again. Let's face it. To begin to keep a resolution, especially after a messed-up life, can be agony.

Do not tackle too much. Carlyle saw a wall restored brick by brick. He re-wrote word by word.

Life goes on second by second, minute by minute, hour by hour, day by day. What will 1965 be like for us? We must face up to it in hope. But not alone. Recall the opening lines of Psalm 45: "God is our Refuge and our Strength, an ever-present help in distress." And the words of Paul (Phil. 4: 13), "I can do all things in Him who strengthens me."

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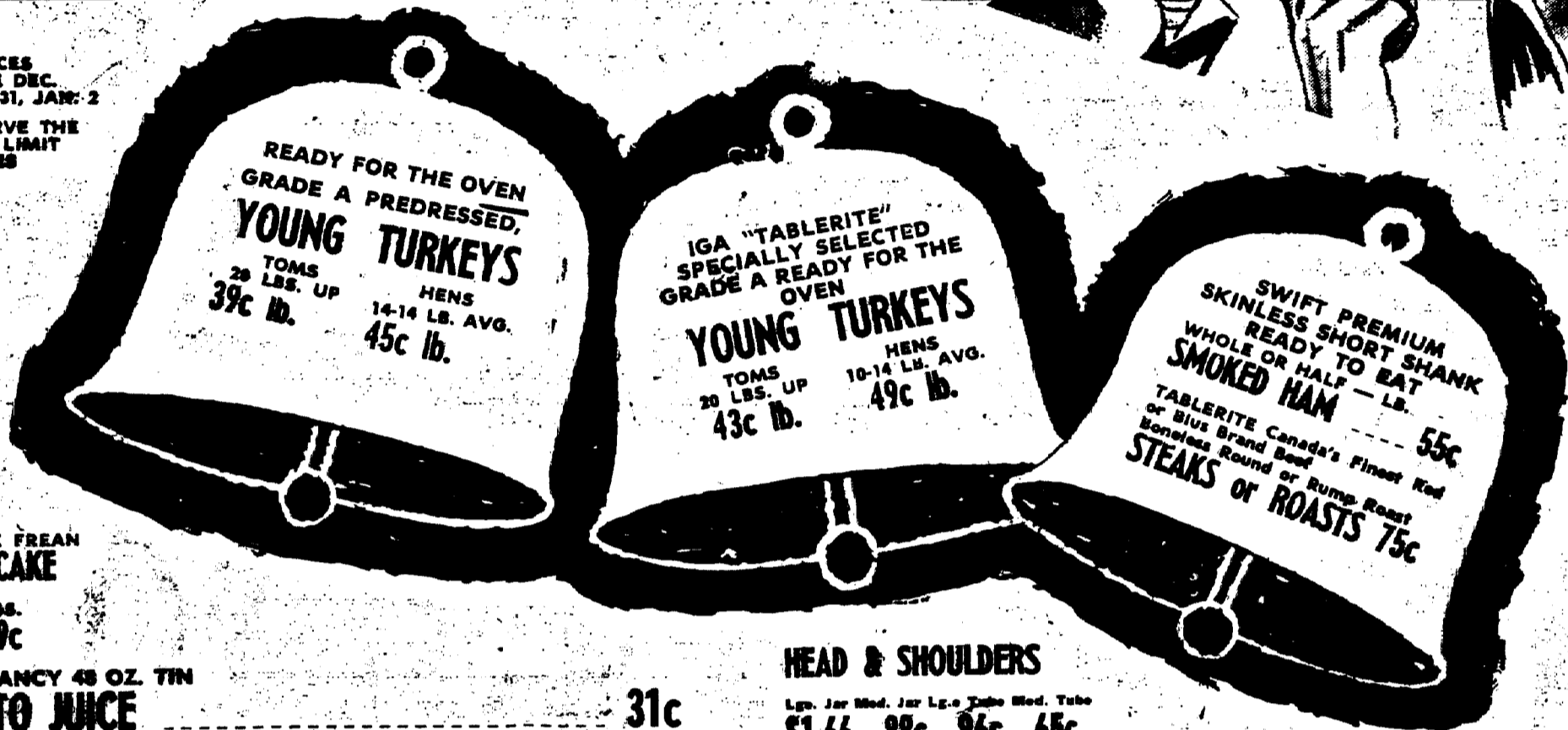
